stately homes. Certain new national flags also deart from established usage. In general, the designers use only red, white, blue, yellow, and black, and strictly observe the laws of heraldry. If, for instance, you want to have yellow in a flag, you must, to be in order, have black also. The correct combination appears in the Belgian flag. But the new Belgian Royal Standard sets tradition and usage at defiance. It is purple, with a gold shield in the mid-

dle, surmounted by a crown. Some of the new national flags, moreover, are distinctive without being indicative. They have been created in nearly as haphazard a fashion as were many house flags in our mer-

A good instance is the "duster" of a certain firm. Originally this was the Red Flag of St. George, which is identical with the flag of an admiral in the navy. One day the admiral commanding a certain station saw in the harbor one of the firm's ships fixing its house flag, whereupon he sent a message to the captain, ordering him to remove it immediately. The skipper had to obey, but he was not defeated. Twenty minutes after the flag had been down, it was run up again, with a blue silk handkerchief sewn in the middle, and this was afterwards the louse flag of the firm as long as it existed.

Wel-known national flags were not created in this casual manner. When Napoleon made Italy a kingdom, he decided to have a flag which, while distinctive, should indicate, by its close resemblance to that of France. the source to which it owed exist green, white, and red. This flag, hough suppressed on the downfall of Napoleon, was revived by the Italian Nationalists, in 1848, and, with the addition of the arms of Savoy, accepted by the King of Sardinia as the ensign of New Italy

Perhaps the most elaborate, and therefore most perplexing, national flag is that of Tibet, because, apart from the main design, which is curiously complex, the spaces in it are filled up with alternate triangles of

The Canadian Government is considering the most suitable design for the Canadian national flag for use ashore. The Canadian flag now authorized is used by the Governmentowned vessels and other vesels on the Canadian registry. In the former case the flag is the Blue ensign with the Canadian arms in the fly, while merchant vessels on the Canadian registry use a similar Red Ensign. Some years ago it was provided that the Red Ensign, with the Canadian arms in the fly, be flown over the office of the High Commissioner in London as well as over Canadian offices abroad, but the flag was never authorized.

ust. This term is meant to include various organisms growing in water, some of which are at times highly disagreeable. When these are present the water becomes murky and discolored, often slimy, and sometimes has a highly offensive odor. In such cases, the fish flee from their erstwhile home, which has become so inhospit-

The author tells us that such development of water organisms occurs in certain parts of Germany regularly year after year, and is responsible for the death of many fish, tho it is uncertain whether the active cause is the absorption of the free oxygen in the water by the life-processes of the plants or the formation of a poison by products of the plankton.

When the evolution of these organisms is rapid, it may even cause mortality among fish overnight. Among these are the so-called "verdigris" algae and filaments, which disappear as suddenly as they come, perishing after a few weeks, sinking to the bottem in the form of slime and giving off evil-smelling gases (sulfureted hydrogen) which are destructive to fish. The matter is aggravated in bodies of water where the water-fern is present, since algae settle among its fronds, and when they die form sticky duction of oxygen and its acceleration or retardation is also dependent upon certain meteorological factors. namely, currents of earth magnetism and earth electricity evoked by heat and light. To quote again:

Most important of all is irradiation by sunlight or its cessation in cloudy weather, so that when the weather is continuously clear, the amount of oxygen in the water undergoes a constant increase, whereas in continu ously gloomy weather there is apt to be a poverty of oxygen

A more or less considerable portion of the dissolved oxygen, finally, is used up by the water in the process of biological self-purification. By this we mean the process by which masses of water burdened with putrescent organic substances gradually lose them. This self-purification is due to the activity of certain organisms consisting in the disintegration of complex organized substances by the vital processes of oxygen-loving bac eria, which make use of the oxygen ontained in them. This process is no means confined to sewage, but everywhere purifies natural waters. The amount of oxygen enployed in his purifying process is various, deending upon the amount of organic natter contained in the water. Hence water overloaded with organic substances has its oxygen supply impovrished and this results in the death of both high and lower forms of aninals dwelling in it. When this proess results in a total loss of oxygen, the aerobic bacteria entirely disapare not only able to dispense with

nities of a very peculiar character, ropels occur in many waters as a result of the lack of oxygen, especially in ponds into which the sunlight can not penetrate because of a thick covering of bladderwort. The anaerobic bacteria which compose this slime decompose the organic matter at the bottom of the water, evolving at the same time sulfuretted hydrogen. When there is a violent atmosphere disturhance, such as is caused by a summer thunder-storm, this temporary alteration of atmosphere pressure allows the bubbles of sulfuretted hydrogen to rise from the mud in which they have been held, the result being that both the fish and the water itself are pois-





A Lucky Cinder

The cinders and any other solids carried by the gases hit the baffle plate and fall into the water at the bottom of the tank; at the same time the gases which enter the tank horizontally are deflected downward by the baffle plate, are forced to pass along the surface of the water at the bottom of the tank, and

Partridge Cookery

Like all game birds, partridges when young should be plainly roasted, garnished with watercress, and served with brown gravy, browned crumbs, bread sauce (if desired), and a green or an apple and celery salad. Old birds, however, may be converted into most desirable dishes, such as:

Partridge Hot-Pot-Two partridges, 2 to 3 sheep's kidneys, 1 onion, 1 gill of stock, salt, pepper, 1 dozen ovsters. 6oz. of bacon, loz of butter, 11b. of potatoes, parsley.

Pluck, draw, and clean the birds and cut into neat joints. Skin and slice the kindneys. Peel and chop the onion and slice the potatoes thinly. Grease a casserole with the butter. Place a layer of bacon at the bottom. then put in layers of partridge, onion, kidneys, bearded oysters, and seasoning. Pour in the stock. Put more bacon on the top and cover all with the potatoes. Melt the remainder of the butter and pour it over the potatoes. Cover with greased paper and bake in a moderate oven for about two hours. Remove the paper. Sprinkle chopped parsley over the potatoes, and serve in the disn in which it was cooked.

Patridge Mousse-Two partridges, 1/2 gill of brown sauce, 2 eggs, pinch of nutmeg, pepper, loz. of butter, 3oz. of ham, 1/2 gill of cream, 1 tablespoonful of mushroom ketchup, salt, 3 gills

of tomato sauce. Remove the meat from the uncook. ed partridges and skin. Put the meat through a mincer with the ham. Pound it in a mortar with the butter. Add the eggs one by one, and the brown sauce. Rub through a wire sieve. Add the mushroom ketchup and nutmeg. Whip the cream and stir in lightly. Season well. Put the mixture into greased moulds. Cover with greased paper and steam for about I hour. Turn on to a hot dish and goat with tomato sauce.

New Rights for Mother CONSENT TO MARRIAGE NEEDEN

(By Arthur S. May.) The equalization of the sexes h now brought about a consideral change in the law relating to marriage of a imnor.

Since the passing of Lord Ha wicke's Act in 1753, such a marriag has required the consent of father only, so long as he lived, was a right of which none could a prive him, however unfitted he mig e to exercise it.

The Act directs that when one the parents cannot be asked to con sent owing to "absence, inaccessible ity, or some disability," the conse of the other may be sufficient. Man-Made Static

The following list of causes adio-interference, with advice or suggestions for their elimination, has een compiled by the Radio Committee of the National Electric Light Association. Our quotations are from Radio Retailing (New York). The Committee places direct-current arclight circuits at the head of its list, and has this to say of them:

The direct-current arc-type street lights are frequently the cause of disturbance to radio listeners. The most likely causes of interference from arc-lights are grounds, connections and lamp-jumping. The first two rarely occur, and are easily found and fixed. Lamp-jumping is usually due to one of the following three causes, and can be easily repaired: 1. Broken, chipped or loosefitting globes. 2. Broken or loose flexible-connection-strip from upper electrode to upper electrode box. 3. Broken flexible connection cable to movable clutch-rod.

Street Lights Using Rectified Alternating Current - Mercury-vapor tubes for rectifying alternating current for street-lighting system sometimes cause radio interference. The vacuum in these tubes changes occasionally, and boiling in water is done to restore the vacuum to the proper point. When these tubes are properly repaired, static disturbances are reduced to a minimum.
