London, Aug. 10 .- Archbishop Daniel J. Mannix of Australia, who landed vesterday at Penzance by a stroyer, who had taken him off the White Star liner Baltic, arrived here at 6 a m. today. There were only a at 6 a.m. today. There were only a few reporters and a handful of priests present to greet the archbishop, but a heavy police guard was maintained about the station. There were no untoward incidents. A less impressive welcome for Arch-

A less impressive welcome for Arca-bishop Mannix could hardly have been than that which greeted him when he arrived at Paddington station. The police had made arrangements to care or a much larger crowd than that formed by a few priests, representa-tives of the Irish Self-Determination League and reporters who had awaited arrival of the train which drew into the station at 6 o'clock. Railway of-ficials had arranged for his train to be flanked on either side by other trains, and both ends of the platform were suarded by police and detectives.

## **BRITAIN TO** GO FAR TO

British Labor Is Strongly Naval Blockade Would Be First Step If Bolsheviki Persists Opposed To Intervention.

STRIKE IS THREATENED

General Walkout Would Follow Any Participation in Conflict.

London, Aug. 10.—"I am still hopeful of peace" were the opening words of Premier Lloyd George's announcement in the House of Commons today with regard to the announcement in the House of Commons today with regard to the Russo-Polish crisis.

Mr. Lloyd George declared the Polish attack was not justified in the opinion of the British Government, and that the sovet government, in any conditions of peace. Was entitled to take into account the facts of the attacks made by the Poles, and that those attacks were delivered despite the warnings of the Allies to Poland.

The soviet, he declared, was en-

The soviet, he declared, was entitled to demand such guarantees as would be expected by any power against a repetition of attacks of that kind. What was challenged, he said, was that was chairenged, ne said, was that working justifies retailation, reprisal or punishment which goes to the extent of wiping out national existence.

"Apart altogether from the moral inches."

out national existence.

"Apart altogether from the moral right of any power to demand the extinction of another nation as punishment for the aggression of its government." Premier Lloyd George said. "Europe has to be considered. The independence of Poland and its existence as an independent nation is an essential part of the structure of European peace. Repartition of Poland would not merely be a crime, it would be a peril, and we have to consider both these contingencies as a basis for our policy."

The premier declared that the purpose of the Allied policy was to secure peace on a basis of independence for ethnographical Poland. He said the Hythe conference agreed that the Allies should advise Poland to endeavor to negotiate an armistice and make peace, as long as such independence was recognized. That recommendation has been forwarded to the soviet government, the premier stated.

He pointed out that the Allies suggested to the soviet that they declare a truce Monday at midnight, but this was not accepted in view of the Minsk meeting set for Wednesday. He declared there had been great and suspicious delays in coming to a discussion of an armistice.

Will Avoid Quarrel.

will Avoid Quarrel.

The premier continued:

"We are not going to have a quarrel or purpose to engage this country in a dispute, whether it means much or little, upon the difference between Monday and on Wednesday, and thereon the Allies are agreed." agreed.

Continuing his outline of the decisions reached at the Hythe conference, Mr. Lloyd George said:
"If they negotiate an agreement at Minsk we do not propose to intervene to upset any arrangement at Minsk we do not propose to in-tervene to upset any arrangement which is acceptable to the Poles. It is their affair."

If the Minsk conference failed because the Poles refused to accept terms which the soviet was entitled to exact, having regard to the way in which the conflict started, and to the Polish military condition, then the Allies could not support Poland, the premier declared. However, if the premier declared. However, if the Bolsheviki insisted upon terms threatening the independence of Poland, then a different situation

would arise. London. Aug. 10.—Great Britain has heen given a few very anxious days as a result of the Polish situation. Nobody in this country wants to embark in another war. Not only has Great Britain no soldiers to send, but the whole community is tired of war and overhundened with taxation. Results of the Hythe conference are considered as a compromise between the British and French, as all the decisions reached at recent

reached at recent conferences The British premier apparently had The British premier apparently had two policies for dealing with the present situation. One is to arrange terms with the Bolsheviki of Russia and the other is to help Germany get on her feet, both policies being antagonistic to what appears to be the French view.

That Mr. Lloyd George's policy toward the Bolsheviki will eventually triumph in this country seems assured by the strong attitude taken by labor. There is no question that the labor leaders are entirely in earnest, and there is every indication they will be supported by the workers of Great Britain if they seek to enforce by a general strike their demand that the country shall not be committed to further

## BRITAIN AND FRANCE NOT TO SEND TROOPS AGAINST REDS UNLESS BLOCKADE PLAN

in Disregarding Proposition of Great Britain-Germany May Be Called Upon Eventually To Aid in Isolation of

Paris, Aug. 10.—The military decisions reached at the Hythe conference between Premiers Lloyd George and Millerand and their advisers were as follows, according to the French foreign

First, that it was impracticable and unnecessary to send Allied troops to Poland.

Second, the integrity of Poland's western frontier was guaranteed. (This probably means that any effort by Germany to use the present crisis in an attempt to regain any of the territory ceded to Poland under the treaty of Versailles would be decisively negatived by the Allies).

Third, that the Allies would continue sending munitions and skilled officers to Poland.

Blockade measures would possibly be taken later, it was said, but French opinion questioned the effectiveness of such action.

Paris, Aug. 10.—While nothing will be made public relative to the conclusions reached at the Hythe conference on Sunday and Monday until Premier Lloyd George speaks in the House of Commons, it is understood that he and Premier Millerand agreed upon steps to be taken in the event the Boisheviki seek to impose crushing terms on Poland at Minsk on Wednesday, says a Havas dispatch from Hythe. These steps consist of a naval blockade of Russia by the British fleet, aided by French destroyers. Neighboring neutral nations, such as Sweden, Denmark and Norway, will be asked to suspend exports to Russia, and thus aid the fight against the world danger of Bolsheviki made ventually the Allies may

### **COUNCIL MAY CALL** SPECIAL MEETING TO VALIDATE BYLAW

E. V. Buchanan, general manager for the public utilities commission, has forwarded a letter to Mayor Little, asking him to call a special meeting of the city council to give a third reading to the debenture bylaws. First and second readings were given at a special meeting some weeks ago, it being expected that the Ontario railway and municipal board would then grant the necessary authority which was not obtained previously because of the defeat of the London bill. The board stated that owing to a change in its procedure all three readings must be given to measures of this kind.

One bylaw will authorize the issue of \$85,000 debentures for waterworks extensions and \$80,000 for electrical extensions. As the two previous readings were passed unanimously by the council, no difficulty is expected regarding the third reading. Once this is obtained, it is expected that the municipal board will grant approval immediately for the issue.

hoard will grant approval immediately for the issue.

This action will mean the commencement of much activity particularly in the electrical business, as work of this nature is now six months behind. With the exception of a pipe line along Central avenue from the Thames to supply the C. P. R. with river water, no extensive operations are planned. The remainder of the appropriation for waterworks purposes will be used for main extensions, and enlargements along thoroughfares which the city intends to pave. The money obtained from the sale of electrical debentures will be used almost entirely for making new connections. Failing money from this source during the past few months the public utilities commission has had to require each new customer to pay the full cost of a connection in advance. This has seriously retarded the extensions.

As most of the conpections which are to be made are on the domestic circuits, they will not increase greatly the use

to be made are on the domestic circuits, they will not increase greatly the use of power here, and General Manager Buchanan does not expect any difficulty in supplying them.





Verdict States Four-Year-Old Girl Died by Strangulation.

WITNESSES ARE HEARD

Possible Motive of Revenge Is Claimed by One Who Testifies.

ST. CATHARINES, Aug. 9.-After 50 minutes' deliberation this afternoon coroner's jury of Thorold returned verdict to the effect that Margalet Boucock, aged 4, whose decomposed body was found on the route of the Welland Ship Canal last Wednesday, size 25c. At all dealers or sent postpaid came to her death by strangulation on by Fruit-a-tives, Limited, Ottawa. the afternoon or evening of July 13 last, and expressed the opinion that her death was caused by the hands of David McNeal, in whose company she was seen walking towards the spot where the body was found.

Examination proved that the dress was intact. Under the dress was a little waist. The bloomers were not attached to it, but were below the child's knees. The head had been severed from the body, but whether or not by decomposition Dr. Vanderburgh could not say.

Several witnesses were called for the crown. Robert Bradley testified that last winter McNeal told him that there was one man that he wanted to get even with, and that one was Reuben Boucock. He said that Boucock was instrumental in having him put out of a Mrs. Clarke's house.

George H. Peterson, who acted for McNeal, objected to such evidence beling taken.

The first feminine of the name was formed in Italy, where Chiara appeared as the title of a disciple of St. Francis, Clarice was the next step in the evolution and named the wife of Lorenzo de Medici. This latter was imported to England by ear and spelled by them Clarisse. But when the great Richardson called the heroine of his novel Clarissa, all other forms were abandoned and Clarissa became the reigning favorite of the hour.

Curiously enough, the name was reimported into France as Clarisse, in imitation of Richardson—the earlier origin being naively overlooked. 
