Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In addressing the Parliament of Canada for the first time, in fulfilment of the important trust which has been committed to me as Her Majesty's Representative, I desire to express the satisfaction with which I resort to your advice and assistance.

I am conscious of the honor which attends my association with your labors for the welfare of the Dominion, and it will be my earnest endeavor to co-operate with you, to the utmost of my power, in all that may promote the prosperity of the people of this country, the development of her material resources, and the maintenance of the constitutional ties which unite her provinces.

It is to be regretted that the treaty concluded between Her Majesty and the President of the United States for the adjustment of the questions which have arisen with reference to “The Fisheries,” has not been sanctioned by the United States Senate, in whom the power of ratification is vested; and that our legislation of last year on the subject is therefore in a great measure inoperative.

It now only remains for Canada to continue to maintain her rights as prescribed by the Convention of 1818, until some satisfactory re-adjustment is arranged by treaty between the two nations.

A measure will again be submitted to you to amend the Acts respecting the Electoral Franchise, for the purpose of simplifying the law and lessening the cost of its operation.

It is expedient, in the interests of commerce, to assimilate, and in some particulars to amend, the laws which now obtain in the several Provinces of the Dominion relating to Bills of Exchange, Cheques, and Promissory Notes; and a Bill with this object will be laid before you.

A Bill will also be provided for making uniform throughout the Dominion the laws relating to Bills of Lading.

During the recess my Government has carefully considered the subject of Ocean Steam Service, and you will be asked to provide subsidies for the improvement of the Atlantic Mail Service, and for the establishment, in concert with Her Majesty's Government, of a line of fast steamers between British Columbia and China and Japan. Your attention will also be invited to the best mode of developing our trade, and securing direct communication by steam with Australasia, the West Indies, and South America.

A Bill will be submitted for your consideration for the prevention of certain offences in connection with Municipal Councils, and to give greater facilities for making enquiries as to such matters.

Several measures will also be presented to you for improving the law of procedure in criminal cases. Among these will be a Bill to permit the release on probation of persons convicted of first offences, a Bill authorizing regulations to be made for the practice in cases partaking of the nature of criminal proceedings, and a Bill to make the Speedy Trials Act applicable throughout Canada.

Bills relating to the inspection of timber and lumber, for the improvement of the Postal System, and for increasing the efficiency of the North-West Mounted Police, will also be submitted for your consideration.

The Royal Commissioners on Labor having concluded their enquiries, I hope to be able to lay before you at an early day their report with the important evidence collected by them in various parts of Canada.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons :

The accounts for the past and the Estimates for the ensuing year will be laid before you. These Estimates have been prepared with a due regard to economy and the efficiency of the public service.

The Librarians expect to be able to place the copy in the hands of the printers as soon as they are able to use it. In the meantime the Canadian Section has received valuable additions.

The collection of Original Editions of the *Relations des Jésuites* has been nearly completed; a full series comprises forty volumes, and the Librarians have been able to secure, up to the present time, thirty-six volumes of the series. A complete set of these remarkable annals of our early history is now valued at \$2,500.

Among the principal additions which come under the general title of Americans, the Librarians desire to call attention to:

1st. The Christian Recorder, 2 volumes, published at York (Toronto) in 1819-20, one of the earliest prints of Upper Canada and one of the rarest.

2nd. A series of letters addressed by the late L. J. Papineau, during the years 1824-25 and 1826, to J. Neilson and members of the British House of Commons.

3rd. "Les Voyages de Champlain," 1613.

4th. Herrera's "Description des Indes Occidentales." (Amsterdam, 1622.)

5th. De Champigny's "La Louisiane Ensanglantée" (Londres, Fleury Mesplet, 1673.)

6th. "History of Massachusetts Bay, 4 volumes, 1628 to 1774; one of the most complete collections of papers on the history of the early settlement of Massachusetts:

The debates of Congress on the Fisheries Treaty and on the Retaliation Message, have been specially arranged and bound for library use.

A special collection of all the American documents on the Fisheries Question, has been made from 1776 to the present date. The catalogue for the year contains the contents of these volumes. Copies of all the recent publications of the United States on this subject have been provided, in number sufficient to satisfy the reasonable demands of members.

Attention has been given to the collection of Statistical Works and books on Political Economy, and the contents of Economical Works of various kinds, including some periodicals, have been printed for the assistance of members.

Among the donations which the Librarians have to acknowledge is a collection of pamphlets on the subject of Education, presented by the Honorable the Minister of Education of Ontario, and by J. G. Hodgins, Esq., LL.D., his deputy.

The Library has also been enriched by the presentation, by His Holiness Pope Leo XIII, through His Eminence the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster, of a copy in bronze of the medal presented by the Sacred Congregation of Cardinals to His Holiness on the occasion of his Sacerdotal Jubilee.

Ordered, That the Report be now received, and

The said amendments were then read by the Clerk, as follow :—

Page 1, line 3.—Leave out from "follows" to the end of the Bill, and insert the following as Clauses "A," "B," "C," "D," "E," "F," "G" and "H" :—

Clause A.

"1. Notwithstanding anything in section fourteen of 'The Railway Act,' it shall be the duty of every Railway Company under the jurisdiction of the Parliament

of Canada, and without any such contribution as is hereinafter referred to, to maintain and keep in repair all necessary drains, ditches, and water-courses in existence at the passing of this Act, in and for lands belonging to or held by such Company."

Clause B.

"2. Whenever the municipal council of any county, township, parish or other municipality in Canada, either of its own motion or on the application of any inhabitant thereof, determines that it is necessary to construct a drain or ditch for the purpose of draining lands in the municipality across the lands and railway of any Railway Company, such drain or ditch shall, subject to the conditions hereinafter provided, be made and maintained across the line of such railway and lands, and on equitable terms to be settled as hereinafter provided."

Clause C.

"3. Such council, hereinafter referred to as the applicant, may serve upon the Company, by leaving the same with any agent or other officer in charge of the nearest station, a notice in writing of such decision, together with a description of the lands outside the railway to be benefited by the proposed drainage, which notice shall be accompanied by plans and specifications, prepared and certified by a civil engineer or Dominion or provincial land surveyor, of that part or portion of the drain or ditch to be constructed across the Company's lands and railway, and with an estimate also so prepared and certified, of the cost of constructing the said drain or ditch across its property, and if the estimated cost of such construction does not exceed the sum of eight hundred dollars, the Railway Company shall, after the expiration of a reasonable time, construct that part or portion of the said drain or ditch across its lands and railway of the same size and dimensions as are specified on the plans and specifications furnished as aforesaid, unless it disputes in the manner hereinafter mentioned the propriety of the proposed work, or the correctness of such notice, plan, specification or estimate, in which case the dispute shall be inquired into and finally determined in the manner hereinafter provided."

Clause D.

"4. If neither the applicant nor the Company give notice of dispute as in the next section of this Act provided for, and if the Company and the applicant do not agree as to whether the railway is to be benefited by the proposed drainage, or, if benefited, as to what contribution the applicant should pay towards the construction of the work, and if the whole cost of construction does not exceed the sum of four hundred dollars, as estimated by a civil engineer or provincial land surveyor as aforesaid, then the applicant may tender the Railway Company the sum that the applicant thinks is fair and just as its portion of the said cost of construction, and may offer to bear afterwards such proportion of the maintenance as it may think just and fair, and if the Railway Company does not accept the amount so tendered, or if it disputes that the offer is for the proper proportion of future maintenance, then the proportion of the cost of construction and maintenance, or of either, as the case may be, that each shall pay or bear, or the question whether it shall be borne altogether by the applicant, shall be decided by arbitration, and any amount or amounts awarded by the arbitrator or arbitrators to be paid to the Railway Company in respect of such construction or maintenance, shall from time to time be collectable from the applicant as a judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction for the amount or amounts so awarded to the Company, or if the award determines upon the proportion of the cost of construction or maintenance payable by the applicant, without mentioning the amount, then such proportion shall be recoverable before any court of competent jurisdiction, and the judgment or award of the arbitrator or arbitrators shall have the same force and effect and be as binding and conclusive as if it had been made by arbitrators concerning the expropriation of land under 'The Railway

Act,' and the appointment of an arbitrator or arbitrators, and the mode of procedure under this Act as to arbitration, shall be, as nearly as may be, in the same manner as provided in "The Railway Act," from section one hundred and forty-six to section one hundred and sixty-one inclusive."

Clause E.

"5. If any dispute, other than concerning the respective proportions of contribution which are to be settled by arbitration as aforesaid, shall arise between the applicant and the company, either in regard to the safety or suitability of the place designated for the work or the sufficiency or correctness of any plans, specifications or estimate, or the propriety of the proposed work, or the manner in which the same is to be maintained, or otherwise, the party disputing may, within thirty days after receipt of such plans, specifications or estimate, give notice in writing of the objections to the other party and to the Minister of Railways, and thereupon the Minister or the Railway Committee of the Privy Council may cause an inspection of the locality to be made by such person as he or they may appoint, and the dispute may be inquired into on the spot by such proceedings as he or they may direct, after which the Railway Committee may make such order in the premises as they shall deem fit and proper, which order shall finally determine such dispute."

Clause F.

"6. Every Railway Company shall be subject to all general municipal regulations, not inconsistent with this Act, respecting the maintenance and repair of drains, ditches and water-courses in any county, parish, township, or other municipality in Canada through which the railway passes, unless exempted therefrom by the special Act of incorporation: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall authorize any municipality by any rule or regulation to compel the use of the drains of the Railway Company for the purposes of general drainage other than is authorized by law."

Clause G.

"7. Every notice given by the applicant shall contain a post office address within the Dominion of Canada, to which notices intended for the applicant may be addressed, and any notice to be given to the applicant shall be sufficiently given, if posted by registered letter, in any post office of the Dominion of Canada, directed to the address so given."

Clause H.

"8. The provisions of 'The Railway Act' with respect to drainage shall continue to apply to all cases not provided for by this Act, and all provisions of 'The Railway Act,' not inconsistent with this Act, including those with respect to suits and penalties, shall also apply to all such cases."

On motion of the Honorable Mr. McCallum, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Casgrain, it was

Ordered, That the said amendments be taken into consideration by the House on Monday next.

The Honorable Mr. Dickey, from the Committee on Railways, Telegraphs and Harbors, to whom was referred the Bill intituled: "An Act to incorporate the Lac Seul Railway Company," reported that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same to the House without any amendment.

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit the Annual Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Printing Services of Parliament for the fiscal year 1887-88, showing the cost of these services to have been \$73,109.56. This is certified to, as being correct, by the signature of the Auditor General

Accounts, in detail, covering the expenditure of the above sum, with files of the work performed, as vouchers, are prepared for the examination of the Audit Committee. During the Recess I received several letters from the Queen's Printer and others, which read as follows:—

SIR,—I am directed to call your attention to the fact that the Government has entered into arrangements with the contractors for Parliamentary Printing whereby they surrender their contract therefor, and cancel it from 1st July next. This Department, therefore, will be charged, on and after that date, with the execution of

all Parliamentary Printing, under the provisions of the Act, R. S. C., c. 27, and the amending Act, 51 Vict., c. 17. All requisitions issued on and after that date, for printing, must be addressed to this Department.

It will be also necessary that your final settlement with the contractors for the current financial year, should extend, not only to jobs ordered and finally completed, but also to portions of them, however great or small, which have been put in type or printed, on or before the 30th instant.

In accordance with the provisions as contained in the above letter, I finally closed the accounts with Messrs. MacLean, Roger & Co. This necessitated the payment for work in progress, as well as for that completed, and caused the expenditure for 1887-8 to be larger than usual, as under ordinary circumstances, this progress work, when finished, would have been charged in the accounts of the succeeding year.

I also surrendered to the late contractors the deposit receipt from the Bank of Montreal, for \$5,000, being the security held by me, as Clerk of the Committee, for the faithful performance of their contract.

This Indenture, made the sixteenth day of July, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in pursuance of the Act respecting Short Forms of Leases;

Between Alexander MacLean and John Charles Roger, both of the City of Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario, in the Dominion of Canada, carrying on there the business of printing under the name, style and firm of MacLean, Roger & Co., and hereinafter called the Lessors, of the first part, and Her Majesty Queen Victoria, herein represented by The Honorable the Secretary of State of Canada, of the second part;

Witnesseth, that in consideration of the rents, covenants and agreements hereinafter reserved and contained, and on the part of Her Majesty, her successors and assigns, to be paid, observed and performed, the said Lessors have demised and leased, and by these presents do demise and lease unto Her Majesty, her successors and assigns:

All and singular that building and premises fronting on Wellington Street, in the said City of Ottawa, now occupied by the said Lessors as a printing office, together with all the houses, outhouses, yards and other appurtenances thereto belonging, or usually known as part or parcel thereof, or as belonging thereto; together also with all the printing presses, type and stereotype plates and matrices therefor, and stereotyping and printing plant and material, and the use and enjoyment of the steam engine and boiler, and all motive power and shafting, and heating, and lighting apparatus in use therein.

To have and to hold the said demised premises unto Her Majesty, her successors and assigns, for the term of one year beginning upon the first day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

Yielding and paying therefor the rent of six thousand dollars, to be payable quarterly, in equal portions, on the first days of the months of October, January, April and July during the said term.

And Her Majesty covenants, to pay taxes, and to repair, and that the said Lessors may enter and view state of repair; and that Her Majesty will repair according to notice, and will not assign, or sub-let without leave, and that she will leave the premises in good repair.

And Her Majesty, for herself, her successors, and assigns, doth hereby covenant, promise and agree to and with the said Lessors, their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, that she or they will, during the continuance of her or their possession of the said premises under these presents, keep up policies of insurance for the amounts mentioned in the schedule annexed hereto upon the said buildings and premises, and their contents.

Proviso for re-entry by the Lessors on non payment of rent or non-performance of covenants.

The said Lessors covenant with Her Majesty for quiet enjoyment.

And it is hereby agreed, by and between the Lessors and Her Majesty, that Her Majesty, her successors or assigns, upon giving notice to the Lessors, their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, of her or their intention so to do, at least one month before the expiration of the said term, may continue to occupy and use the premises hereby demised for the term or period of one month, or of two or more months after the expiration of the said term.

Yielding and paying therefor a rent or sum at the rate of five hundred dollars, to be payable on the last day of each month of such continued occupancy.

And the said Lessors, for themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, and Her Majesty, for herself and her successors, hereby covenant, promise and agree, each with the other, to observe, perform and keep, with respect to such additional term or period, the like covenants and agreements as are hereinbefore contained to be observed, performed and kept by them respectively with respect to the said term of one year.

And the said Lessors, for themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, and Her Majesty, for herself and her successors, hereby covenant that an Inventory, to be prepared as soon as may be after the execution of these presents, and to be indented on the face thereof as the Inventory referred to in these presents of the said printing presses, type and other contents of the buildings and premises hereby demised, shall, when signed by the Lessors, their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, and by The Honorable the Secretary of State of Canada, on behalf of Her Majesty or her successors, be taken for all purposes to include all the contents of the said buildings and premises which it is intended should be demised therewith by these presents, and that thereupon these presents shall be read and construed as if the said Inventory so prepared, identified and signed, were embodied therein and formed part thereof.

And whereas there is a contract now subsisting between the parties hereto for the execution by the Lessors of the printing work of the several Departments of the Government of Canada and for printing the Statutes and the Canada Gazette, which contract will expire on the thirty-first day of October next, and another contract between the said parties (Her Majesty being stated therein to be represented by Henry Hartney, Esquire, Clerk of the Joint Committee on Printing of the two Houses of the Parliament of Canada) for the execution of all printing required for the two Houses of Parliament; and a third contract for printing the Hansard or Report of the Debates of the House of Commons, which two contracts last mentioned will expire on the thirty-first day of December next.

And whereas by reason of the transfer to Her Majesty of the premises hereby demised, these contracts must be surrendered and determined this day, and a loss of profit which would otherwise have been made thereunder by the said Lessors, will be incurred, and the Lessors have agreed to surrender the said contracts, and to consent to their cancellation on and from this date, and to release Her Majesty from all claims for damage resulting from such cancellation, for and in consideration of the payment to them by Her Majesty of the sum of ten thousand dollars of lawful money of Canada, of which five thousand dollars has been duly paid by Her Majesty to the said Lessors at or before the execution of these presents, and the balance of which Her Majesty, for herself and her successors, hereby agrees to pay on or before the second day of January next.

Now, therefore, this Indenture further witnesseth, that in consideration of the premises the said Lessors hereby surrender the said contracts and consent to their cancellation as of the thirtieth day of June last, and have remise, released and forever discharged, and do by these presents for themselves, their executors, administrators and assigns, remise, release, and forever discharge Her Majesty and her successors, of and from all manner of action and actions, cause and causes of action, suits,

debts, dues, sums of money, claims and demands, whatsoever at law, or in equity, which they, the said Lessors, have, or which they, their executors, administrators or assigns, hereafter can, shall or may have, by reason of the cancellation of the said contracts, respectively before the respective dates of their expiration, whether on the account of the loss of anticipated profits or otherwise howsoever resulting from such cancellation.

And in consideration of the premises the said Lessors, for and on behalf of themselves, their heirs, executors and administrators, covenant, promise and agree to and with Her Majesty, her successors and assigns, that they the said Lessors, their executors, administrators and assigns shall and will, at the determination of the occupancy by Her Majesty, her successors or assigns, of the premises hereby demised, hand over to Her Majesty, her successors or assigns, represented as aforesaid, all the type and galleys belonging to Her Majesty now in the possession of the said Lessors, together with all additions to plant of any sort made by Her Majesty, her successors or assigns, during such occupancy, and shall and will transfer to Her Majesty, her successors or assigns, represented as aforesaid, all stereotype plates and matrices therefor prepared and in use for Government or Parliamentary work, and all standing matter set for such work, upon payment to them by Her Majesty, her successors or assigns, of the price of the material of which such stereotype plates, standing matter and matrices are composed.

In Testimony whereof, the said Lessors have hereunto set their hands and seals, and these presents have, on behalf of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, been signed by the said The Honourable the Secretary of State of Canada, and sealed with his seal of office, and countersigned by Grant Powell, Esquire, Under Secretary of State.

"7. Whenever, under the constitution and laws of the Society, any branch becomes dissolved, the Society shall have the option of taking over the property of such branch, provided it exercises such option within three months after the dissolution of such branch, evidenced by an instrument under the hand of the chief officer of the Society for the time being, and the seal of the Society, and registered in the Registry Office for the City, County or Registration Division within the limits of which such property may be situate, whereupon the said property, whether real or personal, shall become vested in the Society, subject, however, to the payment of all the debts and liabilities of such branch, which it shall be incumbent on the Society to liquidate and discharge as the same may mature, and thereupon each creditor shall have a direct right of action against the Society for the enforcement of his lawful claims upon such branch; and provided also, that in the case of real estate, it shall be sold within seven years after the dissolution of such branch; and provided further, that pending the exercise of such option by the Society, the corporation shall continue in existence, and the Trustees thereof shall continue their duties for the purpose of liquidation only."

Also, copies of all correspondence and of plans and specifications and instructions to the Superintendent of the Welland Canal by the Minister of Railways and Canals,

it would not be for the interest of this country, nor in consonance with the sentiments of its people, to establish entire reciprocity of trade with any foreign nation upon any conditions that would restrict, with regard to others, entire freedom of action by this country in protecting its own industries, in dealing with its own sources of revenue, and in regulating its own foreign trade, or that would necessitate the adoption of duties discriminating against imports from other nations, and more especially from the Mother Country."

After further Debate,

It being six o'clock, His Honor the Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at half-past seven o'clock.

7·30 P. M.

And to the Honorable Mr. Abbott's motion in amendment to the amendment thereto, viz.:—"That all the words after the first "that," in the said amendment be struck out, and the following substituted therefor: "Any measure for securing reciprocity of trade with any foreign country, on such of the products of such country as may be freely interchanged with advantage to both, would receive the favorable consideration of this House, but that, in the opinion of this House, it would not be for the interests of this country, nor in consonance with the sentiments of its people, to establish entire reciprocity of trade with any foreign nation upon any conditions that would restrict, with regard to others, entire freedom of action by this country in protecting its own industries, in dealing with its own sources of revenue, and in regulating its own foreign trade, or that would necessitate the adoption of duties discriminating against imports from other nations, and more especially from the Mother Country."

After further Debate,

Also copies of all tenders received by the Government for the erection of the Custom House and Post Office Building at Port Colborne.

Also copies of plans and specifications, and a detailed statement of material used in, and the cost of erecting the said building in the year 1887.

Also copies of all correspondence between the Minister of Railways and Canals, or any officer of his Department, and the Superintendent of the Welland Canal, giving instructions for erecting the Custom House and Post Office at Port Colborne.

Also copies of all correspondence and of plans and specifications and instructions to the Superintendent of the Welland Canal by the Minister of Railways and Canals, or any officer of that Department, for the erection of a wharf or dock west of the lock in Port Colborne.

Also a detailed statement of the material used and cost of said wharf or dock.

Also giving the purposes said wharf or dock was built for and what it is used for.

Also a detailed statement of the cost of Wrecking Pump purchased for the Welland Canal, giving the date of purchase, the number of days the said pump has been used in each year, and date of such service for canal purposes; if for private purposes, giving the date of such service and the amount received by the Government for such service.

Also giving a detailed statement of the cost of Diving armor purchased for the Welland Canal, and giving the number of days it has been used and date of such service in each year.

Also giving a detailed statement of the amount received by the Government for the use of said Diving armor when used for private purposes and not for the Government service. (*In Sessional Papers and the following extracts only.*) Expenditure from the 1st July, 1869 to 1st July, 1870, and from 1st July, 1886, to 1st January, 1888.

68. Return to an Address (Senate), dated the 19th day of March, 1888, for a list giving the names of Veterans of the War of 1812, actually living, with their place of residence and the amount of their respective pensions.

2. Your Committee are of opinion that in the matter of newspapers a considerable saving may be effected by reducing the number of extra copies.

3. Your Committee have examined the Postage Account and regret to find a considerable increase, and deem a reduction is advisable.

4. Your Committee find that, in regard to purchases, while in some instances the discount for cash has been secured, in the greater proportion the allowance is wanting, and your Committee are of opinion that upon all purchases over Five Dollars (\$5.00) a discount for cash should be allowed.

5. Your Committee think that the Special Press Bulletins now furnished to the Reading Room are unnecessary, and beg leave to suggest the advisability of their discontinuance.

6. Your Committee have given some attention to the charges for telegrams and are of opinion that despatches are charged to the Senate which have no connection with the business of the House.

7. Your Committee recommend that in future the books be kept in such a form as will furnish comparative statements of the aggregate expenditure for the several years under the several heads, and that such statements be also prepared for 1889 and the three previous years.

8. Your Committee recommend that the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) be placed at the disposal of the Sub-Committee appointed to assist His Honor the Speaker in the management of the Restaurant, in order to pay for necessary assistance and supervision.

The Joint Committee of both Houses of Parliament appointed to inquire into the expenditure of the country in respect of Legislation and the practicability of reducing the same, presented their First Report.

Ordered, That it be received.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

THE SENATE,

COMMITTEE ROOM No. 17,

MONDAY, 29th April, 1889.

The Joint Committee of both Houses of Parliament appointed to inquire into the expenditure of the country in respect to legislation and the practicability of reducing the same, had under their consideration certain comparative statements in relation to the expenditure of both Houses, and have agreed to report as follows:—

1. Your Committee had under consideration the suitability of amalgamating the Law Department of both Houses, but it being shewn to them that the Law Clerk of the Senate, in addition to filling the duties of Law Clerk, was also Clerk of Committees, and as such Clerk of the following Standing Committees of the Senate, viz.: "Railways, Telegraphs and Harbors," "Banking and Commerce," "Divorce," and "Contingent Accounts," and, further, is English Translator as well; and as it was considered that though the Law Department were amalgamated, still a clerk would be required for the Committee work, and as, furthermore, they deemed it extremely desirable that an independent opinion might or should be obtained upon Bills, your Committee do not think it advisable to interfere with the present arrangement.

2. The propriety of amalgamating the Post Offices of the two Houses was also suggested, but as considerable inconvenience to Senators and Members of Parliament would be created thereby, and your Committee being made aware that in the Senate Post Office there was only one official, viz., the Postmaster, who attends to the whole duties of the office, your Committee recommend no change from the present system, as in their opinion no saving would be made by such amalgamation.

3. It was also suggested to your Committee that an amalgamation might be made of the Accountant's Departments of the Senate and House of Commons, but as such an arrangement would be the cause of very considerable inconvenience to the Members of both Houses, and, furthermore, as your Committee note that, in the Senate, the Clerk of the Senate is the Accountant, and that the Assistant Accountant, in addition to his duties as such, has a great deal of work to do in the Clerk's office, and as he would still have to be employed, his services being necessary, your Committee do not see where any saving would be effected, and therefore recommend no alteration in the present system.

4. Your Committee had also under consideration the matter of amalgamating the Reading Rooms of both Houses, and do not advise any alteration of the present system, inasmuch as the amalgamation would require an enlarged room, which, under the circumstances, would require a large expense, and there would be no saving in the staff, one officer only being now employed for each Reading Room. Moreover, many of the files of newspapers required for binding in the Library are, on account of their careful handling and good condition, taken from the Senate Reading Room.

As regards the Senate, your Committee recommend:—

5. That on the expiry of the tenure of the present incumbent of the Chaplaincy of the Senate, the office shall be abolished.

6. That the rooms at present occupied by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, and the Housekeeper, shall be vacated by them, compensation being allowed them therefor.

7. That in future the amount to be placed in the Estimates for stationery shall be four thousand dollars, and such amount is not to be exceeded.

8. That the successor to the present incumbent of the office of Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod may receive a salary of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), with no residence, and no compensation therefor.

9. Your Committee also recommend that, leaving the present incumbents undisturbed, the appointments and salaries to vacancies in the offices of the Senate may be as follows:—

10. The Clerk Assistant to begin at \$2,400 and to rise to \$2,800.

11. The second Clerk Assistant to begin at \$1,400 and rise to \$1,800.

12. The first English Clerk, etc., to begin at \$1,400 and rise to \$1,800.

13. The second and third English Clerks to begin at \$1,100 and rise to \$1,400.

14. The first French Translator to begin at \$1,600 and rise to \$2,000.

15. The Sergeant-at-Arms, etc., to begin at \$1,400 and to rise to \$1,800.

16. The Postmaster to begin at \$1,000 and to rise to \$1,200.

17. The Assistant Clerk of French Journals to begin at \$600 and to rise to \$900.

18. The Assistant Accountant to begin at \$750 and rise to \$1,000.

19. The Junior Clerk to commence at \$600 and to rise to \$1,000.

20. It was also agreed to recommend, that future appointments and salaries of permanent Messengers shall be as follows:—

Chief Messenger, Doorkeeper and Speaker's Messenger, to begin at \$400 and rise to \$600; all other Messengers, including the Wardrobe and Assistant Doorkeeper, the Bank Messenger and News Room Keeper, to begin at \$300, and rise to \$500.

21. It was also agreed, that the number of Pages be limited to five, and that of the Sessional Messengers also to five.

22. It was also agreed to recommend, that all increases to salaries shall be by an annual amount of \$50, until the maximum is reached.

A Schedule is attached, showing the offices, and present and proposed salaries of the staff of the Senate.

In respect of the House of Commons, your Committee recommend:—

23. That the rooms at present occupied by the Sergeant-at-Arms and the Chief Messenger be resumed possession of by the Government, and compensation allowed the occupants.

24. That in future the amount to be placed in the Estimates for Stationery shall be ten thousand dollars, and such amount is not to be exceeded.

25. It was agreed to recommend, that, leaving the present incumbents undisturbed, appointments and salaries to vacancies in the offices of the House of Commons may be as follows:—

26. The Clerk Assistant to begin at \$2,400 and to rise to \$2,800.

27. The Sergeant-at-Arms to begin at \$1,800 and to rise to \$2,400.

28. The Deputy Sergeant-at-Arms to begin at \$1,200 and to rise to \$1,200.

29. The Clerk of Votes and Proceedings and Secretary to the Clerk to begin at \$1,100 and rise to \$1,400.

30. The Assistant Clerk of Votes and Proceedings to begin at \$750 and rise to \$1,000.

31. The Indexing and Engrossing Clerk to begin at \$600 and to rise to \$750.

32. The Translator of Votes and Journals to begin at \$1,400 and rise to \$1,800.

33. The Clerk of English Journals to begin at \$1,400 and to rise to \$1,800.

34. The Assistant Clerk of English Journals to be also Clerk of Petitions, and Clerk of Sessional Papers, and his salary to begin at \$750 and to rise to \$1,000.

35. The Clerk of French Journals to begin at \$1,400 and to rise to \$1,800.

36. The Assistant Clerk of French Journals to begin at \$750 and to rise to \$1,000, and to have no Junior Clerk.

37. The Clerk of Routine and Records to begin at \$1,100 and rise to \$1,400, and to have no Junior Clerk assisting him.

38. The Chief Clerk of Committees to be also Clerk of the Railway Committee, and his salary to begin at \$1,400 and rise to \$1,800.

39. The Clerk of the Standing Orders Committee shall also be Clerk of the "Private Bills" and "Debates" Committees, and his salary is to begin at \$1,100 and rise to \$1,400.

40. The Clerk on the "Agriculture Committee" to be also Clerk of the "Banking and Commerce" and "Public Accounts Committees," with a salary to begin at

\$1,100, to rise to \$1,400, and an assistant, whose salary will commence at \$600 and rise to \$1,000.

41. The Accountant's salary to begin at \$1,400 and rise to \$1,800.

42. The Assistant Accountant's salary to begin at \$750 and rise to \$1,000.

43. It was also agreed to recommend, that the Law Clerk's salary should not be less than that of the present incumbent of the office.

44. That the Assistant Law Clerk's salary begin at \$1,800 and rise to \$2,400.

45. That the Assistant Law Clerk and Chief French Translator's salary begin at \$1,800 and rise to \$2,400.

46. That the English Translator's salary begin at \$1,400 and to rise to \$1,800.

47. That the Assistant English Translator's and also the Assistant French Translator's salaries begin at \$1,200 and rise to \$1,600.

48. That the Stationery Clerk's salary begin at \$1,400 and rise to \$1,800.

49. That the Assistant Stationery Clerk's salary begin at \$750 and rise to \$1,000, and that there be no junior clerk in this branch.

50. Your Committee also recommend, that, in any further appointment, the Postmaster's salary shall begin at \$1,100 and rise to \$1,400, and the Assistant Postmaster's salary shall begin at \$600 and rise to \$1,000, and that the second Assistant Postmaster shall be only a Sessional Clerk with the usual allowance for such.

51. They also recommend, that there shall be only *four permanent* Sessional Clerks and twenty-five Sessional Clerks.

52. It was also agreed to recommend, that the Chief Messenger's salary begin at \$1,000 and rise to \$1,200, and the Assistant Chief Messenger's at \$600 and rise to \$900.

53. It is also recommended by your Committee, that the salary of the Curator of the Reading Room begin at \$600 and rise to \$800, and the salaries of the permanent Messengers, including the House Carpenter, may begin at \$300 and rise to \$500.

54. Your Committee also recommend, that the Doorkeeper's salary commence at \$400 and rise to \$600.

55. It was also agreed to recommend, that as the duties of the Night Watchmen are very responsible, their salaries be \$600.

56. It was also agreed to recommend, that there should be thirty Sessional Messengers with a Sessional allowance of \$250, and seventeen Pages at \$1.50, one dollar and fifty cents per diem.

57. It was also agreed to recommend, that all increases to salaries shall be by an annual amount of \$50 until the maximum is reached.

58. Your Committee also agreed to recommend, that in future there shall be no Bar-rooms; there shall be two Restaurants, with one Kitchen for the two, they shall be under one management, and the whole to be under the control of a Joint Committee of both Houses.

59. That no strangers are to be admitted to them, unless accompanied by a Senator or Member of Parliament, and that all refreshments are to be served only at the tables, and only to those entitled to be there.

60. Attention was also called to the number of strangers allowed to crowd the Lobbies of both Houses, and the great inconvenience given to Ministers, Senators and Members from it; and it is recommended, that more stringent rules be made regarding their admission.

61. It was also agreed to recommend, that all distribution of Blue-books shall be made from the Printing Bureau, in place of through the Distribution Office, as at present, where, nevertheless, a sufficient reserve for the use of Members of both Houses, may be kept during the Session.

62. It was also agreed, that the distribution of the rooms in the Senate to be vacated, shall be under the control of the Committee on Contingent Accounts, and of those in the House of Commons, under the control of the Internal Economy Commission.

63. It was also agreed to recommend, that in the future, no large Trunks be supplied Senators, Members of Parliament, or others, but that a small Trunk be

allowed with Stationery to each Senator and Member of the House of Commons, the Trunk and contents not exceeding in value twenty-five dollars, and that the ordinary Stationery required during the sittings of the House, be supplied to Senators and Members of the House of Commons, and to the regular Reporters, the *Hansard* Staff, or Translators, for use during the Session.

That such report does not mention that the then Chief Keeper McCarthy, now Deputy Warden, had received, at the very beginning of the outbreak, a very important order from his superior officer, the Warden, to wit: The order to join the Warden in the prison yard with seven or eight officers armed with rifles, and that the said Chief Keeper had neglected, or refused, to comply with such order;

That such report does not say that Messenger Lefavre had deserted his duty during the outbreak;

That the Government, by their action, have failed in their duty, and have deliberately consented to deceive this House;

That the said Committee have power to send for persons, papers and records, examine witnesses under oath, and that it be an instruction to said Committee to report to this House the evidence of witnesses heard before them, and also their proceedings.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN :

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects the Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, humbly approach Your Majesty with the request that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased to cause a measure to be submitted to the Parliament of the United Kingdom, declaring and providing the following to be the westerly, northerly and easterly boundaries of the Province of Ontario, that is to say :—

Commencing at the point where the International boundary between the United States of America and Canada strikes the western shores of Lake Superior, thence westerly along the said boundary to the north-west angle of the Lake of the Woods, thence along a line drawn due north until it strikes the middle line of the course of the river discharging the waters of the lake called Lake Seul or the Lonely Lake,

whether above or below its confluence with the stream flowing from the Lake of the Woods towards Lake Winnipeg, and thence proceeding eastward from the point at which the before-mentioned line strikes the middle line of the course of the river last aforesaid, along the middle line of the course of the same river (whether called by the name of the English River or, as to the part below the confluence, by the name of the River Winnipeg) up to Lake Seul or the Lonely Lake, and thence along the middle line of Lake Seul or Lonely Lake to the head of that lake, and thence by a straight line to the nearest point of the middle line of the waters of Lake St. Joseph, and thence along that middle line until it reaches the foot or outlet of that lake, and thence along the middle line of the river by which the waters of Lake St. Joseph discharge themselves to the shore of the part of Hudson's Bay commonly known as James' Bay, and thence south-easterly, following upon the said shore to a point where a line drawn due north from the head of Lake Temiscamingue would strike it, and thence due south along the said line to the head of the said lake, and thence through the middle channel of the said lake, into the Ottawa River, and thence descending along the middle of the main channel of the said river to the intersection by the prolongation of the western limit of the Seigneurie of Rigaud, such mid-channel being as indicated on a map of the Ottawa Ship Canal Survey made by Walter Sharly, C. E., and proved by Order of the Governor in Council, dated the 21st July, 1886; and thence southerly, following the said westerly boundary of the Seigneurie of Rigaud to the south-west angle of the said Seigneurie, and then southerly along the western boundary of the augmentation of the Township of Newton to the north-west angle of the Seigneurie of Longueuil, and thence south-easterly along the south-western boundary of said Seigneurie of New Longueuil to a stone boundary on the north bank of the Lake St. Francis, at the cove west of Point au Baudet, such line from the Ottawa River to Lake St. Francis, being as indicated on a plan of the line of boundary between Upper and Lower Canada made in accordance with the Act 23 Victoria, Chapter 21, and approved by Order of the Governor General in Council, dated the 16th of March, 1861.

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

"The Commons of Canada have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency the following Bill:—

"An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial years ending respectively the 30th June, 1889, and the 30th June, 1890, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service,' to which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency's assent."

To this Bill the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say:—

"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."

His Excellency the Governor General, was then pleased to deliver the following speech:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In relieving you of the arduous labors which the present Session of Parliament has imposed on you, I rejoice that I am able to congratulate you on the number of important and useful measures which have resulted from your deliberations.

I have reason to hope that the authority which you have conferred on my Government will enable them to conclude an arrangement for effective steam communication with Europe and with Asia, whereby the trade and commerce of Canada

will be widely extended and the traffic passing over her lines of communication greatly developed.

You have again made liberal provision for extending the railway facilities of the Dominion and for increasing their efficiency.

The Act relating to the Electoral Franchise will, I believe, be found an important improvement, tending to economy and certainty in the administration of that branch of the law.

The measure by which the system of Speedy Trials for criminals has been extended to the Maritime Provinces is likely to prove a valuable addition to our Criminal Procedure.

It is gratifying to know that your address referring to the boundaries of Ontario, will lead to the early settlement of the principal question which has remained unsettled to the present time between that Province and the Dominion, in a manner entirely satisfactory to all concerned.

The amendment of the laws relating to Copyright, will, it is hoped, remove some of the embarrassments under which the printers and publishers of Canada have laboured for some years past, without doing injustice to authors in this or other countries.

You have provided for greater efficiency and economy in the Postal Service, for giving greater facilities for the settlement of our lands in the North-West Territories, and for increasing the safeguards of life and property on our ships.

Many of the other measures although of a minor character will be found of great usefulness in conducting the affairs of administration.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons :

You have liberally provided for the various requirements of the public service.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate :

Gentlemen of the House of Commons :

In taking leave of you, I congratulate you on the indications of prosperity which appear in all parts of Canada, and on the increasing revenue which promises amply to meet the appropriations for the year.

I sincerely hope that in the season which is now opening the labors of our people may be blessed by Divine Providence, and that when it shall be my duty to summon you again, I shall be able to renew the congratulations which I have already expressed on the marked welfare and progress of the Dominion.

The Honorable the Speaker of the Senate then said :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, and Gentlemen of the House of Commons :
