Berlin, Tuesday, Feb. 25 .- General Ludendorff, who is credited with having been the guiding mind in the final German offensive in the west, has addressed to President Ebert through the German legation at Coperhagen, a communication announcing his return to Germany and requesting that a court of inquiry be convoked for the purpose of acquiring for him the vindication to which he declares he is critiled.
