In the Southern mines the greatest body of foreigners are to be found; and in the vicinity of the Sonoriam Camp they number many thousands, the proportion to Americans alone being more than five to one. On Sunday, the 17th instant, they held a large meeting at Sonora, and peased Resolutions to resist the payment of the Tax. They posted inflammatory placards, in dérision of the American population, and seemed to court what came in the sequel. Since the sailing of the steamer Isthmus, on the

Americans assembled in force, and annoneed themselves ready to sustain the authori-ties of the State.
