INCREASE YIELD. BUT NOT COSTS

R. A. Fisher of England Gives Pointers at Scientific Convention in Toronto.

British Association of Scientists Faces Another Very Heavy Program Today.

lem which today confronts agriculturists is not one of bumper crops. but of adaptation, and the main object of agricultural research is to ject of agricultural research is to enable the practical farmer to increase his yields without increasing his costs. These were the conclusions formulated this afternoon by R. A. Fisher of the Rothansted Agricultural Experimental Station in England, in presenting his paper to the agriculturists on "Incidence of Rainfall in Relation to the Wheat Crop."

Problem of determing the actual effects of weather upon the crops is effects of weather upon the crops is one of extreme complexity, according to Prof. Fisher. The crop is sub-

jected to a long sequence of very variable weather conditions, and the meteorological measurements adequate to represent the weather mus comprise at least rainfall temperature, maximum, minimum and dew point, together with some measure of sur together with some measure of surshine intensity. In consequence of the immense numbers of varieties needed to specify the weather history of a crop, it would be easy to obtain formulae from past records. Such formulae would be practically useless because even data wholly unselested to the weather could equally related to the weather could equally easily be so expressed.

To Increase Yields.

"The main object of agricultural research," said Prof. Fisher, "is to enable the practical farmer to in crease his yields without increasing his costs. It is, in fact, not a prob them of bumper crop production, but of adaptation. The very variable weather of most districts is the greatest obstacle in the way of an accurate adaptation of farming methods to the local conditions. 



Timing is an important bit of golf and consists of bringing the club-head against the ball at the exact second when the left heel returns to its original position—the position it occupied when the upswing was started. If the club-head meets the ball on the downswing when the body is in any other position, the timing is faulty and any one of several golf disasters may occur. The ball may be hooked, sliced or topped; it may be hit pretty decently, but it will lack the distance which perfect timing gives.






