Toronto, May 13 .- William McFadden that Sabine had described his slayer as was the man who fired the shot which killed Cecil Sabine, according to evidence given before the assize jury at this morning hearing, when Roy ("Petsy") Hotrum, self-confessed robber and would be jall-breaker, entered the witness stand in his own defence. Hotrum, who is a 21-year-old boy from Hamilton, is charged, together with William McFadden, with having mur-dered Leonard Cecil Sabine, the Har ord street druggist, on the night of Saturday, March 5.

Hotrum gave a circumstantial and detailed account of the tragedy, filling in the gap which was left blank by the evidence of Walter Hulse, the chauf-feur, and Jack Conley, the other gang-ster, who remained in the automobile on the night of the tragedy, while Mc-Fadden and Hotrum walked over to the corner of Manning and Harbord with the intention of robbing the Sa-number of the Hannam Garage at 8 with the intention of robbing the Sabine drug store.

Hotrum said that McFadden had been drinking on the night of the tragedy, and that he appeared nervous and excited. He added that McFadden was the man with the "black-barreled revolver." and that it was McFadden who fired the bullet that killed the druggist. During the course of the evidence Hotrum confessed to a long series of robberies in Toronto and Hamilton, Detective Sergeant Arthur Levitt

testified that when he went to Western Hospital. Sabine had described his as-sallant as "having a deviltsh grin on his face, showing his teeth when he shot me." The slayer "had used a long, slim revolver." He was "rather dark complexioned, quite noticeably thin featured, and was about 25 years old. He was about five feet six or seven Inches tall." The gunman was wearing a dark grey coat and, he believed, Detective Levitt recounted how Sabine

had said that the man with the gun stood only a few paces from him. The second bandit had had nothing to say, and had taken no part in the shooting.

In these words did the Hon. W. S. Fielding, former minister of finance in the Laurier Government, expound the Liberal doctrine on fiscal questions. Mr. Fielding made industry which is established in Canada unfairly dealt with, but, having regard to the future, the only logical course was the creation of enterprises which had as their foundation the country's natural capabilities.

This clear-cut statement from the former minister of finance comes at a most opportune time, at a time when some same policy in regard to the raising of revenue and the assembling of the resources of the country after the years of war are absolute necessities. But the theory of building up a country, not by the bolstering up of exotic enterprises, but by the fostering of those rooted in its soil, is no new one, and it loses none of its value through having stood the test of time. Every country on the face of the earth which has risen to prominence in the roll of nations, has done so through the development of its natural resources. Great Britain's rise and subsequent prosperity as an industrial country is mainly due to her coal and iron deposits, and we read that even before the first Roman invasion the merchants of distant Tyre came to teen famous for her vineyards, Italy for her marble, Germany for her timber products, and countries such as Denmark and Holland, while lacking in the products of the mine and forest enjoyed by other nations, have turned to the best advantage their fine pasture lands and have thereby attained the greatest eminence in their dairying industries. Delegations Ask That Track Regulations Regarding Percentages Be Changed.

ARE WELL REPRESENTED

Both Ontario and Quebec Are Taking Matter Up At Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 13 .- The Journal this morning carries the following on its sport page:

"Opposition is developing against the Royal Canadian Mounted Police having supervision at Canadian race tracks. This assumed tangible shape yesterday, when a delegation from Western Ontario tracks and delegates representing Quebec tracks placed before the Government a request that the mounties be withdrawn as supervisors of the pari-mutuel machines, and their power, recently con-Makers, one of the organizations which ferred of checking up and looking after the interests of the Government in handling the "take" be removed. This request was incidental to a request that the Government change the existing law governing the percentage allotted to tracks. Under the new legislation the Canadian tracks, it is claimed, will be strangled out of existence, when the provincial taxes are taken into con-

ideration Well Represented "Dalton McCarthy, K.C., representing the Canadian Racing Association; George Hendrie of the Windsor track, and one of the powers of Ontario racing: H. J Jockey Club, and, it is understood, Gen Mewburn, former minister of militia, comprised the delegation.

"The opposition of the Quebec tracks was volced in particular to the employ-ment of the mounties. They have forwarded their protests to Premier Meighen. Quebec race officials state that the presence of the mounties, while not objectionable, is unpopular in Que-

"One authority, not from Ottawa, who is in close touch with racing, states that the legislation authorizing the mounties to look after the locking of machines, is not looked on with dis-favor by the tracks, but they do not like the presence of the mounted police on their tracks, as it gives an effect of 'extraordinary police supervision.' At present private detective agencies police all the tracks in Ontario and Quebec.

Foremost Objection.

"The foremost objection is that the mounties have no experience in checking up and tabulating pari-mutuel returns. It is a class of work in which skilled mathematicians might find themselves at sea. There is no one in the mounted police force capable of doing this work. Only ten days intervene till racing starts, and it is obviously im-possible that men could be schooled in that time. It is understood that the Government has in mind securing the services of instructors to give the mounties the essential preparation. Racemen fear that the employment of inexperienced supervisors will result in retarding the calculation work between races, and result in general disorganiza-

LESS TOBACCO BEING PLANTED THIS SEASON

Price Situation Most Unsatisfactory From Growers' Standpoint.

LEAMINGTON, May 12 .- Those in touch with the tobacco situation in this district state that not more than one-half of the usual acreage of tobacco will be sown this sea-son. Many of the growers have great quantities of last year's crop still on their hands and as last year's labor, seed and general production costs are on an entirely different basis to those of this year, it will keep many hustling to break even. 




