THE HERO OF BISLEY.

THE QUEEN'S PRIZE-WON BY A CANADIAN VOLUNTEER.

Private Hayhurst, of Hamilton, Ont., Wins a Great Victory—A Close Contest—Career of the Hero.

Private Hayhurst, 13th Battalion of Hamilton, at Bisley, won the Queen's prize, Her Majesty, the Queen's prize consists of the N. R. A. gold medal, the N. R. A. badge and £50. It is the Mecca of all British marksmen. It is hope of winning it which has been the hope of every young shot in the Motherland and receives his drooping courage when the butt of his rifle has blackened his eye, brushed his shooting or other work most quenched all desire to become expert. The man who wins it is the hero of the town, city or village in which he is born. His return to his native place is made the occasion of a monster celebration. His name is never forgotten, and the first thing his neighbors say of him is, "He won the Queen's prize." It is shot for in three stages, divided over four days. The first stage includes the 200, 300 and 400 yards ranges. On the second Monday of each week the competitors fire at the 200 and 300 yards ranges, seven shots at each. On Tuesday following seven shots are fired at the 600 yards range. On the next Thursday the second stage is decided. Ten shots are fired at the 100 yards range, the last day of the meet, the final stage is decided. Then ten shots are fired at the 300 and 400 yards ranges. The competitor making the best aggregate, of course, takes the Queen's prize. The total amount of prize money given in the match is £2,400.

When the one hundred men left in the final stage went to the butts on Saturday, Hayhurst was nine points behind the leading man, Sergt. Hogg, who had 205 to his credit in the first two stages. This aggregate won for Hogg the N. R. A. silver medal and silver badge presented to the competitor making the highest aggregate in the first and second stages.

The final stage on Saturday was shot under great difficulty. The wind blew a perfect gale from the left, and it rained hard throughout the shooting.



PRIVATE HAYHURST.

The splendid scores of the competitors were therefore surprising. Hayhurst's score at 300 yards read: 5, 5, 5, 3, 4, 4, 5, 5, 4, 4, and at 400 yards 5, 5, 4, 5, 5, 3, 5, 3, 3, 3.

Additional excitement was lent to the contest from the fact that Boyd, of the 3rd Lanarkshire (Scotchman), Hayhurst's score of 275, when the contest was drawing to a close it was seen that Hayhurst and Boyd were scoring equally, although it was generally expected that in the end Boyd would win by a few points. When, however, the last shot had been fired, and it was announced that the competitors had tied, the excitement rose to fever heat. Every other range and target was deserted. The crowd around the mound, from which Hayhurst and Boyd were firing their tie, was enormous, but very quiet.

Private J. H. Hayhurst is not a native Canadian. He was born in Kendal, Westmoreland, Eng., in 1863, and is now 28 years of age. The family is a name of the only other child being his elder sister, at present a nurse in a hospital in London, Eng. Private Hayhurst received a good common school education, after which he was brought up to the trade of tool making. After arriving at more than ordinary proficiency in this branch of industry, the young Englishman left home and went to the United States. For the greater part of a year he visited various parts of the Union, but did not settle down permanently anywhere. Finally in June of 1888 he came to Toronto, where he took employment with the Bowman Company.
