The schooner Arctic, with a load of coal from Cape B. C. B., for this port, foundered off Scatarie on the 9th inst.; crew saved. She was owned by Capt. The following are the Boston market prices given by Messrs. Hatheway & Co. in their circular of the 11th inst.: Potatoes, 40 cents per bushel; Cans, 37 to 38 cents per bushel; Eggs, 10 to 17 cents per dozen; Butter, 23 to 24 cents per lb. Dealers in mackerel have not been so eager to secure supplies, and the upward tendency of prices has been checked. Sales of mackerel lots from Nova Scotia and P. E. Island are made at \$1 per barrel, and at the close the market was slow at \$1. Last Bay trip here sold at \$1.75 per barrels-packed, without barrel. Last sale at Gloucester was at \$1.85. Imported cargo lots of Bay are quoted at \$0.50 to \$1 for No. 2, \$1 to \$1.15 for No. 1; and \$1.15 to \$1.25 for No. 1. The catch continues to run light, and the total landings by the New England fleet up to date is only 45,641 barrels against 245,000 barrels last year, a deficiency of nearly 200,000 barrels. The jobbing demand is fair, but the scarcity of medium fish retards trade.
