TALKED OF 'SCRAP' AND 'PIG' AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE CANADIAN "PUDDLED BAR"

By increasing the duty on scrap iron to 83 Per Cent--Increase of the Pig Iron Output Under Protection--The Cause Carried--Export Duty on Logs Asked.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 4.--Early in the afternoon the House went into Committee of Ways and Means and proceeded with the discussion of the duties on "metal and manufactures of metals." First was taken up the item of scrap iron and steel, the duty on which was proposed to increase from 25 to 83 and after Jan. 1, 1895, to 87 per cent.

Hon. Mr. Foster explained that the Government had met a very general demand for a lessening of iron prices and the problem to solve was to make the commodity cheaper without destroying the iron-producing industry of the country. The Government therefore adopted in part a system of bounty that would compensate for the reduction in bar iron and steel.

Hon. Mr. Laurier claimed that nothing so well illustrated the fallacy and danger of the protective principle than this very increase in the duty on scrap iron. Here the Government had gone to work and reduced the duty on agricultural implements from 25 to 20 per cent, and at the same time increased the duty on raw material, the scrap iron, against the original duty upon which there had been complaints in plenty.

Hon. Mr. Foster was sure the leader of the Opposition was mistaken. The manufacturers of agricultural implements did not care a hill of beans about the duty on scrap iron. The duty had been lowered on all the material they used, pig iron, bar iron and steel. The only people who had any ground for complaint were the rolling mill owners.

Mr. McMillan complained of the system of taxing the consumer of this description of raw material, rather than by a bounty given out of the general fund, making up the difference to the pig iron producer. 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AN INSURANCE CO. OF HIS OWN

A BRAMPTON HIGH-ROLLER LODGES IN TORONTO JAIL. William Hunter Charged With Defrauding the Manufacturers Accident Insurance Co.--Numerous Cases Preferred Against Him--Not the First Time His Name Has Been in Trouble of the Same Kind.

Hunter was agent for the company at Brampton and it is charged that he filled out an application for Ed. Lawson of this city, and wrote out a premium for \$25 for a \$5000 policy, receiving in return from Lawson for the \$25. When the application was brought into the office the figures \$25 had altered to \$20, and it is charged that Howarth pocketed the difference. It is also alleged that in two or three other cases Hunter took premiums in December and sent them in dated in April, having given the insured a return receipt which rendered the company liable on risks for four months, while they were not in receipt of the premium.

Hunter, some three years ago, skipped to California, being behind with the Waterloo Mutual and other companies. He had sureties then and these people had to pay \$10000. He had borrowed money in various places and a good deal of it is still unpaid. People have been expecting Hunter would be looked up for several weeks back. Four months ago the Phoenix of Hartford did charge him. Although he had not the agency Hunter had no trouble doing business, and it is claimed he took several risks, conducting a kind of insurance company himself. The people paid their money but got no policy. It is claimed that there are nearly 50 cases in which he was either paid for new insurance and gave no policies or "squeered" the renewals, and that two score people are out various amounts, from \$5 to \$30. Of late, Hunter has, it is claimed, been a high roller in the limited scale. He was born on a farm and subsequently taught school. He then went into the insurance business, and from within 100 lbs. developed into a handsome man of 270 avoirdupois. He is \$70 in arrears with the Manufacturers. It is claimed that he played future business to pay the policies until recently.

A SLOW TRACK AT WOODBINE.

THE COMBER MURDER.

Lindsay Dies From His Wounds—Attempted Suicide of the Murderer.

COMBER, Ont., May 4.—Constable Lindsay, who was shot by Truskey last night, died this morning at 4.30 o'clock.

In his ante-mortem statement, he said that Truskey opened fire without saying a word. Truskey, the murderer, shot himself while being pursued by the officers of the law.

He was located in his own woods and stood behind a brush heap and with revolver in hand defied the officers.

The officers demanded him to throw up his hands, but he refused. Whereupon the officers fired several shots and advanced.

Seeing that he was being overpowered, he pointed his own revolver to his left breast and fired. It is thought he is mortally wounded.

ANARCH FERRARA GETS 20 YEARS.

Police, who turned Queen's Evidence, Let Off With Two.

LONDON, May 4.—In the Central Criminal Court, Old Bailey, today Joseph Ferrara, the Italian anarchist, who pleaded guilty yesterday, was sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment at hard labor.

Francis Patti, his companion, was found guilty and sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment. After his sentence was pronounced Ferrara shouted "Viva la Anarchia!" His voice once seized by the court officers and removed.

He struggled hard to free himself, and endeavored to make a speech, but was prevented.

Police cried out "Shame," and added, "To-day you make the law, but to-morrow we will make them."

Before the prisoner pleaded Mr. Murdoch moved to quash the indictment on the ground that it was not specific in its allegation of the offence. The motion was overruled and Parkes entered a plea of "not guilty."
