The size of the waves of the At- Price \$1.20; postage 20c. extra. lantic ocean has been carefully ascertained as a result of extensive investigations made by the officers of the hydrographic office of the United States Navy Department. In height, we are assured, these waves usually average 30 feet, but in rough weather they will attain some 40 to 48 feet. During storms they are frequently from 500 to 600 feet long and endure 10 to 11 seconds. The longest wave measured by the hydrographic office officials was half a mile, and it did not spend itself for 23 seconds.






