



A large number of Jersey cattle fanciers from different parts of the union attended the sale, and secured one or more of these fancy cattle, but the largest purchases were made by Col. U. S. Russell, of Milton, Mass., and W. K. Vanderbilt, of New York. Col. Russell beught ten head which cost him \$14,310. One of the bulls bought by Col. Russell, (Sir George, by Guy Fawkes), was knocked down to him at \$5,100, which is the highest ever paid for a Jersey. He also bought the cow "Mabel II," by "Koffee," for \$2,100. W. K. Vanderbilt bought eight head, which cost \$5,650, or an average of \$706.25 each.
