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



But Colonel Driscoll, D.S.O., is use to hard work, of the kind which would wear an ordinary man down in a nonth. In South Africa he is known as "the man who sleeps with one eye open"; and so stupendous is his present task that it is a wonder that he is able to sleep at all.

A representative of Answers managed to secure from him, in a hurried interview, the following facts: "The War Office has just given me permission to raise a battalion of

1,000 men for active service against

the Kaiser's forces in Africa. "When I tell you that the men have to be good rifle shots, to begin with, and must be able to pass an exceptionally severe medical test, and that the corps is expected to leave England in a few weeks' time, you will have some idea of the magnitude of my task. A good many of my old scouts,' who served under me in the Boer War, have joined me. One offi-

cer reached me yesterday who had

The Largest Sailing Yacht.

Boston, April 30 .- A yacht of far ore than ordinary interest is schediled to be launched at the yards of George Lawley & Sons, of Neponset, Mass., to-morrw. The vessel was designed by Wm. Gardner & Co., of this city, for Alex, Smith Cochran, the enhusiastic yachtman, who defrayed the expenses incidental to building and racing the America's Cup defence candidate, the Vanitie, last year.

The new vacht is to be christened the Sea Call, and she is the largest sailing yacht ever built in this country. She is a three-masted schooner yacht, with a water length of 150 feet and an over all length of 215 feet, while her beam is 32 feet 8 inches, and she draws 18 feet.

The Sea Call will be equipped with a special intervale combusion motor of eight cylinders and developing 400 horse-power at 250 revolutions per minute. All materials entering into the construction of this sailing yacht and her motor are specially selected as being the best for their respective purposes, and she will be the most important addition to the great fleet of American yachts in many years, bar-

ring cup defence yachts. The Sea Call is to be used by her owner for long off shore cruises and ocean racing. Mr. Cochran owned and raced the schooner Windward, which won practically every event in which she started in European waters.

"BULLS" IN PARLIAMENT.

There is nothing, perhaps, which nembers of the House of Lords and the House of Commons enjoy so much as a "bull," one of those quaint nconsistencies of speech involving a contradiction in terms, which is all the more ludicrous because it is ut

tered quite unconsciously. Not long ago Mr. Bonar Law brought under the notice of the Lower House a "bull" of more than ordinary proportions when he spoke of "the habit of the Government in letno things drift until they ru against some precipice which brings

them to a standstill." Sir Edward Carson, when making an attack on the Government some time ago, remarked that "Mr. Asquith was like a drunken man walking along a straight line—the farther he went the sooner he fell," while it was also Sir Edward who referred in cordial tones to "the gentleman I

see behind me." Mr. F. E. Smith, on one occasion, in discussing the Parliaments Act with its famous preamble, referred to them as "twin Bulls, the younger of which has not yet been born," an Ulster member being equally humorous when he said, "We have to go back centuries for a parallel to such treatment, and even then we don't find it." Mention of Ulster reminds Mr. J. C. Percy, to whose book, "Bulls and Blunders," we are indebted for these amusing examples of Parliamentary metaphors, that a Northern politician is responsible for saying that "with one voice Ulster would lift up her head and stamp out the outrage."

Mr. Ramsay Macdonald once refered in the House of Commons to the empty grave where all our ruined ndustries lie," and it was another Irish member who, speaking of a question about which there had been much discussion extending over a long period of time, remarked, "If you leave this question to us for three years, we will settle it to-morrow morning."

Probably the champion mixed metaphor on record is that attributed to an Irish member, who is said to have accused the Government of "killing the fated calf which lays the golden eggs," while the House rocked with laughter, when a member, denouncing a Bill he did not like, said, "Si: I intend to drive the last nail into the coffin of this unborn babe."



LONDON, May 5. The Governor, Newfoundland: General French reports that the line in front of Ypres, which required readjustment owing to the loss of ground through the enemy's use of asphyxiating gases, is now successfully completed. The new line runs west of Zonnebeke. A half-hearten enemy attack northeast of Ypres was easily beaten off.

The French Government report continued progress in the region of Steenstraat. Three enemy attacks were repulsed in Champagne and advance was made in the Argonne.

The Russian Government report the Black Sea fleet vigorously bombarded the forts on the Bosphorus. In Galicia the enemy succeeded in crossing the right bank of the Dunajec, where Russian fire prevented further advance in the direction of Striji. The fiercest battle continues, the Russians caturipng 1,200 prisoners. HARCOURT.

DARDANELLES LANDING.

CAIRO, May 5. Some of the British troops who took part in landing at the Dardanelles, have arrived in Egypt. They are the first men to reach here from the scene of fighting, and they relate some striking incidents in connection with the landing of the Allied forces at the Straits. At San Ban the men were so eager to get ashore that they jumped from the small boats before they had been beached, and found themselves up to their necks in water. TRANSPORT SHIPS.

During the last six months transport vessels with their freight of troops, guns and provisions have steamed to and fro across the Channel with the regularity of clock work. At the outbreak of war hundreds of ships which were commandeered for this purpose, cargo-boats, cattle boats steamers and emigrant vessels being pressed into service. Each transport has been fitted so as to carry horses, guns, motor-cars, aeroplanes, and the hundred-and-one necessities of war which are required on the Continent. Great cranes on the quayside hoist the guns, with their waterproof covers, on to the transport, and they are firmly stacked in the hold with other heavy objects where weight does not perceptibly interfere with the balance of the ship. When possible, horses are led on to the transports through covered-in gangways, but those who prove vicious are coaxed into a wooden cage and are slung on board by cranes. Each horse on the vessel is placed in a narrow stall only 2ft. 5in. in width. It is not possible for the animal to lie down in his narrow prison, so, to provide the horse with some means of esting his legs, a canvas sling like a hammock is placed under his body. On this the animal can rest his whole weight and can sleep without falling.

The captain of a transport has to convey the troops on board safely to their destination, and there his responsibility ends. The feeding of the soldiers is in the hands of the Covernment, who supply the food and drink necessary for men and horses during the voyage. A military commander sails with every transport and controls the troops. In the present war the troop-transports cast off from the English shore with little excitement or fuss. There is no shrieking of sirens, playing of bands, or crowds of hand-waving friends to give the ships a "send-off," when voyages considerably longer than that cross the Channel had to be nego-

ORIGIN OF WAR TERMS.

With the exception of shrapnel, amed after its inventor, an English colonel, there are very few war terms now in use which have a British

origin. Sword, musket, grenadier, dragoon are all alien terms. "Grenadier" is generally supposed to come from the French. The word is, however, of German birth, and originally was "grenatier," the force owing their name to the hand-grenades with

which they were armed. The word "musket" has an Italian derivation-"moschetto," which was really a species of small sparrowhawk. In ancient times and in the Middle Ages the name musket was used to designate a small mortar

which threw arrows. When gunpowder was invented small cannon was baptized "musket." and later the rifle of the ordinary infantryman earned the name, while the whole unit was called "musketeers.'

Both "dragoon" and "cuirassier" come from the French. The dragoons had a dragon painted on their shields, and the cuirassiers carried a breast-protector made of copper-in French "cuivre."

"Hussar" comes from the Hungarian word "husz," which means "twenty." The force derived its name from the fact that long ago every twentieth recruit in Hungary was placed in one of the mounted regiments.

Turks. It comes from the Turkish word "oglan," youth. "Sword" comes from the Polish word "szabla," and "pistol" from the Italian town Pistoja, which was fanous in the Middle Ages for its arms factories.

The Uhlans owe their name to the

The bayonet takes its name from the French town Bayonne, where the inventor lived some 125 years ago. "Howitzer" is derived from the Czech word "houfinice," a wooden apparatus used in ancient times for the purpose of throwing stones. We meet with the word also in the Hussite war in the fifteenth century, where the weapon figures as "hau-

The officer's rank of major was derived originally from the Spanish word "mayor," signifying great or high.

Even "war" itself springs from a foreign source, coming down with the Italian and Spanish "guerra," and the French "guerre" from the old Ger-


