



### THE BALKANS.



y be the work of individual genius.
Whether that be so or not, the developments that continue to follow one another do not tend to diminish the impression of a unified control of the very highest order. The latest one, the initiation of the great Balkan drive, comes at a time when it will have the maximum effect; when Austria has been thrown off her balance by the side to side buffetings of Russia and Italy and will probably suc-cumb to a central attack of any pow-

ut it is not Austria who we think will be first or most seriously concerned. We venture the sweeping pro-phecy that the moment this new offensive assumes the formidable ex-tent of which it is capable, we shall hear of peace overtures of no tenta-tive or indefinite tone from both Turkey and Bulgaria. The only thing that will restrain them and keep them very long in the arena is the consciousness that the terms of their exit must necessarily be costly and humiliating. Turkey in particular is in a most difficult position, being faced with an alternative choice of increasing evils. She had from the begining evils. She had from the begin-ning nothing to gain by her interfer-ence except the doubtful blessing of German domination, but she commit-ted herself to a cause from which it would be disastrous to withdraw un-til compelled to. That is an event which cannot now be long delayed. Bulgaria may be in a slightly better case, for she is quite capable of ridding herself of her unpopular ruler and by completely changing sides buying for herself more favourable terms than a defeat in the field would

prose upon her.

Greece is in the throes of an election result in the return to power zelos and the abdication of King Con-stantine. Not merely the friendliness but the active military assistance of Greece will be the outcome, to be fol-lowed, if it has not been preceded, by that of Roumania. All this must be becoming more plainly evident to the two junior partners in the Teu-fonic firm. It is as yet only the probable course of events still to come, but it is foreshadowed in the military operations that seem to be at last

They began a week ago north of Salonika and have now extended from Monastir, in Serbia, to the Vardar River, a distance of about sixty miles. River, a distance of about sixty miles. At the proper time the considerable Italian army in Albania will strike in concert: it has been kept there all this time for the same purpose as the great garrison at Salonika. It is hard to see how the small Bulgarian army can express effective registered to see can oppose effective resistance to so large a force, capable of attacking from so many points; for it can evi-dently count on little or no support from Austria or Germany. It would be foolish to build exaggerated and premature hopes on the position, but it cannot be denied that it contains possibilities which, if they materialise, will almost in the twinkling of an will almost in the twinkling of an eye alter the whole military prospect and shorten by many months the duration of the war. If Turkey and Bulgaria can be isolated, they can be counted out. Their severance would of itself be a terrible blow to Germany and Austria, who draw valuable supplies from the Sultan's empire and the copper mines of Serbia, but it would further open the way to an invasion of enormous power of southern Austria, which that country would be quite unable to repel,

After a rerusal of the document cit ed Count Melgar wrote the following: Such atrocious words made the first breach in my admiration for Germany A few days later I read in an evening paper a speech delivered by the Kaier to his soldiers in which he delared that he had learned that two French military doctors had entered Metz and poisoned the garrison wells with cholera microbes. Then I understood that such a man was not merely cruel, but a shameless liar and calumniator. I also had an opportunity of learning of the grief of the Russian Ambassador who told one of his friends how, in an interview with the Emperor Francis Joseph, hel declared his government ready to make impotrant concessions to avoid war. To his prayers the Emperor yielded, authorizing him to telegraph to St. Retersburg (now Petrograd) that all danger of war was averted. Next morning the Russian Ambassador was sent for by the Austrian Emperor, who told him he was obliged to take back his word, as Kaiser Wilhelm had telegraphed him as follows: 'If Austria is afraid, Germany fears nobody, and, to burn the bridges, I have just declared war on Russia.' This revelation compelled my conversion. I felt sure that Kaiser Wilhelm sion. I felt sure that Kaiser Wilhelm instead of being an instrument of God,

## TO-DAY'S

## Messages.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

President Wilson to-day laid his plan for averting the threatened railway strike before the employee's committee, and having found the managmittee, and having found the managers' committee adamant to his proposals that they accept an 8 hour day, he appealed to their Presidents and asked them to come to the White House for a conference. There is every indication that if the railroad Presidents sustain the Managers, President Wilson will appeal finally to the financial powers which control the roads, for it is his purpose to deal with the ultimate authority before he gives up his effort. The President's plan is expected to be formally accepted by the employe's committee meeting to-morrow morning, with the proposed 8 hour day as a basis for computing the wages and regular pay proposed 8 hour day as a basis for computing the wages and regular pay at the 8 hour day rate for overtime, and to refer all other collateral issues to a small commission to be created by Congress at which the employees of railroads and the public will be represented. The acceptance of the proposal by the employees, is forecast by the expression of their leaders after they left the President's conference. One of them declared the men would be fools not to accept it.

For the first time in weeks change of importance is reported in any theatre. On Thursday the most wislent fighting took place at the Western end of the British salient on the Somme. Six times the Germans advanced in force in a desperate effort to bend back the British lines northwest of Pozieres. Something of mystery exists as to the situation on the Eastern front. For two consecutive days the Russians confined themselves to brief statements fhat nothing of importance had occurred. The Austrian and German War Offices had been almost equally uncommunicative. The only fighting mentioned by Vienna was the repulse uncommunicative. The only fighting mentioned by Vienna was the repulse of Russian attacks on the lines of General Von Bothmer, who is in command of the Teutonic forces retiring from the Tarnopol front. Berlin reports the repulse of Russian attacks south of Brody. The lull in the Italian operations against Trieste is unofficially explained from Rome as due to the general offensive against the great Austrian seaplanes again raided Venice, but Rome says they caused only slight damage.






