Defective Furnace Nearly Wiped Out Rev. Dr. Robertson, Wife and Children.

Dr. Andrew Robertson, pastor of St. James Square Presbyterian Church, and his family, had a narrow escape from asphyxiation by coal gas yesterday in their residence at 194 Carlton street, into which they have only lately moved. As the result of the effects of the gas, Dr. Robertson was unable to attend service in his church, but it is expected he will be around as usual in a day or two.

. During the night the furnace, which was defective, began to leak, and by morning it had filled the house with coal gas. Mrs. Robertson, who was the least affected, was the first to notice the gas, and she roused the rest of the household. The three children had become so far under the influence of the gas that on rising they fainted. Windows and doors were, however, soon thrown open and the house cleared of the poisonous fumes.

Dr. R. T. Noble, who was summon ed to attend them, said that had the gas remained undiscovered for fifteen minutes longer, some of them might have succumbed to its effects.
