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
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



EUROPEAN CONDITIONS

A recent report of the British Federal Department of Commerce states that the German Merchant Marine has recovered all its prewar trade routes. This includes the re-establishment of the old German line to Australia which restores "the final link in the great chain of ocean trade routes controlled by Germany in the Spring of 1914."

This is a cold statement of facts facts from an authority which can be neither accused of bias or suspected of propaganda

Facts of this kind ill accord with the pitiful cry set up in Germany of inability to meet war obligations and make reparation for destruction of property and injury done defenceless peoples daring the late war.

France held out that Germany should make reparation. The stories of industrial decay, loss of money and man power must, to a considerable, be discounted heavy as they were. Germany did not experience the fate of France whose finest industrial sections were ruined and whose industries are as yet only partially restored. The war closed with all German industrial establishments practically uninjured by bombs or shells. Germany, of course, must have trade re-developed to successfully handle the problems with which the nation has to deal, but it was certainly not expected that she should so soon regain control of her old sea routes. Germany, while whining about her inability to make reparation, has been steadily reconstructing and developing her industrial fabric, while she looks on a portion of the world still filled with strife, the aftermath of the war which drenched Europe with blood and untold miseries, the effects of which will endure through many years. The author of these surrounded by the ruins of her own creating develops her strength industrially and financially, while dissension, misery and unrest fill the countries which were pawns in a game of which the stakes were so tremendous. These facts coupled with Christian nation dissention permits the Turks to remain but a partially and infrequently curbed blot upon civilization. Britain alone of all the nations will make any active movement for the principles of right and equity without the positive assurrances of material advantage. Even in the land of our own Uncle Sam only sporadic protests against barbarities are heard. The United States might have remedies many an injustice had she accepted a mandate for Armenia, but philanthropic work of a National character involving any possibilities of warfare is not a part of her National program.

REMOVING WRECKS IN BAY OF FUNDY

St. John, N. B. The Marine and Tisheries Department has just comleted the removal of several dangerous wrecks from the part of the Bay of Fundy under the control of the St. John district with the exception of one wreck, that the schooner Jennie r. Merriam, near Peticodiac, all those which might constitute a menace to navigation have been cleared away.

The mast of the schooner Senator, which sank just outside of Chance Harbor, N. B., has been cut off leaving seven fathoms of water over the wreck at low tide.

The wrecks of the schooners Margaret and Flora, in the Point Wolfe Basin, Albert County, and the wreck of another schooner at Spencer's Island have been blown up and re-

The schooner Abbie Keast, wrecked at East Cove, West Bay, near Parrsoro, and beached there, was blown up to remove the danger of its floating out to sea and becoming a menace o navigation.

The wreck of the schooner Effie May at Tow Rivers, has been cleared

The wreck buoy on the schooner Jennie T. Merriam, which was burned at the mouth of the Petitcodiac River, nas been replaced and the Department is making preparations to have the wreck removed.
