Allies Will Stand No More Fooling From the Huns

Germany is Given to Understand That the Allies Intend to Stand No Further Putting Off Or Fooling

The Huns Are Ordered to Proceed at Once With the Carrying Out of the Terms of the Treaty of Versailles.

SAN REMO, April 27—The agreement of the allied powers finds its first expression in a note to the German Government. The allies say they are determined the treaty shall be executed and they indicate that Germany has not so far kept certain important engagements. They recognize that there have been difficulties, both of the military and economic order. They propose a meeting to be held May 25, not at Brussels, but at Spa, when the German Government can make any representations it wishes. At the same time, Germany is assured that France has no desire to annex any territory.

WELLAND, April 27—A unique snapshot ere long will find an honored place in the family album of a certain resident in these parts. The subject was not a willing siter—or stander. He was snapped only after being driven to bay at the end of an exciting chase in and about and over and under a mass of farm waggons parked about the market here today. The camera-shy one was "The man who had the nerve to ask five dollars per bushel for potatoes," and the hunter who got him was an irate townsman, who if he could not have his life was at least determined to have his picture. The townsman on his first attempt to buy potatoes was shocked to hear them quoted at \$4.50 and went farther, hoping to fare better. Thus it was that he came on the "Five-dollar Man," and his indignation knew no bounds. "Robber" (this was one of his mildest terms) I am going to get a camera and take your picture," he cried. "Men like you deserve to have their features preserved to posterity." He made good his threat, but the picture was filmed only after the farmer had been pursued and cornered.

Six Year Daughter of A. Barrone Fatally Hurt In Front of Her Home

Child Was Crossing the Street When Struck By Taxi, the Driver Failing to See Her on Account of Street Car.

The six-year-old daughter of A. Barrone, fruit dealer, St. Paul street, died at the hospital last night from injuries she received by being hit by a taxi cab. She ran right into the car before the driver saw her, and he had no opportunity to stop his auto. She was taken to the hospital, where she died later in the evening. Buffalo Man's Car Held and He is Fined \$900 Under O. T. A. and Customs. N. Smith, hidden under the top and in the rear seat of a seven-passenger touring car, driven by C. B. Meines of Buffalo, N. Y.

Mass Meeting of the Women of This City Declares For the Boycott of Potato Buying

Those Who Have Potatoes Stored in Their Cellars Are Asked to Give Them Out at Reasonable Prices to Those Who Are Not So Fortunate.

Over two hundred women of the city representing all classes, society leaders, women who work mechanics wives, wives of merchants, at a mass meeting yesterday afternoon in the Standard Hall pledged themselves to buy no potatoes for a month except for seeding purposes. There was much enthusiasm at the meeting and a determination shown by every woman present to carry this boycott through successfully. "Some years ago," said Mrs. A. H. Malcolmson who occupied the chair, "We used to look upon a boycott as being associated with rather violent people, but things have so changed today that we find we must associate ourselves in some degree with these violent methods."

It was decided to get in touch with the heads of all women's organizations, in churches and outside and request that they call on their members to participate in the boycott. The women at the meeting likewise agreed to write chain letters so as to get the boycott advertised. The newspapers were also asked to assist. It was decided to ask the hotelkeepers and restaurant keepers to serve potatoes only once a day. It was felt that to ask that no potatoes be put on the bill of fares at all would be asking a favor that would not be granted. Those lucky persons who have potatoes in their cellars will be asked to sell them at a fair price to others who are not so fortunate.

A Man Found Who Has Been Sleeping in Hollow Log; Probably Escaped Lunatic

High Constable Boyle yesterday afternoon went out to Belmont's Bush to look into the case of a strange man who it was reported had been acting queerly. The officer found the man who appears to be about 45 seated on a log talking to some Merriton boys. He had a long black beard. They said the man had been there for the past ten days, sleeping inside a hollow log, without other covering than an overcoat. The section of log was so short that his feet stuck out the end. The man said he was Michael Delaney, and he didn't know where he came from though he suspected it was Brantford. His memory appeared to be at fault. He was apparently half starved and devoured half a loaf of bread that was handed to him. The magistrate remanded the man to jail for a week until enquiries can be made about him. It is believed he escaped from an asylum.

Modern Bluebeard Faces Possible White Slavery Charge; U. S. Intervenes

LOS ANGELES, April 27—Federal authorities are to take a hand in the investigation of James R. Huirt, alleged multi-bigamist, this time with a view to establishing his possible violation of the Mann white slave act. The newest charges are added to those of bigamy, murder, swindle and robberies of various degrees. That the government must become interested was revealed by Deputy Sheriff Al Manning, who declared that following a thorough summing up of the circumstances which surrounded the alleged matrimonial career of the prisoner, he was convinced that Huirt was also guilty of one and probably more infractions of the white slave act. Local agents of the department of Justice immediately was appealed to.

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TO INVESTIGATE IN RUSSIA

Approval by the Allied Council of the plan gives to the International Labor Mission to Russia a status that will be little less important than that of a diplomatic mission. Britain will send seven delegates, including Miss Margaret Bondfield representing the women workers of the Motherland. Canada is also to be represented, Mr. Arthur Martel, Vice-President of the Trades and Labor Congress, having been chosen by organized labor for that purpose. The British delegation will divide itself into two sections, one of which will examine working and living conditions, while the other will get information on government, trade and economic. The Russian Government has announced its readiness to allow the mission facilities for inquiry into matters on which enlightenment is sought.

Properly carried out, the tour of the mission ought to settle all doubts and perplexities with regard to the Russian situation. The Allies have not added to their reputation by the methods they have pursued toward Russia, and recent changes of attitude reveal a tendency to resume trade and diplomatic relationships falling which there can be no real settlement of Europe's problems. Russia is too great a country, and her potentialities are too vast to admit of her being left out of the plans for the future of the old world. To millions of people ideas of negotiations of any kind with the men who head the Russian Government at this time is abhorrent. But behind Lenin, Trotsky, and the red-headed band whose manipulations have been responsible for horrors not yet revealed in all their ghastliness are millions of people who eventually will either find their salvation in work and decent government or involve many other countries in the chaos that yet rules great areas of their own.

Russia may be won to sanity by peaceful intercourse with other nations. She cannot be saved by military or economic wars waged against her people.

NATIONAL PURCHASING BOARD

Appointment by the Dominion Government of a permanent purchasing Board—men of proved capacity and unquestioned integrity—ought to save Canada millions of dollars. I would apply to the vast and complicated national buying the same sound, economical, businesslike principle which is part of the policy of every large and successful private business.

There was never greater need for efficient methods than now. The country faces serious financial obligations. The people are experiencing heavy taxation. Their representatives in parliament ought to deem it calculated to save money for the public treasury.

A National Purchasing Board—big enough in every way for its job—inevitably must mean better co-ordination, increased efficiency, greater economy. Its members will be required to give their whole time to the work. It will purchase only supplies included in departmental estimates and on requisition of the departments. The system of buying by public is to be adopted in so far as this is possible.

Against a businesslike policy certain to yield immense return in the saving of public money there can be but one cause for Parliamentary protest. It will result in further curtailment of the party patronage sys-

COURT APPROVES NEW UNION OF "MIDDLE CLASS"

NEW YORK, April 24—Supreme Court Justice Gagegan today approved articles of incorporation for the "Public Union, Inc." purporting to be a growing union of middle class people, formed "to benefit in any way those who are not either organized manual laborers or high-salaried executives."

NEGROES SEEN IN THE VICINITY OF MURDER

BUFFALO, April 23—"I had it on my mind and my heart." That was why Tony George, a laborer, could not rest until he had delivered to the proper persons—after four years of silence—the story he told yesterday afternoon on the witness stand, the story that may save John Edward Teiper from the electric chair.

Tells of Meeting Negroes
In broken English, earnestly and straightforwardly, this surprise witness for the defense told of meeting in the Orchard Park road on the afternoon of the Teiper tragedy two negroes who looked and acted suspiciously. One of these he described as "big and large."

The most striking thing about this man's testimony, corroborating it would seem, the defendant's story about the "burly nigger" who committed the murders he is charged with, is the fact that it was brought voluntarily to the defense only within the past month. And brought because the man's conscience pricked him so much, he said, that he got up out of bed one night to write on a piece of paper the gist of his story.

He had wanted four years ago to tell of seeing two negroes, he said; but did not know how to get his information to the authorities. Besides Tony said, pointing to the defendant, who sat a few feet away from the witness stand, "all the people say he did it," and he thought his story of no consequence for that reason.

Even after his conscience had finally forced him to action nineteen days ago, he told the jury he knew of no other way of making his information public except by paying to have it inserted in a newspaper.

Writing the gist of his story on a scrap of paper, he slipped it in the keyhole of a newspaper office, thus starting the information on the way to Roscoe R. Mitchell, associate counsel for the defense, who drew the entire story from the laborer's lips in the court room yesterday.

Scores Heavily Twice
Tony George scored twice for the defense—and heavily. That he saw the two negroes who asked him the way to Lackawanna and then ignored his directions and turned toward Orchard Park was point one. The

second was his assertion that he had told Constable William Baker of West Seneca—one of the authorities working on the murder case—of seeing the negroes in the vicinity of the crime. This the defense held up as the most thrilling exhibit in its contention that the authorities ignored all other clues except those pointing to the guilt of the defendant, for no mention has ever been made on the stand by Constable Baker of this incident.

Eight persons in all testified yesterday of seeing a strange negro at various times of the day on January 30, 1916, but the testimony of none was as sincere and convincing as that of Tony George, this laborer who stood stolidly to his story through the frequent sitters of laughter his dialect and mannerisms of speech raised among the spectators.

Although this was Tony's first appearance in the trial, District Attorney Moore made little effort to trip him on his testimony. He asked scarce half a dozen questions on cross-examination, possibly with the intention of leaving with the jurors an impression that he thought the laborer's testimony of no serious weight.

It was easily the most interesting day since the Teiper trial began. The reason was Tony George—or Tony De George, as he is also known. He came to court in his working clothes, not shabby but with a speck of dust here and there and a big black patch on the knee of his trousers. He looked like a character just stepped from the stage. But on his olive-tan face was written earnestness and almost boyish eagerness to tell what he had to tell.

been recklessly imprudent and very close to treasonable ambitions for such is the interpretation of the verdict of "guilty of commerce and correspondence with the enemy," which was rendered today against him by the French senate.

Decide to Finish Affair
The senators entered Luxembourg palace this afternoon with the determination to have finished with the affair, which has taken up their time during the past three months. They began the discussion in a vigorous businesslike manner, presenting a strange contrast to their bored attitude during the closing days of the trial. No one, however, took seriously the prediction that the verdict

would be reached this evening. But after the court had disposed of the high treason charge and that of "intelligence with the enemy" and had declared its own sovereignty in less than four hours, word was passed that a decision was impending.

The ballots followed one another with great rapidity. The partisans of the former premier were thrilled with joy and hope when the treason charge was so promptly eliminated, and confidently predicted acquittal and began to apportion among themselves the portfolios in the cabinet which Caillaux was expected to form within six months after his release.

REPEATED TRAGEDIES

MARK MOTHER'S LIFE

LAUREL, Del. April 23—Mrs. Derrick Morris, whose husband was brutally murdered here and whose son is in jail accused of the crime, has known little except tragedy throughout the fifty-five years of her life.

Her oldest son, James, was killed twelve years ago while employed as a railroad brakeman in New York.

Charles the next son was drowned while bathing in Lake Erie at Cleveland.

A daughter seven years old, was burned to death a few years ago.

Another daughter's eye was knocked out by the limb of a peach tree.

DEER SEASON SHORTENED

Toronto fur dealers, represented by George Macleith, John Hallan, W. R. Sweeney and S. Brazier, protested to the Fish and Game Committee of the Legislature against the present royalty system, because of the extra clerical work entailed. They suggested a new licensing, fee graded from the farmer or trapper to the ultimate dealer. They were asked to submit proposals in writing. Despite objections from the C. N. R. and C. P. R. who claimed that shortening of the deer season in the north would injure tourist traffic the committee reduced the open season north of the French and Matu law rivers by 15 days, commencing October 15. That the bounty on wolves would be increased from \$20 to \$50 was recommended.

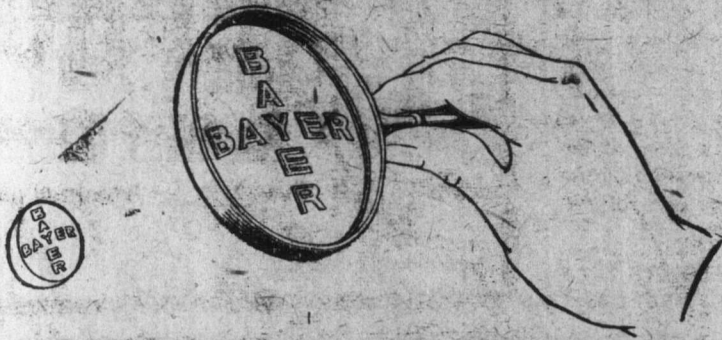

POTATOES AND GARDENING

What reason there has been for the extraordinary rise in the price of potatoe is not clear. The blame is laid on United States buying to help cover a shortage across the border. But potatoe are held in car-lots at many points, passing from one speculative hand to another, merely

on the strength of a bill of lading, and the price is shoved higher each time. Potatoes are \$6 a bag, and there is no protest from any authority in the name of the consuming public. If the public complacency will endure a price ix times as high as the pre-war price for a necessary that is the base of nearly all meals, then the extortion will not abate. But the

high price will surely turn extra attention to back-yard gardening this year. Toronto back-yards and vacant lots produced \$100,000 worth of vegetables in the war period. If potatoes were generally grown this season, in the patent sandy soil in and about the city, two months' supply might be produced locally. But the gardening fever does not seem to be epidemic, and perhaps the Colorado beetle will find his fodder rather short. During the food shortage back yard gardening was a matter of patriotism but today the food shortage is much greater than it was then. We shall see if back-yard gardening can be made a question of pocket. If potatoes at \$6 a bag are not sufficient motive, then the outlook is hopeless, and the country will have to go on until mounting food prices force partial depopulation of the congested cities and towns, and repopulation of the farms.

POTATO BOYCOTT GAINING GROUND

MANY RECRUITS SWELL RANKS OF THOSE WHO ARE "FASTING"

TORONTO, April 23—The potato situation becomes more interesting each day as more organizations endorse the protest against high prices and agree to restrict their diet for a month, by which time it is hoped, that the familiar tuber will have been reduced to prices more suited to its humble origin and history. Through the enterprise of the Regent, Mrs. W. R. Jackson, the Municipal Chapter of the I.O.D.E., comprising 38 primary chapters with a membership of about 3,000 women, have agreed to the potato fast of one month. The annual meetings of the Women's Liberal Association and the Women's Patriotic League also took favorable action yesterday.

STANDS OR FALLS BY EXCESS PROFITS TAX

LONDON, April 23—Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons today that he intended to stand or fall by his original proposal to increase the excess profits tax to 50 per cent from the present 40 per cent rate. The Chancellor, said, however, that if proposals subsequently were introduced for the taxation of war acquired wealth the extra 20 per cent would be remitted.

Dominion of Canada

Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use **Form T 1.**

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use **Form T 1A.**

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use **Form T 2.**

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

FADED TIN-TYPE AND OLD LETTERS GET ESTATE OF \$100,000 FOR POOR ORPHAN

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., April 23—

Two letters stained by time the letters diminished almost beyond the deciphering point, a faded tin-type of a touse-headed boy, evidently ill at ease and nervous at his first ordeal before a camera were worth more than \$100,000 to Fred C. Harrison, of Vermillion county.

The exhibit influenced a jury in the Circuit court at Bloomfield, Mo., to decide a case in favor of the Illinoisan, which gives him the title to a farm of 680 acres of land near the city. The case has dragged through many courts and finally was carried to the supreme bench, which has just handed down a decision affirming the finding of the jury at Bloomfield.

Harrison became an orphan at the age of four. He was given a home by J. N. Punch, a farmer, and reared as a son, although never formally adopted. When Punch died four years ago

the widow and a half brother claimed all the property. Harrison, who had endearing letters from his adopted father, in one of which was the old tin-type, went into the courts. The letters proved that Punch intended the orphan should share in his estate and that he considered him in the light of his own son. The court then divided the estate of 1,320 acres equally between the widow and foster son.

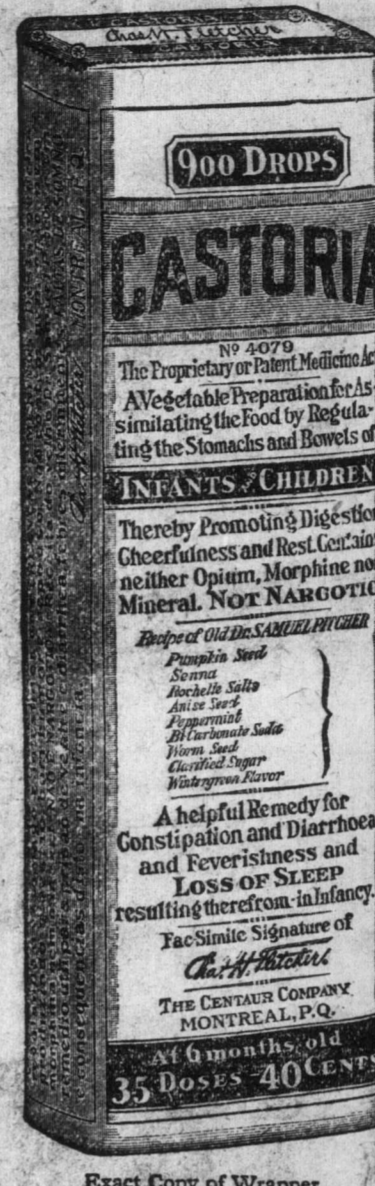

"BOOZE" MADE HIM FORGET WEDDING

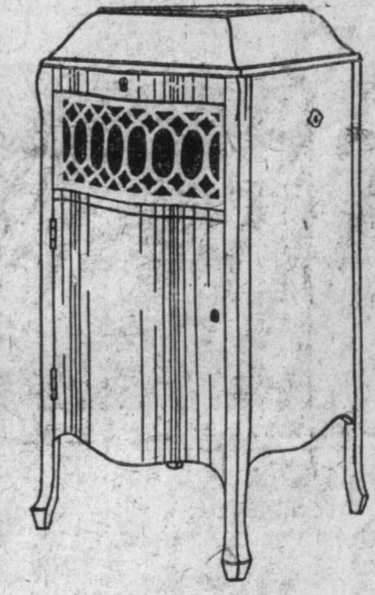

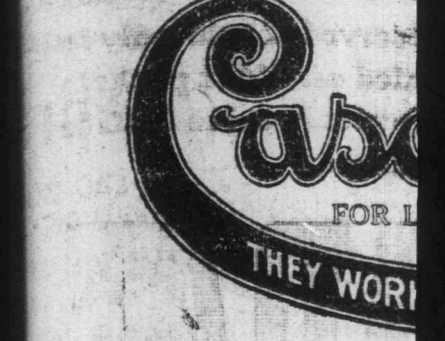

WOMEN RIOT TO GET GLIMPSE OF ODELLS ON WAY TO COURT

Confessed Slayer of Wife's Betrayer May Know Fate To-day—Seek Manslaughter Verdict—Tells of Events Preceding Killing.

ROCHESTER, April 23—James Odell, on trial for the murder of Edward J. Kneip last January at a lonely spot near the Scottsville road to Buffalo, will know his fate probably before another day closes. The prosecution and the defense finished their summing up late yesterday af-

that he might be given a verdict of manslaughter, rather than first degree murder, District Attorney Wm. F. Love, however, has insisted that nothing but a verdict of murder in the first degree would be consistent with the evidence as presented.

Interest in the trial of Odell who with his pretty young wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, confessed to the killing of Kneip, reached the apex yesterday, when hundreds of persons of the greater number of them women and girls, sought to crush their way into the court house in an effort to catch a glimpse of the prisoners even though they might not gain entrance to the court room. Despite the fact that Justice Thompson cleared the court room of women during the presentation of a portion of the testimony, women spectators were in the majority again today when the prisoners were led into the room.

Father Tells Story
A dramatic scene was enacted when James B. Arnold, stepfather of Odell took the witness stand on behalf of the prisoner, and told of the incident at his home when Odell and his wife brought Kneip there and questioned him regarding Kneip's assault on Pearl Beaver, previous to her marriage to Odell. "I asked Kneip if he had used force on Pearl," said the aged man, who has grown gray and stooped since the beginning of the trouble that has come into his family. "He said he had 'considerable' I got up from the table in the dining-room and went out in the kitchen. Jim came out to me a minute later. 'Dad' he said 'What shall I do.' The old man stopped for a mo-

In cross-examination, Mr. Love asked the witness to tell what he knew about the large file with which Pearl opened the attack on Kneip on the night of the killing. This, the old man said, had been an instrument used in the house for the purpose of sharpening knives and poking the stove. He had not known that his step-son had slipped the instrument into his pocket when he went out with Pearl and Kneip on the start of that journey across the city and up the Scottsville road, that resulted in the killing.

Sweetheart Testifies

Viola Williams, the dark-eyed, dark-haired sweetheart of Edward Kneip, was called by the prosecution to testify as to her relations with Kneip and when she had seen the young man prior to the killing. The black-stirred mother of the 31 year youth, Mrs. Mary C. Kneip, and his sister, Miss Josephine Kneip, both testified briefly. Neither was cross-examined. Just before the noon recess a twelve-year-old girl with dark curly hair hanging at her shoulders, Hazel Nember, a niece of Pearl Odell, was called to testify regarding a state of nervousness that she had observed in Pearl before her marriage to Odell. The child added a peculiarly human touch to the courtroom, and in his brief cross-examination of her District Attorney Love was particularly solicitous.

In July, 1916, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Ever in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$48,726. In 1916, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.

Rushing to the waiter, the woman calmly extracted the pet, replaced it in her handbag, and swept indignantly out of the restaurant. Afterward she complained to the manager that her favorite reptile was indisposed as the result of having bitten a plebeian waiter.

The manager requested her to move explaining that while he had kennels and cat houses, and bird cages, and even an aquarium for his guest's pets he had neglected to provide a suitable home for snakes.

Today, however, he discovered that no fewer than five women in the hotel own reptile "pets" and refuse to part with the "little darlings" which they maintain as "perfectly harmless."

ROCHESTER, April 24—After deliberating for eleven hours and fifty minutes a supreme court jury at 10:25 o'clock last night brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree against James L. Odell, indicted with his wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, for the murder of Edward J. Kneip on the night of January 7. Immediately after the verdict was announced Odell was sentenced by Justice Robert Thompson to die in the week of June 13.

Weighed down by the nervous strain of the trial and her own heroic efforts to save the life of her husband through a sacrifice of her own honor, Mrs. Odell suffered a complete relapse at the Monroe County Jail this morning shortly before the hour set for the opening of the final session of court. A mere slip of a girl physically, her superb carriage through the trying ordeal of the last three days was purely on the strength of her supreme endeavor to do her utmost for the man she loves.

Although the outcome of the present case may have considerable bearing on the trial of Mrs. Odell due to be called for the latter part of May, it is believed that the defense in her case will take any course as will give it a decidedly independent aspect, or present condition is such that an important event is expected before the calling of her case next month, which is expected to have an important bearing on the jury's attitude toward her. In the testimony which she gave in the trial of her husband, she did not go into the details of the actual killing of Kneip, her lawyer asserting his legal right to prevent his client from incriminating herself.

On Monday C. J. Coppen, convicted by Mr. Justice Latchford and a jury of the murder of his wife in North Toronto last fall, will learn his fate. Coppen is under sentence to hang on May 5, and on Monday the First Divisional Court will give judgement on his stated case. Coppen will either hang or will be given a new trial.
