

PODGORITZA, Montenegro, To-day.

The Montenegro army opened war against Turkey yesterday, by attacking a strong Turkish position opposite Podgoritza. Prince Peter, youngest son of King Nicholas, fired the first shot. This was the signal for firing all along the line and an artillery duel ensued. Within 21 minutes the fire of the Turkish guns was silenced and the Turks retreated silenced and the Turks retreated from their first position on Moun Selaninitza. By noon the Turks had evacuated the mountain. Podgoritza is the headquarters of the Montene-grin forces. Amid enthusiastic cheering of the people, King Nicholas with Prince Mirko, his second son of his staff, rode early to the mountains to survey the positions, where the Mon-tenegrian guns had been placed the night before. Strong detachments are held in reserve, should Turkish forces prove larger than the reports of scouts indicated. Punctually at eight o'clock, the first shock was directed at the Turkish position on the hills poposite by Prince Peter, who is a captain of artillery.
