Town Council.

A special meeting of the town council was held on Saturday evening last. The mayor and all the councillors, with the recorder, were present.

The following estimates for the various services of the town were submitted and passed:

Table with 2 columns: Item, Amount. Includes Schools (\$2236.00), Police (\$90.00), Poor (\$50.00), Roads (\$490.90), Street Lights (\$500.00), Salary of Recorder and Town Clerk (\$450.00), Contingencies (\$400.00), County (\$1056.85), Installment and interest on Road Land (\$140.00).

Resolved that the assessment rate for the town be seventy-five cents and the school rate be forty-five cents on the \$100.

Resolved that the council enter into negotiations with the trustees of the Methodist church with a view to renewing the lease of the land on which the Fire Building stands for the term of five years.

Resolved that the town clerk proceed to collect forthwith all taxes due previous to Jan. 1st, 1896.

C. A. Patiquin was appointed constable in place of J. L. Franklin, and J. F. Herbin in place of Frank Duncan.

Resolved that the council offer twenty-five dollars reward for such information as will lead to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons who have destroyed or may destroy any ornamental trees, maliciously, on the streets, sidewalks, or any public grounds.

Resolved that the matter of supplying hedges for fire-wards, and hose wrenches be referred to Water Com.

Resolved that the resignation of W. B. Handwick as water superintendent be not accepted, and that he be continued as before at the salary of hundred dollars.

Resolved that the council accept the gift of a drinking fountain from the "Crystal" Band of Hope, and that the council place said fountain in the most suitable position and pay all expenses.

An Act to Prevent the Spread of Diseases Affecting Fruit Trees.

The Local Legislature at its last session passed an act to prevent the spread of black knot and other contagious diseases among fruit trees, and as the act will affect many of our readers we publish it in full that they may early become acquainted with its provisions. The clauses of the act are as follows:

1. It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or occupant thereof if the owner is not resident in the city, incorporated town or municipality wherein the same is situated,

(1) To cut out and burn all the black knot or other contagious disease found on any plum, prune, peach, cherry, or nectarine trees on his land, so often each and every year as any such disease shall appear on such trees.

2. No damage shall be awarded in any court in this province for entering upon the premises and destroying such diseased trees, or parts of trees, if done in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

3. The council of any city, incorporated town or municipality, may, and upon a petition of forty or more rate-payers shall, appoint at least one inspector to enforce the provisions of this Act in the city, incorporated town, or municipality, and fix the amount of remuneration fees or charges he is to receive for the performance of his duties, and in case a vacancy shall occur in the office of inspector, it shall be the duty of the council to fill the same forthwith. Said inspector or inspectors, within ten days after appointment as aforesaid, shall file his acceptance of the same with the clerk of said city, incorporated town or municipality.

4. It shall be the duty of each inspector upon or without complaint, whenever it comes to his notice that black knot or other similar contagious diseases exist, or are supposed to exist, within the limits of his city, town or municipality, to examine without delay, the trees supposed to be infected, and if the disease is found to exist, to give or cause to be given notice in writing to the owner or occupier of such land where the disease is found, or if the owner be a non-resident or away, by leaving the notice with the person in charge of said trees. Such notice shall contain a simple statement of the facts as found to exist, with an order to effectually destroy by fire or otherwise, the trees so infected within ten days from the date of the service of the notice, and in case of the tree known as nursery stock, shall require the person, in whose possession or control they are found, to have the same effectually destroyed as aforesaid.

5. Whenever any person shall refuse or neglect to comply with the order to remove or destroy the trees or parts of trees of which the black knot or other contagious disease, it shall become the duty of the inspector to cause said trees, or parts of trees to be removed or destroyed forthwith, employing the cost of such removal and destruction of trees or parts thereof to be charged against the city, town or municipality, and for the purpose of his work the inspector shall have the right and power to enter upon any and all premises within the city, town or municipality, but with as little care, and future health and strength, cannot afford to experiment with untried and unknown medicines.

6. If any owner neglects to uproot and destroy such diseased trees or parts thereof after such notification and within the time herein before specified, the inspector instead of entering upon the land and having the diseased trees or parts thereof destroyed, may lodge information before any justice of the peace as to such refusal or neglect, and such owner or occupant shall, upon conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, together with costs of suit, said fine to be paid over to the clerk of the city, town or municipality.

7. In any city, town or municipality in which there is found any land on which there is growing wild cherry, or other wild trees, infected with these contagious diseases, it shall be the duty of the city, town or municipal council, when they consider such trees in danger of infecting cultivated fruit trees to cause the inspector to destroy or have destroyed by fire or otherwise, as ordered, such infested wild trees, and such council may divide the expense of destroying the said wild trees between the city, town or municipality, and the owner and occupier of the land, as may appear just.

8. The inspectors appointed under this Act shall render an account of the time spent by them in the performance of their duty, and their fees for services and all other charges and disbursements under this Act, under oath, and said accounts shall be passed upon and determined by the city, town or municipal council, and the costs, charges, expenses and disbursements incurred as aforesaid may be recovered by the city, town or municipality from the owner of the said diseased trees and nursery stock, or from the owner of the land on which they are found.

9. In case any inspector appointed under this Act shall neglect to destroy diseased trees or parts thereof upon his own land, or neglect to perform his duty under this Act, the clerk of the city, town or municipality which appointed such inspector shall, upon complaint made to him, give the said inspector ten days' notice to perform his duty or destroy the diseased trees, or parts thereof, on his own premises, and in case of his neglecting to perform such duty within the specified time, the clerk may lay information against the said inspector, and upon conviction he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty dollars.
