



If an arc light is required for an hour only subscribers should have the privilege of using it for that hour and paying for the current actually con-sumed during that time. The two companies have so arranged the business that this is impossible. If the city were to establish its own system the same wire would light the streets with arc lamps, sup ply the new City Hall, court houses and all the city buildings with incandescent lights, and the public could draw their supply of the same kind of lights m the same source. 



pipal Officers' Salaries Exempt—The Law to Continue in Force Five Years Only.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The text of the amendments to the Tariff bill which Mr. Vest reports from the Senate Committee on Finance to-day is as follows: Sections 59, 60 and 61 are stricken ou and the following sections substitute

"There shall be levied and collected a tax of two per cent. per annum on the net profits or income above ordinary working or operating expenses of all banking institutions, trust companies, savings institutions, insurance companies, railroad, canal, turnpike, telephone, telegraph, express, electric light, gas, water, street railroad companies and all other corporations.

"The tax to be paid before July 1, and if the chief officers of any corporation and the chief officers of the chief of th

"The tax to be paid before July 1, and if the chief officers of any corporation shall neglect to file a statement verified, showing the amount of net profits or income, the corporation making default shall forfeit \$1000 and 10 per cent. of the amount of the taxes due from each month until the same is paid.

"That nothing herein contained shall ap-ply to municipalities, nor to charitable or religious corporations, nor to building and loan associations."

There are 23 additional amendments, designed to remove certain objectionable features and lessen the stringency of the

The limit of the time during which the law shall be in operation is fixed at from Jan. 1, 1895, to Jan. 1, 1900.

In computing income there shall not be included the amount received from any corporation, as interest or dividends, if the tax of 2 per cent. has been paid upon its net profits by said corporation.


