## Montenegrians Attack Turks.

Special to Evening Telegram.

PODGORITZA, Montenegro, To-day. The Montenegro army opened war against Turkey yesterday, attacking a strong Turkish position opposite Podgoritza. Prince Peter, youngest son of King Nicholas, fired the first shot. This was the signal for firing all along the line and an artillery duel ensued. Within 21 minutes the fire of the Turkish guns was silenced and the Turks retreated from their first position on Mount Selanitzza. By noon the Turks had evacuated the mountain. Podgoritza is the headquarters of the Montenegrin forces. Amid enthusiastic cheering of the people, King Nicholas with Prince Mirko, his second son of his staff, rode early to the mountains to survey the positions, where the Montenegrin guns had been placed the night before. Strong detachments are held in reserve should Turkish forces prove larger than the reports of scouts indicated. Punctually at eight o'clock, the first shot was directed at the Turkish position on the hills opposite by Prince Peter, who is captain of artillery. At the booming of a gun, a band in the Montenegrin quarters struck up the Royal Hymn. The Montenegrin fire was effective was proved by the quick retirement of the Turks. After they evacuated the mountain, a general advance of Montenegrin infantry was ordered (covered by a concentrated artillery fire, the infantry moved towards the strongly fortified Turkish positions in the Dschitch mountain which commands the road to Scutari. At two o'clock the Turks landed troops on the shore at Lake Scutari, near the Montenegrin frontier. A general engagement followed and was still in progress a few hours in the afternoon over an extensive front. The Crown Prince Danilo was wounded in the forehead with Prince Peter from the battle field to the King's headquarters for fresh instructions.

## Has Recovered Consciousness

Mrs. A. W. Martin and her family were gladdened last night by the receipt of a message from Bell Island containing the welcome news that her daughter who was hurt on Thursday last by a fall over the stairs at the residence of Mr. Miller, had recovered consciousness during the afternoon. The poor girl suffered from severe concussion of the brain and though not yet out of danger the physicians hope she will ultimately recover. The many friends of the family in St. John's will be delighted to hear this good news.



## A POLITICAL BARNUM.

Evidence comes to hand daily that the Premier's picnic to the Districts was far from the political success he would have us believe. The people themselves are amazed at the inflated press messages of proceedings they saw with their own eyes and which in no way warrant the reports sent in by the Picnickers. It is a far cry from La Scie to Burgeo. But the story from both places is the same. The people themselves showed no enthusiasm for the leader of the misnamed People's Party. At La Scie the people were cold and unresponsive, the few flags and guns displayed were confined to a few Tory supporters, while the visit has left the people more resolutely liberal than they

ever were. The Tory party leaders are driven to desperation at the sight of the ground slipping from under their feet. Still they are hoping against hope to recover the ground they know they have lost. They know the tide of public feeling is running heavily against them, but surely they cannot deceive themselves to the extent of believing that they can change the tide of public feeling by sending press messages of the nature of those sent from the districts of Burgeo and La Scie. Look at the statement sent from La Scie. It is unworthy of a Barnum press agent.

The spectacular feature of the Premier's tour was that at nearly every meeting he had an old age pensioner near him with his pension in his pocket. After four years association with the Tory Party, Sir Edward is reduced to the role of a showman in his effort to win back his waning popularity. Evidently he is harking back to the dreams of the long ago. Fifteen years ago he saw the possibilities of the Tory party for show purposes in a speech delivered in the West End Hall on October 5th, 1897. He developed the showman idea on the Tory Party of that day, saying, "There never was gathered together such a menagerie, and if Barnum were only alive to buy them out there would be a fortune for him that would put Klondyke in the shade."

Now if Sir Edward had confined his message to his own political stunts, or to those of Mr. Mott, whom he took round with him, and who was an original member of the Political Menagerie on whom Sir Edward dilated in 1897, we should have raised in objection. But the exhibition of old age pensioners as "the spectacular feature" of his tour is even unworthy of a Barnum. To-day we publish a letter from Burgeo which deals with Sir Edward's reception there and the Ramscable, which is apparently well worthy of a place in the Morris show. The letter tells much the same story of the indifferent welcome accorded to the Picnic Chief, who has forgotten to reduce taxation, to cheapen coal, to attend to the housing of the people, or to make it easier for people who work to live.



Supreme Court.

(Before the Chief Justice.) The Grand Jury were called, and were addressed by the Chief Justice on the matter of the charge of murder against Clara Wheeler. It is charged that the accused murdered her three months old baby. When the Chief Justice had concluded his address the Grand Jury retired to consider their verdict. The Grand Jury is composed of the following:—Isaac Morris, foreman, John March, Wm. Frazier, Thos. Buckley, Tasker Cook, Arthur Hiscock, Wm. F. Kiely, John Maunder, H. Macpherson, J. V. O'Dea, William Campbell, Patrick Wadden, William Casy, Henry Blair, John Donnelly, David Baird, Chesley Woods, J. H. Thomas, John B. Mitchell, Archibald Gibb.

After the jury had retired the case of Kalem Noah vs. Karl Ryding was resumed. Mr. Noah was in the box and was cross-examined by Mr. Hunt for the defendant. Two other witnesses were called. During the examination of the second witness the Grand Jury returned to Court and their foreman announced that they had found a true bill for manslaughter. The Chief Justice pointed out that he had placed the matter before them as calling for an indictment for murder. The Magistrate had committed the prisoner to trial for murder, and that under the circumstances appearing upon the depositions, he had no alternative but to charge on an indictment for murder. It was, however, now for the Attorney General to deal with the indictment as found.

The Deputy Minister of Justice moved that the prisoner be arraigned tomorrow. The Court rose till 3 o'clock.

The Tory Axe Falls

LONDON, To-day. The attitude of Ulster on the Home Rule question and the position of Bonar Law, Leader of the Unionists, becomes important. Bonar Law spoke of possibility of an irreconcilable Ulster during the debate of the Parliament Bill last year. "If the people of this country decide they will make an experiment of Home Rule then and here I must certainly part company with some of my honourable friends in this House, and with some of those who supported me in the constituency. I represent, I should say I believe in representative Government, and however much I dislike it, you cannot compel the United Kingdom to keep up the present arrangement against their will and I should say to loyalist Ulster you have got to submit. This is contended here, deprives the signers of the Covenant of Unionist support if authority of Home Rule Parliament is refused recognition. The Daily Telegraph referring to persistent rumours in political circles that the Government is negotiating with John Redmond in the hope of finding a way out of the Ulster impasse, says the suggested basis of compromise is to give Ulster the right of exemption from some provisions of the Home Rule Bill under certain conditions. It is said some agreement has been reached.

Terrible Happenings

MAX MISTAKEN FOR BEAR SHOT AND KILLED LAST EVENING NEAR BADGER BROOK. Late last night the Reid Nfld. Co. had a message from Badger Brook to the effect that a man named Walter Laver who had been working at Grand Falls was accidentally shot by another man named Thomas Langdown, of Badger Brook, while in the woods 4 miles east of Badger Brook. According to the message received by the Reid Nfld. Co. the man was mistaken for a bear and he shot at him twice, the two bullets entering the body presumably in vital parts. When the author of the awful affair discovered his mistake he was terrified. The injured man was taken by lumbermen to Badger where he was placed on board a freight train which came along and rushed to Grand Falls where he was placed in Hospital there and the doctors of the place did all they could for him. The bullets fired into him were of 45.70 calibre, the largest used in any rifle. This morning Magistrate Fitzgerald had a wire from Grand Falls apprising him of the death of the unfortunate man. Langdown was placed under arrest. Walter Laver stable Fred Churchill. A post mortem will be held on the remains and Magistrate Fitzgerald goes out by this evening's train to hold an enquiry into the sad happenings.

The average breakfast food consists mainly of flageeeg work stuffed with pure, fresh air, and when followed up persistently will reduce obesity faster than an electric belt.


