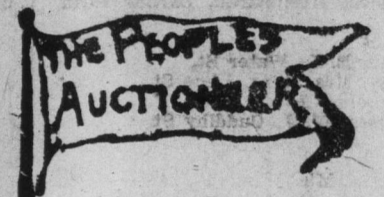

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

#### OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Jan. 17. The Governor, Newfoundland: The British bombarded Lille enemy trenches and gravely damaged them. Two heavy explosions were caused near Het Sas.

Austrians report that the Montenegrins, after the fall of Cetinje, retreated on the whole south and west front. Spizana was occupied. The Montenegrins are stubbornly resisting in Berane.

The enemy delivered two night attacks northwest of Gorizia, and in the second penetrated some Italian trenches. They were thrown back by counter-attack the next day.

#### WILL REMAIN IN ENGLAND.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17. A cable from London this morning to the New York Herald, says: I am informed that the report that the Prince of Wales will not return to the front, because the heir to the throne has recklessly exposed himself to the enemy, is unfounded, and that it is true that during the King's convalescence he may be retained here for public duties, usually performed by his father. He will rejoin the army in France, where his bravery and simplicity have made him the idol of all ranks, as soon as the King has completely recovered from his recent accident.

#### IRELAND AND CONSCRIPTION.

LONDON, Jan. 17. Irish members in the Commons made an appeal to-day for the inclusion of Ireland in the provisions of the bill for compulsory military service. A motion to this effect was made by James Chambers, of the Southern Division of Belfast, supported by James Craig, of the Eastern Division of Down. Both Chambers and Craig argued that the stigma placed on their countrymen by the terms of the bill should be removed. They appeal to John Redmond, leader of the Irish

Nationalists, to attempt to induce his followers to support the bill covering Ireland. If they would do so, the speaker said, all opposition to recruiting in Ireland would disappear.

Bonar Law, Secretary for the Colonies, who is charge of the bill, expressed regret that Redmond had not been able to take the suggested course. If they attempted to force the bill on Ireland, he said, the Nationalists would have been driven into uncompromising hostility. In view of the admitted division of opinion in Ireland, Law believed that any attempt at force would result in losing more than was gained. He added, it is a great thing to know that for the first time in history, official representatives of the Irish party are openly and avowedly with us in the conduct of the war.

Sir Edward Carson advised Chambers, in view of Law's speech, not to press his amendment, which, he said, would merely delay the bill.

Redmond said the simple fact was that conscription in Ireland would be unworkable and impossible. To include Ireland under the bill, he said, would be to place her into the hands of a contemptible minority of Nationalists in Ireland, who are trying to prevent recruiting and undermine the Irish party. Redmond said recruiting in Ireland had been most satisfactory, and in towns, even amazing. Anyone who, five years ago, had predicted such a result, would have been regarded as a lunatic.

After further discussion, Chambers' amendment was negated without a division.

#### "THE MYSTERY OF AN M.P."

LONDON, Jan. 17. Under the heading of "The Mystery of an M.P.," the Express asks what Francis Neilson is doing in America. The Express states that he had not appeared in the Commons since August, 1914. He went to the United States on a six months' health tour, but his constituents have learned that he was able recently to address meetings at Providence, Rhode Island, Brockton, Mass., and other places, and that they take exception to some of the statements he is reported to have made at these meetings.

#### BULGARIANS SUFFERING FROM LACK OF FOOD.

PARIS, Jan. 17. The Bulgarians at Gyvegi and Dorlan are suffering greatly from lack of food, according to information published by the newspaper "Patrie" of Athens. A squadron of French aeroplanes, according to the same correspondent, bombed the Bulgarian camps at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon, causing several fires.

### Limited Engagement.

**SPANISH STEAMER SUNK.**  
LONDON, Jan. 17. The Spanish steamer Belgica has been sunk. Twenty-three of the crew were saved.

**BELGIAN STEAMER ON FIRE.**  
VIGO, Spain, Jan. 17. A wireless call for help has been received from the Belgian steamer Lille, which reports that she is on fire, 195 miles off this port.

**PEACE MISSION RETURNS.**  
THE HAGUE, Jan. 17. The American members of the Ford peace mission, except those associated with the permanent peace board, sailed from Rotterdam, Saturday, aboard the steamer Rotterdam for New York. About one hundred and fifty persons sailed, while thirty remained at the Hague for the purpose of promoting peace plans as originally devised.

#### FROM BERLIN.

BERLIN, Jan. 17. The King and Government of Montenegro on January 17th asked for a cessation of hostilities and opening of peace negotiations, is officially announced by the Austro-Hungarian headquarters to-day.

#### Fourteen Killed in C. P. R. Smash

Brandön, Mann., Jan. 12.—Hidden from sight in clouds of mist and steam, a C.P.R. work train was this morning struck by an eastbound freight. In the caboose of the work train a gang of railway workers, all foreigners, was crowded, and into this mass of men the locomotive of the freight crashed. Fourteen were killed outright, three were fatally injured and twelve more or less seriously injured.

The work train, which had dumped its load of snow into the river, was backing into the yards, out of which an eastbound stock train was running. Thirty men of the work train gang had crowded into the warm caboose for the trip back, and no one saw the oncoming freight.

As for the freight engineer, his vision was limited by the mist and steam, and it was not until he was within twenty yards of the work train that he saw the caboose loom out of the fog. The heavy locomotive smashed into one end of the caboose, while a fat car on the other side of it reared up and cut through the other end. The men inside had no chance to escape, and were either killed or badly injured.

The shock scattered bodies around the tracks, and before they could be rescued, many had suffered additional injury from frostbites. The temperature was 47 degrees below zero, a biting cold which would create bad frost bites in a few minutes. The injured men were hurriedly carried into a caboose, run in on the next track, and rushed to the hospital. Here three of them died shortly after admittance and some of the others are in a critical condition.

The material damage included only the caboose and two flat cars, with slight damage to the freight locomotive.

No responsibility has yet been placed for the accident. An inquest will be opened to-morrow.

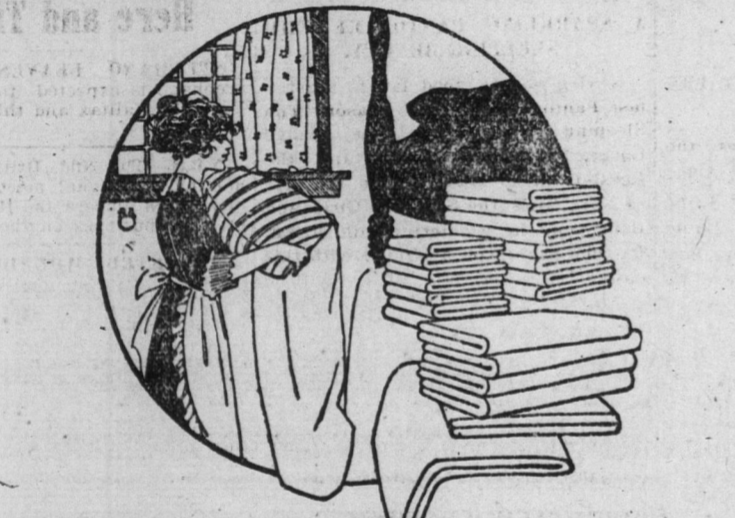

Germans Lost 25,000 IN BLOODY BATTLE ON SUNDAY, SAY PRISONERS.

German Artillery Failed to Accomplish Task of Silencing the French Batteries. Paris, Jan. 12.—The Germans lost more than 25,000 men in the Sunday onslaughts against the French lines in Champagne, according to Chalons despatches to-day, which describe the battle as the bloodiest on the western front since the allied offensive last September.

Great numbers of wounded German prisoners have reached Chalons. The confessions of the report that General Von Elmen planned to break through the French line and bend back the whole front from Rheims to Verdun.

The prisoners complained that the German artillery failed to do its work. Instead of silencing the French batteries, the German guns only wrecked portions of advanced French trenches. The heavy bombardment lasting for nearly twenty-four hours, gave ample time for the French to hurry up reserves to meet the attack.

Without giving the enemy time to fortify the newly conquered positions, the French swept forward in a fast-moving charge that regained practically all the lost ground.

Handfuls of bodies of German soldiers were found in the first-line trenches, and between the first and second-line trenches.

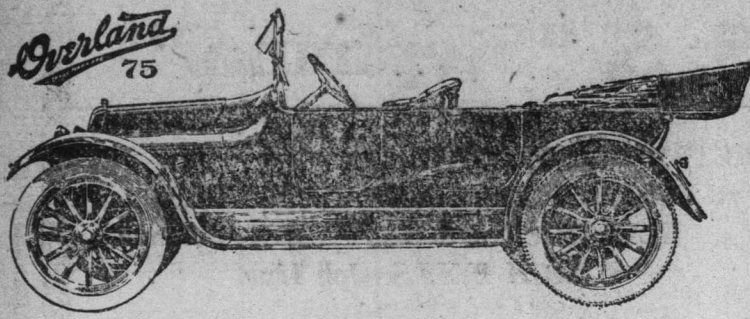
