USEFUL COOKING RECIPES

Potato Soup.—Three potatoes, one | rubbed up with one of sifted flour. pint of milk or half milk and half pepper and salt, handful of dry bread. water, one teaspoonful chopped onion, one tablespoonful salt, one sprinkle of white pepper, one-half tablespoonful sifted flour, one-half tablespoonful of water and cook till very soft. Cook the onion in the milk in double boiler. When the potatoes are done, drain and mash them. Add the boiling milk and the seasoning. Rub them through a strainer, and put them back into the double boiler to boil again. Melt the dripping in a small pan, add the flour, and stir till it thickens. Stir it into the boiling soup. Let it boil five minutes. Add one teaspoonful of finely chopped parsley and serve hot, with croutons (tiny squares fried bread). If the soup be too thick add a little more hot milk or water.

Puree of Tomatoes .- One can of tomatoes, two cups of boiling milk onion, two tablespoonfuls of butter flour and salt, and last the soda.

Soda Crackers. One pound flour, two ounces lard, one-half teaspoonful of baking soda, one-eighth cake of yeast, pinch of salt, one teaspoonful of dripping. Wash and pare the sugar, one-half teaspoonful of Malt potatoes, then put them into boiling Ext. 120°. Water sufficient to make dough.

> Tea Biscuit.-Take one quart of sifted flour, one teaspoonful of salt and one teaspoonful of baking soda; sift thoroughly together; then rub in a heaping tablespoonful of lard or butter, and add sufficient sour milk or buttermilk to make a soft dough-just stiff enough to handle with the floured hand. Roll out the dough, and cut out the biscuit. Put into hot pans and bake immediately.

Buttermilk Muffins .- Take one quart of buttermilk, two eggs, one teaspoonful of baking soda, dissolved in warm water, one teaspoonful of salt, flour to make good batter. Beat the with half a teaspoonful of baking eggs well and stir them into the milk, soda stirred in, one small minced beating hard all the while, add the Johnny Cake.—Sift together one cup and a quarter wheat flour, two cups Indian meal, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, one teaspoonful salt. Mix together with two cups of sour milk and one teaspoonful baking soda, dissolved in a little cold water. Add now to the batter three tablespoonfuls of soft butter and one to three eggs. Pour into well buttered tins and bake thirty minutes in a brisk oven.

Bread.—Sift together one quart bread-flour with one heaping teaspoonful cream of tartar, one even teaspoonful baking soda, and a half teaspoonful salt. Mix in dry two tablespoonfuls of lard and last work all into a smooth dough with nearly a pint of milk. Let it stand a few minutes, then mould up into two loaves, place in tins, let stand for four or five minutes, and bake in a brisk oven. If it gets brown too quickly on top, place greased paper over the loaves.

Rye and Meal Bread.—Sift together two cups rye meal, one and a half cups Indian meal and one teaspoonful salt. In one cup water and a half cup buttermilk dissolve one even teaspoonful baking soda, add a small cup molasses. Stir in the meal a little at a time; beat all up lightly and add two tablespoonfuls melted butter. Pour at once into greased large tin, set into steamer and steam for three hours, then bake for about thirty minutes longer in oven to give it a good crust.

Graham Bread.—One quart sour milk, two round teaspoonfuls of baking soda, two teaspoonfuls of salt, one cup of molasses, two tablespoonfuls of brown sugar, four coffee-cups of Graham flour, sifted, four coffee-cups of wheat flour sifted. Bake one hour in a slow oven.

Brown Bread.—Take one cup of molasses, one cup of sour milk (and a little over), two teaspoonfuls of baking soda, half cup of sweet milk (good

measure), salt, a tablespoonful of sugar one cup of corn meal, two cups of flour steam three hours.

Egg Bread.—Two eggs well beaten, two cups sour milk, one smooth teaspoonful of baking soda, one small handful of corn meal; lard size of small egg melted and added to batter; a little salt. Bake in hot oven.

Self-Raising or Prepared Flour.— One quart flour sifted, one teaspoonful of baking soda, two teaspoonfuls cream tartar, one saltspoonful salt.

Oatmeal Gems.—Two cups rolled oats, one and a half cups of sour milk. Mix and let stand over night. In the morning add one even teaspoonful of baking soda, a little salt, one egg beaten very light, one-quarter cup of sugar or molasses and one cup of flour. Bake in gem pans.

Slap Jack.—Scald two cups of yellow meal with a pint of boiling water, beaten to a smooth mash; thin with one quart of buttermilk in which is dissolved two teaspoonfuls of baking soda, beat all thoroughly; add a little salt, one or two eggs well beaten, and enough sifted flour to form batter. Have the griddle clean, smooth and hot. Cold cooked rice or hominy can be used instead of corn meal.

The Oldtime Buckwheat Cake.-Sift a quart of old-fashioned buckwheat flour with a cup of yellow Indian meal and a tablespoonful of salt. Add three cupfuls of hot water and one of milk. The hot water mixed with cold flour will make a mixture that is blood warm. Beat the batter vigorously and add to it a cupful of home-made yeast or an yeast cake dissolved in a cupful of lukewarm water. Set the batter where it will rise thoroughly over night, yet where it is not hot enough to sour; cover carefully. In the morning beat the batter again, grease the griddle and add to the batter a cupful of warm milk in which a heap-

ing teaspoonful of baking soda has been dissolved. Beat the batter again until it foams up almost like soda water; then begin to bake the cakes immediately. It is not well to let the batter stand after adding baking soda, as it gradually becomes heavy again. If the batter is not thin enough add more milk.

Waffles.—Take one quart flour, three eggs beaten separately, a piece of lard the size of an egg, half teaspoonful of baking soda, a little salt; mix with enough sour cream to make a thin batter. Beat thoroughly before putting in the irons.

Buckwheat Cakes,—Mix three tablespooufuls molasses with one quart sour milk or buttermilk, and one or two beaten eggs. Then add, stirring in slowly, enough buckwheat flour to make a smooth batter, and one handful of corn meal well mixed with one large teaspoonful of baking soda. Salt to taste. Bake immediately.

Griddle Cakes.—Sift a teaspoonful of baking soda into two cupfuls of sifted flour and a half teaspoonful of salt; sur into the mixture two scant cupfuls of sour milk and two well beaten eggs; make a smooth batter and bake on a well greased hot griddle. Serve at once.

Corn Meal Batter Cakes,—Take one pint corn meal, three-fourths pint sour milk, one teaspoon nearly full of baking soda, stir in milk until it foams; two eggs beaten separately, salt to taste. A tablespoonful of flour added to the meal is an improvement. Have the griddle hot and well greased.

Chocolate Cake.—Take one cup sugar, two eggs, three-quarters cup butter, one cupful sour milk, with one teaspoonful baking soda dissolved in it; one cup and a tablespoonful sifted flour, two squares chocolate melted poured in last.

Bread Cake.-Take three cups bread sponge, two cups brown sugar, one cup butter, one teaspoonful baking soda, two eggs, one cup raisins, onehalf cup citron, one teaspoonful each of cinnamon and cloves, a little nutmeg, flour. Let rise until light.

Berry Shortcake. - Take three cups flour, one teaspoonful baking soda, two teaspoonfuls cream of tartar, one teaspoonful salt. Put these all in the flour and sift together. A piece of lard the size of two eggs, rubbed in the sifted flour, then wet up with buttermilk or sour milk. Half of this is enough for one quart of berries.

Apple Sauce Cake.-Take one cupful sugar, one-quarter cup shortening, one cupful apple sauce, two cupfuls flour, one teaspoonful baking soda dissolved in about two tablespoonfuls water, one teaspoonful each of cloves and cinnamon, a little nutmeg, salt; with or without one egg, one cup seeded raisins or currants. Beat the apple sauce until it is very smooth.

English Tea Cake.—Take one cup of sugar, one-half cup of butter (melted), one teaspoonful each cloves and cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of nutmeg, one cup of sour milk, two cups of flour, one teaspoonful baking soda well rounded, one cup of seeded raisins. Mix the sugar and spices together; add the butter, and cream well; put soda in milk and add to the mixed ingredients; stir in the flour and last the raisins sprinkled with flour. An excellent cake that does not require eggs.

Banana Cake. Take one cup of sugar, one-third cup of butter, half cup sweet milk, three eggs, one teaspoonful of baking soda, two of cream tartar, two cups of sifted flour, flavor to taste. Filling-Mash two bananas to a cream, stir into boiled frosting and put between layers. To be eaten same day as made.

Candy Recipes

Fudge.—Take two cups of brown sugar, two-thirds of a cup of milk, and some butter the size of a walnut. Stir all together until dissolved and boil for three minutes, or until a drop hardens in cold water. Remove from stove and beat until a thick cream. Pour in buttered pan and cut in small pieces.

Cocoa Fudge.—Cook plain fudge as above, and when ready to remove from stove, beat in two tablespoonfuls of cocoa and beat as plain fudge.

Pulling Taffy.—Take one pound of brown sugar, one cup of molasses, one-half cup of water and butter the size of an egg. Boil over a hot fire until it hardens when dropped in cold water. Pour on a greased platter. When cool pull till light.

Taffy.—Take three cups of granulated sugar, one-half cup of vinegar, one-half cup of water and butter the size of a walnut. Boil without stirring until it hardens when dropped in cold water. Flavor and pour at once in buttered pans.

Chocolate Fudge.—Two cups granulated sugar and two cups of brown sugar, one cup of milk, butter the size of an egg, one-half a ten cent cake of unsweetened chocolate grated. Boil until it hardens in cold water. Remove from the stove. Stir in half a cup of chopped walnuts and one teaspoon vanilla. Beat until it stiffens. Pour into buttered tins and mark off in squares.

Chocolate Caramels.—One pound sugar, one-quarter pound of butter, three ounces of unsweetened chocolate (grated) and one dessertspoon of vinegar. Put the sugar in a pan and add just enough water to dissolve it. Add the butter, chocolate and vinegar. Boil, stirring often until it becomes thick and hardens in water. Pour on a buttered pan. Cut in squares when cool.

Barley Water.—One and a half tablespoons pearl barley, one quart cold water, salt. Wash barley, add cold water and let soak several hours or over-night. Drain and add the fresh cold water, boil gently over direct heat two hours, or in a double boiler steadily four hours, down to one pint, adding water from time to time; season with salt. Strain through muslin. Cream or milk may be added or lemon juice and sugar.

Oatmeal Water.—One tablespoon oatmeal, one tablespoon cold water, speck salt, one quart boiling water. Mix oatmeal and cold water, add salt and stir into the boiling water. Boil three hours; replenish the water as it boils away. Strain through cheese

cloth. Season, serve cold.

Junket.—One cup fresh milk, onequarter Junket tablet, one teaspoon cold water. Heat the milk until lukewarm; add the tablet dissolved in the cold water; allow it to jelly in a warm place; chill in cool place.

Flaxseed Tea.—One tablespoon whole flaxseed, two cups cold water, juice of one lemon; sugar. Wash flaxseed thoroughly, put it with the cold water in a saucepan, simmer one hour, add lemon juice and sugar to taste and strain. If too thick, add hot water. Valuable in case of inflammation of the mucous membrane.

Egg Broth.—Yolk one egg, one tablespoon sugar, speck salt, one cup hot milk. Brandy or some other stimulant if required. Beat egg, add sugar and salt. Pour on carefully the hot milk, flavor as desired, if with brandy or wine, use about one tablespoon.

Egg-Nog.—One egg, speck salt, one tablespoon sugar, one-third cup of milk, one and one-half tablespoon of wine or less of brandy. Beat the egg, add the sugar and salt; blend thoroughly, add the milk and liquor. Serve immedi-

ately.

One teaspoonful of salt to one quart of soup, and one teaspoonful of salt to two quarts of flour.

Suet may be kept fresh by chopping roughly and sprinkling it with a little granulated sugar.

One scant cupful of liquid to two full cupfuls of flour for bread.

One scant cupful of liquid to two cups of flour for muffins.

One scant cupful of liquid to one cupful of flour for batters.

One quart of water to each pound of meat and bone for soup stock.

One-half cup of yeast or one-quarter cake compressed yeast to one pint liquid.

Four eggs to one quart of milk for custards.

Four heaping tablespoonfuls of cornstarch to one quart of milk. One even teaspoonful of baking powder to one cupful of flour.

One teaspoonful of soda to one pint of sour milk. One teaspoonful of soda to one pint of molasses.

One teaspoonful of baking powder is equal to one-half teaspoonful of soda, and one teaspoonful of cream of tartar.

Salt added to potatoes when nearly done ensures flouriness and prevents them going to pieces.

The oven for baking bread should be hot enough to brown a teaspoonful of flour in five minutes. For biscuits it should brown in one minute.

One teaspoonful of soda to one pint of sour milk, and one teaspoonful of extract to one plain loaf cake.

Four peppercorns, four cloves, one teaspoonful of mixed herbs for each quart of water for soup stock.

One teaspoonful of vanilla to one quart of milk for custard, and two ounces of gelatine to one and threequarter quarts of liquid.

another; combine them quickly, and put at once into the oven.

To separate the yolk of an egg from the white make a hole in both ends of the egg. Then hold it upright, giving it a gentle shake, and the white will run out, leaving the yolk unbroken in the shell.

The best way to warm up a roast is to wrap it in thickly greased paper and keep it covered while in the oven By having it covered the steam will prevent the meat from becoming hard and dry.

Prevent the frying eggs from sputtering and flying by adding a generous pinch of flour to the fat, and stirring it.

Use milk instead of water for making pie crust, which is to be served cold. It will keep crisp longer.

When making cake always mix the spices and baking power with the flour before it is sifted.

Cream of tomato soup is not apt to curdle if a teaspoonful of cornstarch with a pinch of baking soda is mixed in the cream before it is added to the tomato mixture.

Don't peel apples for apple sauce. Wipe them well, cut up with peeling, add water, and cook till thoroughly soft, then rub the pulp through a coarse sieve.

When making apple pie cut the apples in irregular pieces. They will not pack together as if sliced and will cook much quicker.

Grease sweet potatoes before they are put in the oven to bake; they will bake in half the time and the skins will be soft.



Cleaning Recipes

How to Clean Brass and Copper Pans.—A piece of cut lemon and coarse salt will clean brass and copper pans like magic. After the pan has been well rubbed, rinse out with clean, warm water, then dry and polish with a dry, soft duster.

To Remove Grease Marks.—Grease marks on pages of books may be removed by sponging them with carbon tetrachloride placing the pages between sheets of blotting-paper, and pressing with a warm irou.

Dish-Cloths do not get the attention they should, and in many houses are dirty and quite unfit for use. After washing up, always soap the dish-cloth well, and then rinse in hot water with soda in it. Rinse again in hot water, and hang it in the air to dry.

If in Cleaning a kitchen stove the black-lead used is mixed with a little methylated spirit instead of water, the labor of polishing is a good deal reduced and the result is particularly brilliant. Care should be exercised so that the fumes will not ignite.

To Remove the Smell of Onions from knives, place them in the earth for a few minutes. Earth will also sweeten pickle-jars, etc., that washing seems powerless to render fit for use, but in that case the jars, etc., should be filled with earth and allowed to remain twenty-four hours or so.

Flower Vases stained with flower water can be perfectly cleaned with tea-leaves moistened with vinegar.

Your Table Knives need cause you no anxiety, when stored for some months if you follow this method: Clean the knives thoroughly, and then wipe over with vaseline. Wrap in brown paper, one knife in each fold.

Generally a third application is given three weeks later, and these three constitute a full course. As there may be some systemic reaction, it is desirable to have the patient under observation between treatments. In the ordinary case the patient remains in the Invalids Hotel about sixty days.

Patent Leather Shoes should have the dirt removed from them with a damp sponge. Dry with a duster, and then apply a very little vaseline, and polish with a silk handkerchief.

For Mildew.—Salt, water, and sunshine will remove the worst mildew stains. Wet often, when the sun is bright, and persevere until the garment is clear and white.

Cupboard Floors should be covered with oilcloth, for they can be wiped over with a damp cloth and thus be kept perfectly clean and free from dust.

When Linen turns yellow after washing, you may know that it has not been rinsed enough. The presence of soap causes the discoloration.

After Using Spoons for Eggs which always stain them, the following method will be found not only handy, but also very cheap: Simply get a little ordinary salt, and rub slightly with the thumb and finger, when all stain and smell will instantly disappear, leaving a bright smooth polish.

Salt and Vinegar make an excellent mixture for cleaning water-bottles and wine-decanters. Put a dessertspoonful of rough salt into a decanter, moisten it with vinegar, and then shake the decanter till the stains are removed.

Stains on Flannels may be removed by applying equal quantities of yolks of eggs and glycerine, and allowing it to soak for half an hour before the garment is washed.

To Clean Carpets.—A solution of ammonia and water, lukewarm, will, if well rubbed into carpets, take out all stains. Take one part of ammonia and three parts water.

To Prevent White Fabrics, such as tulle or silk evening gowns, choice lace or crepe shawls, becoming yellow when packed away, sprinkle bits of white wax freely among the folds.



To Clean Mirrors, wash thoroughly with lukewarm water and soapsuds, and when dry polish with chamois leather, on which a little finely powered chalk

has been sprinkled.

The Bread Pan should be washed out weekly, dried, and thoroughly aired by keeping the lid a little way open. Thus the bread will never get a nasty musty taste, and to keep it from becoming top dry place a well-washed potato in the pan. Moisture is given off by the potato, but not enough to cause mildew.

Save Old Kid Gloves for ironing day. Sew a pad made from the left glove on to the palm of the right one, and you will find your hand is saved from becoming blistered, while the fingers and the back of the hand will be protected from the scorching heat which is so damaging to the skin.

Frequent Dusting saves sweeping. A room that is dusted often and thoroughly will not require such constant sweeping as one that is dusted

carelessly and seldom.

A Dirty Oven is often the cause of a disagrecable odor in the house. The odor may be hard to trace, but try scrubbing out the oven with plenty of soda-water and a brush and the probability is the smell will disappear.

To Renovate Carpets. - Sponge them with a solution of one part of ox-gall to two parts of water; do not make the carpet very wet. Dry thoroughly with clean dusters.

To Wash Woolen Clothes. - These should be washed in very hot suds and not rinsed. Lukewarm water will

shrink them.

Stained Enamelled Saucepans should be rubbed with coarse sand and lemon pulp, and not cleaned with boiling soda water. After squeezing lemons, save the pulp for this purpose.

Wooden Spoons and pastry boards will repay a good scrubbing with sand

in preference to soap.

First Aid to the Injured

Apoplexy.—Apply wet cloths to the head and open the collar. Call a physician at once.

Bites of Snakes, Mad Dogs, etc.— Apply a ligature (a cord) on the side nearest the heart; suck the wound, scratch the edges with a clean penknife, keep clean and call a doctor at once.

Stings of Insects.—Apply weak ammonia, oil, salt water, iodine.

Burns and Scalds.—Cover with cooking soda and lay wet cloths over the injured part. Apply white of egg and olive oil; olive or linseed oil, plain or mixed with chalk and whiting; sweet or olive oil and lime water.

Fainting.—Place flat on back; allow fresh air, and sprinkle with water. Place head lower than rest of body.

Fire from Kerosene.—Don't use water, it will spread the flames. Dirt, sand or flour is the best extinguisher, or smother with woolen rug, tablecloth or carpet.

Fire in a Building.—Crawl on the floor. The clearest air is the lowest in the room. Cover head with woolen wrap, wet if possible. Cut holes for the eyes. Don't get excited.

Fits.—Loosen the clothing about the neck, admit plenty of fresh air, and prevent the patient from injuring himself. Place a cork between the jaws to prevent patient from biting his tongue.

Antidotes for Poisons

First.—Send for a physician. Second.—Induce vomiting by tickling throat with feather or finger; drinking hot water or strong mustard and water; swallow sweet oil or whites of eggs. Acids are antidotes for alkalies and vice versa.

For Poisoning from Arsenic, Corrosive Sublimate, Verdigris, Blue Vitriol, and Vegetables kept in Copper Kettles .- Give an emetic and the white of an egg, sweet-oil and milk.

Carbolic Acid.—There is no special antidote, except alcohol. Oil, glycerine, milk, flour and water, whites of eggs, magnesia, and flax-seed tea may be used.

Iodine.—Starch, wheat flour mixed with water, whites of eggs, milk, and mucilaginous drinks are excellent antidotes.

Lead and its Compounds .-- In lead, or painters' colic, purgatives and anodynes may be given, together with large doses of iodide of potassium. Give a strong cathartic, as there is always marked constipation.

Poison Ivy or Oak, -- There are several generally effective remedies for poison ivy or oak. One is to apply hot water and alcohol to the poisoned surface. Another is peroxide of hydrogen. The third is to apply a solution of sugar of lead, about 40 grains to a pound of water. Two other remedies that are more or less effective are baking soda and dry starch.

Toadstool Poisoning.-Give emetics promptly, then castor oil and stimulants. Apply heat.

Emetics are substances which cause vomiting and should be speedily administered in cases of internal poisoning. A teaspoonful of salt; warm water and mustard; an ounce of wine efficacious.
