The grain, which came from the farms of John Siemens and M. Wodlinger, of Rosenfeld, Man., graded No. 1 northern of fine quality. It was shipped from the Lake of the Woods elevator at Rosenfeld over the Canadian Pacific Railway to the Lake of the Woods mill at Keewatin.

August 3 is considered the earliest date in a number of years that grain has been moved east.





Airplanes attached to the On-Airplanes attached to the variety of the variety Department are now equipped with radio sending apparatus so that they can keep in constant touch with the chief and other rangers.

There was an increase of sixty-three per cent in the number of im-migrants to Canada during the last three months as compared with the corresponding period of last year.

Canadian Pacific agents in Britmen for work in the harvest fields of Western Canada and, through lack of steamship accommodation men for work in the harvest fields of Western Canada and, through lack of steamship accommodation closed their doors on as many more who, attracted by the special har-vest rate, sought to enter Canada.

The branch lines program of the Canadian Pacific Railway carried out this year will bring into operation on the prairies a larger mileage than any one year since 1914. Of the 431 miles of line under construction, 281 miles will be ready for handling grain in the Fall, and of the balance, 115 miles will be ready for steel by the winter freeze-up.

A building has been acquired by the University of Toronto to be enthe University of Toronto to be entirely devoted to the manufacture of insulin. This will be the only factory in Canada to manufacture the curative fluid in commercial quantities and, although it is manufactured in the United States, Great Britain and Denmark, the Canadian product will be sold throughout the world.

Dawson City recently celebrated the twenty-seventh anniversary of the discovery of the Klondyke. In an exhibition of Yukon products cabbages 16 inches in diameter and weighing thirty pounds, potatoes as big as a man's head, pumpkins as big as watermelons, wheat, oats and barley bore witness to the fertility of the Yukon soil. Side by side with these ranged gold nuggets, gold dust and silver bars.

Dr. James Inches, Commissioner of Police, Detroit, and a guest at the Canadian Pacific Bungalow Camp at Nipigon, holds the record for the biggest speckled trout caught in the Nipigon River this season, having captured a fish weighing 7½ pounds. This catch was above the average, but a large number of six pounders have been taken from the Nipigon this season. Several years ago, and from practically the same place, Dr. J. W. Cook, of Fort William, caught the world's record speckled trout, which weighed fourteen and one-half pounds, and was more than two and pounds, and was more than two and a half feet long.

A record was established recently when one of the latest type of Canadian Pacific locomotives drew a train of 42 cars of newsprint, weighing more than 1.100 tons, from the plant of the Abitibi Pulp and Paper Company, North Bay, to Toronto, without mishap. Ordinarily, it would have taken two passenger engines to haul such a load for 1 the 320 miles. After proving its worth by this feat the huge engine, together with an all steel train consisting of the latest model tourist, dining and also ping cars, and a baggare and compartment cas, formed part of the Canadian Parific exhibit at the National Exhibition at Toronto.

The season of navigation for the year 1923 is the longest since the year 1814, or 109 years ago, according to a statement made at Quebec by Captain J. E. Bernier, Arctic

Two-thirds of Canada's exhibits for the British Empire Exhibition are now in England, mest of these being already at Webley. Among them is a monster silver nugget, weighing nearly three tons, the biggest ever unearthed, which was dug up in Canada.

Twenty-nine million pounds of finalibut were landed at Prince Rupert, B.C., during the past year, with figures for the month of December ingures for the month of December incomplete. This total is considerably in excess of the previous year, Several large shipments were made to Chicago and other middle Western States' points.

E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has accepted the honorary presidency of the Province of Quebec Safety League, succeeding the late Lord Shaughnessy, who was its first honorary president. The object of the League is to institute safeguards for the protection of life, especially children, providing presected playgrounds and streets.

It is estimated by the provincial tourist bureau of the Province of Quebec that 125,000 American automobiles visited the province in 1923. Of this number 40,000 travelled over Of this number 40,000 travelled over the King Edward Highway, the prin-cipal route of automobilists from across the border motoring to Mont-real and a record in the annals of that thoroughfare as regards Ameri-

This is said to be the biggest contract for lubricating oils ever closed in Canada. The Klondyke is in the throes of another gold and silver rush. At the head of the Beaver River, 50 the head of the Beaver River, 50 miles west of Keno Hill, a silver and gold discovery of unusual proportions has started a stampede from Mayo, the major mining settlement of the Yukon, to the new country, where it is said assays reveal pay dirt running 1,100 ounces of silver to the ton.

Rapid progress is being made in preparing the Canadian section of the British Empire Exhibition. The giant payilion was roofed in and ready for exhibits in sixty days from its commencement and will be ready for opening on March 1st. Two million feet of Canadian lumber, 7 miles of roofing and 200 tons of nails, nuts and bolts have already been used in the building.

It is reported that the Rothermere interests of England, which re-cently acquired a large block of tim-ber land in the Manicouagan River Basin, have headed a syndicate which will spend \$16,000,000 in erecting pulp and newsprint manufacturing plants near Quebec city. With this news comes the announce-ment that the St. Regis Paper Com-pany will build a \$4,000,000 plant near the parish of St. Augustin, a

Records compiled by the Bureau of Railway Statistics in Chicago show how greatly the cost of rail road equipment in North America has increased in the plast sixtees years. The Indians of the three prairie provinces in the 1923 season harvested the greatest crop in their history, according to the annual report of the Department of Indian Affairs. In the three provinces, the Indians harvested 638,561 bushels of wheat, 574,282 bushels of oats and 62,304 bushels of barley. The report shows they raised 53,264 bushels of potatoes and 10,000 bushels of other vegetables & They summerfallowed 20,000 acres of land, broke 6,808 acres, put up 57,000 tons of bay and 9,516 of green feed.


