

### U. S. ARMY OF 168,000.

WASHINGTON, April 27 .- An army of 168,000 is provided for in the army appropriation bill reported by the House Appropriations Committee The total is \$311,037,199, which is \$15,631,747 less than the Bill which failed first session providing for an army of 158.000.

AUTHORIZE ONTARIO LOAN.

TORONTO, April 27 .- The Ontario Legislature authorized the raising of a loan of \$20,000,000. The provincial treasurer said the money would be spent, \$1,400,000 for housing, \$5,500,000 for roads up to October 31, 1921, and a further \$6,-000,000 for roads from October 31 to April 30, 1922, \$1,000,000 for buildings and \$6.000,000 for refunding treasury bills due on October 15
