

### Antagonistic Policies.

The able president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, Mr. Drummond, delivered an address last night in which he discussed the Chamberlain trade policy. He held that the Canamanufacturing in Canada and the volume of British imports at the same time. A higher tariff against foreign countries would divert surplus orders to Great Britain, and the increase of population in Canada during the next 25 years would swell the aggregate of imports, even though these might not be so great per head.

An increase in the tariff against for eign countries would tend, no doubt, to transfer Canadian orders to British factories. It might be profitable to do this, and it might not. In his budge speech, Mr. Fielding announced that the Government would go over the whole schedule with the object of framing a graduated tariff, in which maximum duties would be imposed against countries which levied heavy duties on Canadian goods. A lower tariff would be levied against countries which showed a desire to trade with Canada, and below this would be the preferential tariff on British imports. It may be taken for granted, therefore, that unless the United States moderates its fiscal policy in the meantime, the rate of duty will be increased on American imports which can be bought as profitably in Great Britain or manufactured in Canada with equal advantage. Legislation of this kind must be approached with the greatest caution and the Government will make a searching investigation before undertaking this general revision of the tariff.

An increase in the tariff against foreign countries, however, will not transfer Canadian trade to Great Britain unless British manufacturers are given the opportunity to compete in the Canadian market. If the Canadian Manufacturers' Association can influence legislation in this country it must recede from its present policy before any scheme of imperial preferential trade is feasible. The association demands that the minimum tariff shall afford adequate protection to Canadian industry. Adequate protection means the resentative government next year. products. 

TO JAIL FOR WIFE'S SAKE Couple Arraigned for Theft Husband Assumes All Blame.

New York, July 22. - A tall, cleareyed, clean-cut young Englishman stood up before Judge Cowing, in the court of general sessions, yesterday, and with tears in his eyes pleaded for leniency for his weeping wife, who stood trem-bling beside him. The couple were Claude and Kate Stywalt, each 23, and comparatively strangers in try. They had pleaded guilty to indictments charging them with attempted grand larceny.

Stywalt took all the blame upon himself. They were together in a departmental store, when they were arrested for shoplifting. Goods valued at \$100 were found in the possession of the man. The woman, who was in delicate health, fainted. When arraigned, the young husband solemnly declared that his wife was innocent of knowledge of his desperate attempt to steal that he

He addressed soothing remarks to the young woman and suspended sentence in her case, but committed the husband to the reformatory, taking pains to compliment him upon his course, and to assure him that his devotion had saved him from the penitentiary. When the young wife knew that her husband was to be imprisoned she became hysterical. She said that she had neither money nor friends and threatened suicide. A liberal collection was made up for the heartbroken woman. and she left the courtroom determined to begin life anew.

Ritualistal Row in a Town in the County Cork. Cork, July 22.-One of the strangest chapters in the ritualistic controversy was brought to a remarkable climax

It was first erected in Kilbrogan Cemetery over the grave of Mr. "Jack" Appelbe, by his sister. "Lest we forget Jack Appelbe." the inscription on it began, and it ended. "He did his work and held his peace and had no fear to die." The church authorities objected to the Celtic cross; but the lady declined to remove the tombstone, and so the authorities moved it themselves. They put the ejected Celtic cross in a lane covered over by

After this some marauders made descent on the laneway, and took the cross from the tombstone. The police took up the matter, and then missing section of the tombstone was restored mysteriously in the night.
