### New Canadian Record for Shipbuilding

Ottawa, Sept. 19—Canada has again smashed all records for speed in wooden shipbuilding. The latest at has lowered this country's own mark by about sixty per cent. The War Cauchin, a wooden ship

of 8,100 tons, built for the Imperial Munitions Board, was launched by the Foundation Company shipyards at Victoria (B. C.), on August 31. Installation of machinery commenced at the imperial munition board's installation plant at Victoria on Sept. 3. The installation work was com-

pleted in twelve and one-half working days. On September 17 a successful sea-going trip was held. This vessel will commence loading cargo within seven days of the trial trip. The previous record was held in Quebec

### Slaughter of Germans if Hun Fleet Appears Out

New York, Sept. 13—Confident prediction that a naval battle between the German sea forces and the Allied fleets would result in "a marine slaughter" for the Teutons was made by Representative Daniel Riordan upon his return to New York yesterday after an inspection of American naval activities abroad.

"The protection that is being afforded merchant vessels and transports is improving by the hour," he asserted. "The U-boat was a peril. Now it is simply an annoyance. Very soon it will be obliterated."

"We were pretty anxious to get some idea of the reception that has been prepared for the German navy should it happen to come out. We saw the armor plated reception committee from the deck of a destroyer and it was a sight that will live in my memory forever."

"Stretched about the point whence the German fleet must emerge was a seventy-eight mile cordon of Allied warships—British, French, Italian and American—their men on their toes steam up and guns ready. It took us seven hours to pass this huge flotilla. For us it was the most magnificent spectacle in the world. The crews that man these vessels are waiting; hoping, longing for the fight that I do not think they ever will see."

### Serbs Completely Break down the Bulgarian Front

London, Sept. 19—The Serbians have completely broken the Bulgarian front. The Serbian cavalry have reached Polsko, twenty miles to the north of the original front. Other Serbian cavalry are advancing upon the important junction of Prilep. The front is now 25 miles wide and is regarded as a most important success. It looks likely that the Allies will clear the whole of this area.

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## Sheep Pay Best of all Live Stock in Nova Scotia

High Prices for Wool and Mutton are assured for some years AFTER THE WAR Now is THE TIME TO INCREASE Nova Scotia Flocks. Keep Your Ewe Lambs

If you have more than you need induce your neighbours to purchase them for breeding purposes. Do not sell them to the butcher unless you cannot help it.

1918 legislation requires the compulsory taxation of every dog in Nova Scotia and provides for payment of compensation to owners of sheep destroyed by dogs, the owners of which are not known. Now let every farmer who can, help meet war demands by keeping sheep.

The Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture in co-operation with the Live Stock Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, announce the following policies.

1.—Several hundred selected grade ewe lambs have been purchased and will be sold at cost to bona fide sheep breeders wishing to secure them.

2.—The Departments will pay transportation on these ewe lambs from place of purchase to destination.

3.—If parties wishing to secure ewe lambs for breeding purpose will write the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, Truro, they will get advice relative to price and other particulars. If all lambs already secured are disposed of, an effort will be made to purchase more. Get orders in early, as later prices may be higher.

4.—The Live Stock Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture will assist as heretofore the distribution of pure bred rams.

5.—To supplement the distribution of pure bred rams, the Provincial Department of Agriculture will secure and ship at cost, high class unregistered ram lambs at slightly higher than butcher prices.

6.—Mr. S. A. Logan, in charge of Sheep Extension Work of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture will, as far as possible, call on parties wishing help with their sheep flocks or requiring further information in regard to the increasing of their flocks.

**Canadian Masons In England**

H. S. Carmichael, Passenger and Freight Manager of the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, was installed W. M. of the Canada Lodge at the installation banquet held recently in London, England, attended by the Rt. Hon. Sir Edward Clarke, Sir Gilbert Parker, General J. G. Ross and many other Canadians and English representative men interested in Canada.

The Canada Lodge No. 3527 on the Register of the United Grand Lodge of England was founded in 1911, in order to provide a Masonic centre for Canadians resident in Great Britain and Brethren from the Dominion visiting the Old Country. The object of the founders was also to form a bond of union between the Brethren of the Dominion and the Brethren of the United Kingdom in the strong hope and confidence that Freemasonry might so even still further assist in the great work of forming these bonds of "indissoluble attachment" which shall forever unite the component parts of the British Empire. The Lodge has now 232 members, many of whom are Dominion members resident in all parts of Canada. No fewer than 150 are initiates of the Lodge, 206 members of the Lodge are on active service in H. M. Forces.

Mr. Hugh Strain Carmichael, the newly-elected W. M. of Canada Lodge, is a native of Glasgow. He has been connected with the Transatlantic steamship trade since 1888, when he joined the staff of the State Line, which in 1891 was taken over by the Allan Line. In 1895 he commenced his long connection with the Canadian Pacific Company at Glasgow, transferring to its Liverpool office in 1903, when the company established its transatlantic passenger service. In 1908 he was promoted to be general passenger agent for Great Britain and Europe. Since the establishment, in 1915-16, of the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, Ltd., which manages the entire fleet of the C. P. R. and Allan Lines, Mr. Carmichael has occupied the position of passenger and freight manager, and has his headquarters at Waterloo Place, London, England.

### No Launching at Canning on Saturday.

Despite the rainy weather a great crowd gathered at Canning on Saturday to witness the launching of the staunch three masted schooner General George E. Hogg. The railways brought in about four hundred people mostly from Kentville and the North Mountain Section, and by estimation there was fully two hundred autos on the Main Street and in different yards in the village, which probably brought in fully 1200 people. With the teams from the vicinity including the citizens of the town must have reached nearly 3500 people, probably the largest number ever gathered in that town.

The great crowd taxed the hotel and restaurant accommodations to the utmost. Mr. Huston at the Waverly had many more guests than he could accommodate. The ladies of the Red Cross served excellent meals and lunches to a jolly and hungry crowd and reaped as a reward for their hard labor and unselfish work about \$200.00 in cash for Red Cross purposes.

The tide was high and the wind boisterous when at 1.30 o'clock the ship was about ready for the water. The swell of the water caused the weights on one of the launchways to go overboard and the launchway floated to the surface. In five minutes more the vessel would have been sliding to the water. This accident made necessary a delay in launching and the props were again put in place and the launching postponed until Monday.

With the boisterous wind it seemed fortunate that an accident occurred as the vessel propelled by the wind might have reached a bank before being placed under control and been damaged.

The General Hogg is a fine bit of sea going property worth fully \$75,000 and a credit to the builder Mr. Hatfield.
