Britain's Naval Policy.

"One Power Stand" to be Maintained -- Blockade of Kronstadt Will be Enforced--Stormy Weather on Atlantic Reported--France and Australia Have Lady Legislators.

BRITISH NAVAL ESTIMATES.

LONDON, March 14. British naval estimates for 1921 amount to ninety-two million, an increase of eight hundred and eighty-two thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine pounds, gross, or eighty-two million four hundred and seventy-nine thousand pounds, net. It was announced by Lord Lee, First Lord of the Admiralty, today. In a statement explaining the estimates, Lord Lee said they were based on the Government's policy of maintaining a "one power stand" in the world. The Admiralty had estimated that the cost of maintaining a fleet of seventy-nine thousand men, and four destroyer flotillas of the Atlantic fleet, the reduction of the North American and South African squadrons by one light cruiser each, and the temporary withdrawal of the high American squadron and the reduction of the personnel of the fleet to fifty thousand men. These changes were dictated almost entirely by the need of economy, according to Lord Lee, and make it incumbent on the Admiralty to maintain the reduced fleet in a state of highest possible efficiency. In pursuance of this policy the battleships armed with twelve inch guns now in reserve will be transferred to the disposal list. The number of capital ships on the effective list will thus be thirty.

ADVANCING ON POLAND.

STOCKHOLM, March 14. A correspondent of the Arbetarbladet says to-day that eighteen to twenty divisions and aviation corps are advancing against Poland in the districts of Smolensk, Vitebsk, Orsha, Mohilev.

U.S. AND GREECE.

ATHENS, March 14. The retirement of Edward Cappa, United States Minister to Greece, yesterday, is interpreted by royalist circles as the first step toward recognition of King Constantine by the new United States Administration.

BOLSHEVICS ARRESTED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 14. The Allied police have arrested the Bolshevik executive committee here.

THE SILESIAN PLEBISCITE.

BERLIN, March 14. Despatches from Upper Silesia continue to reflect optimism with respect to the plebiscite, which takes place a week hence. Partisan difference have been submerged temporarily by the German population in a common endeavour to save the wealthy industrial section for Germany.

CONGRESS MEETS APRIL 11.

WASHINGTON, March 14. The United States Congress will be called into special session Monday, April 11th, Senator Lodge announced.

WILL BLOCKADE KRONSTADT.

LONDON, March 14. Leon Trotsky, Russian Soviet War

REPARATIONS BILL PASSES.

LONDON, March 14. The House of Commons to-day passed the second reading of the Reparations Bill with divisions.

CONDITIONS NORMAL AT HAVANA.

TORONTO, March 14. The Canadian Government Merchant Marine is in receipt of information from Havana, Cuba, pointing out that conditions are now satisfactory in that port. As a result the National Merchant Marine is planning to resume its regular service to Havana and expects to clear one ship from a Canadian Atlantic Ocean port on March 20 and the second probably about April 10th.

STORMY ON ATLANTIC.

NEW YORK, March 14. Indications of exceptionally rough weather in the North Atlantic sea lanes, was given in a wireless from the Olympic to-day stating she would be delayed twenty-four hours in reaching here.

A LADY DEPUTY.

PARIS, March 14. Mile. Cordiller, President of the Municipal Council of Paris, and J. L. Bonnet, representing the Bourgeois element, were elected to the Chamber of Deputies in the bye-election yesterday.

ORPHANS FOR CANADA.

WARSAW, March 14. It is purposed by delegations of the Jewish Relief Workers here from Canada to transport immediately two hundred orphans for adoption in Canada.

LADY M.P. IN AUSTRALIA.

PERTH, Australia, March 14. Mrs. Gowan, candidate in the state elections, has defeated the Attorney General for his seat in Parliament. She is the first woman elected to the Australian House.

ANTI-JEWISH DISORDERS.

VIENNA, March 14. Anti-Jewish disorders, which broke out here last night, threatened to develop a serious situation, but the police succeeded in scattering the crowds and preventing possible loss of life.

ASSASSIN CONFESES.

MADRID, March 14. Ataneo Pedro Mateo, Anarchist, was arrested to-day and, according to the police, confessed to the assassination of Premier Dato on Tuesday night. He gave the names of alleged accomplices. Former Premier Salazar has succeeded in forming a new cabinet to replace that of Premier Dato.

A SLAP AT McADOO.

OTTAWA, March 14. That the McAdoo award to the railway men was one of the most iniquitous pieces of legislation ever foisted on the United States, was asserted by Hon. F. B. Carroll, Chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners, addressing the members of the railway club at their weekly luncheon here to-day. Mr. Carroll said that the award was never based upon business or sound economics, but simply to get votes and even in that it failed.

MORE WAGE REDUCTIONS.

NEW YORK, March 14. Marine workers employed on ferries, tugs, barges and other floating equipment of railroads in New York Harbour will be asked within the next four days to accept wage reductions ranging from fifteen to twenty-five per cent, it was learned here to-night.

UPRISING REPORTED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 14. An uprising is reported to have occurred in the Kuban region of the Caucasus, the Bolsheviks having withdrawn the ninth Soviet army, which was sent to Georgia and the eighth army, which is busy suppressing revolts in Ukraine.

Nfld. Produce Held at North Sydney.

TWO HUNDRED CASES SALMON AND LOBSTER SEIZED BY OFFICIALS. North Sydney, March 7.—Some two hundred cases of lobster and salmon, valued at about \$4,000, have been seized at North Sydney by officials of the Fishery Department. The seizure was made on Saturday on a quantity of goods arriving here from Newfoundland for use in the United States market. The shippers, it is claimed, have violated certain provisions of the Meat and Canned Goods Act. The Act provides that all such shipments of lined goods shall be labelled with the name of the packer, and the exact weight of the contents. This provision, it is said, has not been carried out by the Newfoundland packers. It is also illegal for merchants to display canned goods unless they are properly labelled. The goods are being held here pending a decision by the Fisheries Department as to their disposal.

The ice was in excellent condition thanks to the cold spurt still prevailing. Punctually at 7.30 p.m. the first item on the varied programme.

THE GIRLS' HOCKEY GAME

was started by Mr. Hubert Rendell, who was referee. This game which was between the Reds and Blues, both of which teams had already played twice—each side winning a game—ended in a draw, the final score being 2-2. The game was a most exciting one and the girls deserve great credit for being the pioneers in abandoning the off-side rule which, as they say, is rather a nuisance at times. The referee was not quite used to this new rule and occasionally blew his whistle for off-side but after a little practice he will probably become well acquainted with it. A tendency to hit at the puck and miss was very noticeable and some of the players seemed to have formed the habit of throwing their sticks about without the slightest provocation, an action which becomes distinctly annoying when it causes a player of one's own side to fall over it. A bit of rough play was also in evidence but nothing of a really serious nature occurred to mar the game. Only two penalties were handed out, but the referee was very lax in this respect. The game was played in two fifteen minute periods.

THE FIRST PERIOD

Harbor Main Election

The returns of the election contest in the District of Harbor Main came as a surprise yesterday morning, but not to the Opposition. The work done in that district by the latter party meant that a clear gain would be made by supporters of the cause, and expectations were not without realization. Though returned by smaller majorities than in the general election of 1919, the Opposition has won a victory without parallel in the annals of political history in Newfoundland. All the weight and influence of the Government were thrown into the scale, but it is noteworthy that the free and independent electors could not be cajoled by promises or bluffed by threats into voting for the candidates of the Government. All the weight and force of political and sectarian influence was flung into the scale in an effort, on the part of Government henchmen, to turn the popular tide in favor of their party. But Harbor Main would have none of it. Electors there were determined that the domination of Coaker should cease, and that the North should no longer run the South and West.

The Government made a supreme effort to win. All the forces, all the promises, all the threats at its disposal, were employed in an attempt to gain two seats for the Coaker-Squires element. Tactics of the most vile quality were resorted to by both the Advocate and Star. Personalities were indulged in, to the dishonor of these newspapers, which were of such a nature as would do no discredit to the anti-British publications of Hearst. Griffin and others were utilized in behalf of the Government, and nothing in the way of vilification of opponents was left undone in order to induce a big vote for Messrs. Hawco. Special editions of the Star and Advocate, reeking of the vilest journalism, were circulated broadcast through Harbor Main District in the hope of influencing the voters to cast their ballots for the Government candidates. The style of the journalism employed was most satanic and meretricious, and proved conclusively that the men behind were animated only by the most fiendish efforts in behalf of their party. The Coaker organ, after all its bluff and bluster, falls down on the result, and the only thing it can do is to congratulate Messrs. Fury and Hawco on the clean and honest fight put up by these gentlemen, and condole with them on their defeat. That is as was expected, for neither of the Government candidates nor the Government organs put up a clean fight. That was beyond them. But Harbor Main replied, and showed both Mossell and Mews, not forgetting that "lean, hungry Cassius," where they got off, when it came to a clear showdown, as between Coaker domination and independent administration.

New Passenger and Freight Service.

Mr. E. A. Payb, Secretary of the Board of Trade, had a communication yesterday from Capt. Edwards, Senior Trade Commissioner for Canada and Newfoundland, at Montreal, stating that he had been informed by the Canada Steamship Line, that they were contemplating arranging a passenger and freight service between this port and Montreal during the summer, as well as running first class passenger and freight service between St. John's and Boston. The Company proposed placing the steamers Kamarino and Manda, on these routes, and they feel confident that the service would meet with the approval of the travelling and commercial public. The Kamarino and Manda are both large liners, and are splendidly fitted out with first class passenger accommodation as well as having a large freight capacity. At present the Canada Steamships are operating the Manola between this port and St. John's, N.B., giving two trips per month during the winter season. Under the new arrangements the Company will run a ten day service, which with the up-to-date passenger service, will no doubt increase our tourist traffic during the summer months.

From the Fleet.

Ranger.—In large sheet ice; difficult to get through; all ships in sight. Terra Nova.—Position 40 miles N.E. of N. of Funks; a goodly number of old seals in water. TO JOHNS BROTHERS. Neptune.—Position 45 miles N.E. of Funks; ice very heavy and difficult to get through; all ships in sight; saw a few belandiers and old harps; all well. TO REID COMPANY. Sagona.—Position 42 miles N.E. by E. of Funks; Eagle, Neptune, Thetis, Diana and Seal close by; Terra Nova 10 miles N.W. by N. Ranger 12 miles astern; ice very heavy scattered seals in water; all well. TO POSTAL TELEGRAPHS. Cape Ray advises Viking reports all well; no men on ice. Fogo reports fleet all well.

Not Ready Yet.

SEALING PLANE STILL HELD UP. According to messages received recently from Botwood, the proplaine which was to have gone to the seal-fishery, is still not ready for a flight nor will be for a few days. The necessary spare parts which were taken down by special train, have not yet been fitted, although two mechanics have been on the job for some time. It is very doubtful if the plane will ever see anything of this season's seal-fishery, as, with luck, the fleet should strike the whitecoats to-day or tomorrow.

The session on Sunday afternoon was a very successful one, and was thoroughly enjoyed by all present. The chief item was an address by Mr. J. J. McKay who took for his subject, "Scotland's national poet, Robert Burns." In a very interesting and impressive manner he showed the reason for the great love and veneration which all Scotchmen have for the memory of Burns. The Class hopes to hear Mr. McKay again in the near future. A very pleasing solo was rendered by Mr. A. E. Stansfield. Both gentlemen were thanked for their courtesy and help by the president, C. F. Scott. Next Sunday the annual meeting will be held and the election of officers for the ensuing year will take place. The meeting will be conducted by the associate teacher, Mr. I. C. Morris.

Law Society Arranging Dinner.

At a recent meeting of a committee of the Law Society appointed to make arrangements for a dinner, it was decided to hold the affair during the second week after Easter. As the Bar has amongst its members some excellent singers as well as the ablest speakers in the country, it is certain that the members are in for a most enjoyable and edifying evening. It is many years since the members of the legal profession have come together at such a gathering, and it is hoped that the affair will become an annual event.

The First Fruit of the Change.

PORTUGUESE FISH CONSUMPTION INCREASING. In view of the fact that the Fishery Regulations for Portugal have been abandoned, the unfished stocks posted at the Board of Trade Rooms today should be convincing proof of the assertions made that Coaker's fishery policy was ruining our markets. The report received to-day shows that for the first time in fifteen weeks the consumption of Newfoundland fish in Portugal has been greater than the Norwegian. During the past six months the Norwegian consumption has at times nearly trebled ours, but with the abandonment of the regulations the position is getting back to normal, and from now onward the Newfoundland consumption will beat its competitor.

Tells of a Thrilling Trip From Archangel to Tromsø. Vancouver, B.C., March 10.—There were twenty of us in the party and we each had a rifle and our ammunition supply was 2,000 rounds each. We had three Lewis guns and 5,000 rounds for each. The occasion was a trip made by twenty Britishers from Archangel to Tromsø in the days of the North-Russian expedition. We stood off 210 "Bolsheviks" en route for three days.

Police Court.

The postponed case of a man charged with the offence of some harassment was heard before Mr. J. McCarthy, J.P., and Mr. J. Sullivan, J.P., this morning. The prisoner being fined \$10. The case of receiving stolen property, previously postponed, was further postponed until to-morrow.

Hockey Notes.

There is great excitement in hockey circles to-day over the Tie Cup final which will be played to-night. The Terra Nova has already been beaten twice by the Feldians but their supporters are very optimistic concerning their chances of bringing off the Tie Cup. NEW YORK, March 14. Stanislas Szyszko of Poland, three-time champion wrestling champion, here to-night in three hours sixteen minutes, with crotch hold and wrist lock.

RUSSO-POLISH AGREEMENT.

LONDON, March 15. Poland's share in the gold of the Russian State Bank has been fixed at thirty million rubles by treaty between Russian representatives and Poland, which is virtually complete, says a Riga despatch to the Times. The sum will be payable in billion. The Poles endeavored to have time limit fixed, but the matter was referred to the Moscow Government. Another thirty million of gold rubles are to be paid by the Russians in return for surrender by Poles of their share of Russian rolling stock.

FOR DOMINION NAVIES.

LONDON, March 15. An Admiralty memorandum on naval estimates, referring to the naval policy for consideration at the coming Imperial Conference, says the lines on which it is proposed to proceed are toward development of Dominion Navies under the administrative and executive command of their own officers, each navy being responsible for its own government but all working under the guidance of a common doctrine to ensure intelligent cooperation.

PARIS, March 15. Germany was yesterday called upon by the Allied Reparations Commission to carry out Article 235 of the Treaty of Versailles, which stipulates that Germany must pay, before May 1, 1921, the equivalent of twenty billion gold marks. The Treaty provides that payment must be in gold commodities, ships' securities, or other valuable. The Commission must be notified before May 14 next of the total amount of war demands imposed on her by Treaty.

BLOODTHIRSTY RESOLUTION.

VIENNA, March 15. The world-wide war on Judaism was contemplated in a resolution passed at the closing session of the Austrian anti-Semitic Congress here yesterday.

LOSING CONTROL.

STOCKHOLM, March 15. Russian Bolshevik authorities seem to be losing control of Soviet troops it is said in despatches received here from Finland and Estonia. A man arriving from Kronstadt last night, denied the fort had been captured by Bolsheviks. Refugees reaching here from Petrograd say the streets are strongly patrolled by Soviet troops and ordinary Bolshevik soldiers cannot be trusted.



Atlantic Waves Measured.

The size of the waves of the Atlantic ocean has been carefully ascertained as a result of extensive investigations made by the officers of the hydrographic office of the United States Navy Department. In height, we are assured, these waves usually average 30 feet, but in rough weather they will attain some 40 to 48 feet. During storms they are frequently from 500 to 600 feet long and endure 10 to 11 seconds. The longest wave measured by the hydrographic office officials was half a mile, and it did not spend itself for 23 seconds.

CONCRETE SHIP MEETS DISASTER ON MAIDEN VOYAGE.



Permanencia, the first sea-going vessel of the kind ever constructed in Canada, finally came to an end when the craft, on her way from St. Pierre Sunday night on a voyage to New York with a cargo of 3,000 barrels of Newfoundland herring, struck on Flatts Point, at the extreme southwestern end of Little Miquelon Island, and is now a total loss.

On the 15th of January she sailed from here for Fortune Bay, Nfld., but ran into a series of gales that swept the coast at that time and which caused the wreck of several staunch craft. Household Notes. Tuna fish may be flaked with a fork. Ham is delicious baked with sweet potatoes. Roast beef is sometimes served with baked bananas also. The broom cover which opens up one side is a handy possession. Celery and almonds are often used together for a dainty salad. Sauces in which cornstarch is used should be served immediately. After jelly roll cake has been rolled, to keep firm, roll in a cloth. Four eggs are used to four cupsful of milk for plain custard. Turnips are usually thickly peeled, as the rind is hard and woody. Never use weak, watery eggs for cake making; a poor cake will always result. Boiling water poured over yeast destroys its vitality; use lukewarm water. After apple fritters have been drained, sprinkle with powdered sugar. Old nightgowns make excellent closet coverings for suits and evening dresses. Stale cake can be sliced very thin and used to line a mold for a gelatine mixture. Use fine granulated sugar for the cake, as powdered sugar makes a dry cake. When boiling white fish add a little vinegar to the water to keep it white and firm. Remove stubborn varnish with liquid varnish remover and a sturdy scraper. A teaspoonful of walnut paste is a savory addition to the gravy for a burg steak. Cut new potatoes into dice or balls, cook until tender and serve potato soup. If vegetables are set to cook, boiling water the flavor and nutrients properties are retained. Cored apples are delicious with walnuts, sprinkled with cinnamon and baked. For Easter surprise the kiddies with tempting cakes baked in egg pans and coated with icing. Do not have fat in the pan when pan-broiling meat, or the meat will be sauted, and not par-broiled.

Assassination of Julius Caesar.

The greatness of Julius Caesar, like Gaul, may be divided into three parts. First, he was a great general; second, he was a great statesman; third, he was a great author. There have been men who have excelled him in one or two of these departments, but never one who excelled in all three. Caesar's military genius is hard to parallel. He had all the qualities of a great soldier—forethought, decision, rapidity of movement, calmness in the face of danger, and great personal bravery. He was singularly careful of his soldiers, and was idolized by them. Perhaps Wellington and Napoleon approached nearest to him as a soldier. But Caesar was also a statesman, and as such he belonged to the popular party. He was a good orator, speaking not for show, but to promote reform and better government, and he succeeded in passing a series of laws mainly for the protection of the common people against the aristocracy. Our Iron Duke, ever victorious on the battlefield, made but a poor figure in politics. Again, Caesar was a great man of letters. Most of

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his writings are lost, but we have his history of the war in Gaul. This is a model of what history should be. He does not praise himself or his exploits, but narrates everything with clearness and simplicity. Such was the man whom a group of eminent Romans murdered because he was too great. The deed, of course, required a lot of plotting, some notice of which reached Caesar's household. If not himself. According to the belief of the time, a dozen supernatural occurrences added their warnings, but Caesar, the least superstitious of men, disregarded them all. On the 15th March, B.C. 44, he went into the senate house and took his usual seat, and the conspirators immediately surrounded him. One caught his gown and dragged it off his shoulders, another stabbed him in the throat. He looked round, and seeing nothing but a ring of daggers pointed at him, among them one held by his familiar friend, Brutus, said, "And you, too, Brutus." Then drawing his gown over his head and arranging his dress orderly, he fell dead. The Romans soon repented of what they had done, and all the conspirators came to miserable ends. Weighing up Caesar's character altogether, we may truly say, "This was the noblest Roman of them all."
