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MINING NOTES (Continued.)

Archibald Blue, director of the Bureau of Mines, has returned from an extended tour in Western Canada. The chief object was an inspection of the Bothwell oil fields, where he spent a week. Mr. Blue said :- "The work of exploring the fields has been carried on much more intelligently than it was thirty years ago, when Bothwell was an old centre. At that time little was known either in Canada or Pennsylvania of oil in rich formations, and in Bothwell hundreds of wells were drilled outside of oil-bearing fields. Besides many of the well were bored far below the oil rock tapping the reservoir of salt water' the result being that the salt water has drowned the oil wells. Pumping operations were carried only during the six working days of a week and during Sunday the flooding of sait water was so great as often to necessitate active pumping for two and sometimes three days before the flow of oil resumed. Prospectors now are aiming to delimit the arch of the great limestone, which is the real oil reserve, and the borings already made show it to have a width of about half a mile by a length of about five miles.

The mining fraternity will doubtless be interested in the fact announced by the London Times, that an English syndicate has recently taken up an "ore atomic reduction process." The outcome of this undertaking will undoubtedly have an important bearing on more than one industry. Those concerned in mines are aware that one of the greatest difficulties of a mechanical nature which numers have to deal with, all things considered, is the crushing of quartz, especially of refractory ores, which, owing to the presence of iron pyrites, render the metal of excessive hardness-to deal with which enormous labor and expense have to be incurred. The new invention, it is claimed, does away with all the crushing and stamping and pulverizing, enabling a miner within an hour to reduce the hardest quartz to the condition of sand. and even of fine flour, without slime, and perfectly free from the various deleterious substances which are the enemies of the gold miner all the world over. An extraordinary point in this invention is that exthat it contains no metal.






Within eighteen months the New York and Brooklyn Railroad Company proposes to have a new avenue of communication between New York city and Brooklyn by means of a tunnel from the intersection of Broadway and Ann street to a point near Fulton and Orange streets, Brooklyn. Permission to construct the tunnel has been granted by the State Railroad Commission. The tunnel will connect with the Brooklyn surface roads by means of a double-track trolley road, which will have a carrying capacity of 12,000 persons every hour.

Of his recent extended study of the gold resources of South Africa Dr. Becker says that the Transvaal Republic contains the largest gold deposits in the world. Within fifteen miles of Johannesburg there is an amount of gold, practically in sight, estimated to be worth \$3,500,000, or nearly as much as the entire volume of gold coin now in the world. > A new rust preventative, known as mannocitin is being introduced into Canada by James W. Pyke, Montreal. It is described as a transparent compound, and, it is claimed, absolutely resists the influence of the atmosphere as well as saltwater the vapors of ammoniac or muriatic; never turns hard, but remains always slightly sticky; never leaves spots but preserves the brightness of the metal, which has been covered with it, leaving it like new after the mannocitin has been removed, which can easily be done in a few minutes by means of a few drops of turpentine. The article was introduced in Europe in 1892, and later in the United States where it is already extensively used.

While this enormous to'al has teen foreshadowed, the authority named mys there is the greatest disappointment in the quality of the product. _Complaint of failure to ripen and properly dry out is very general, and in some districts the quality is so poor that loss from heating has followed efforts to crib. While the trep is the largest ever grown, the amount of merchantable corn is probably less than was produced last year. The average rate of yield is 27.9 bushels shelled corn from an scre, a total of \$1,402.000 acres. Testimony points to an increased area soon to winter wheat, according to exhaustive returns to American Agriculturist, which siys that the condition of the plants are peculiarly uneven; that regular seeding *44 carefully put in; germination was promit, and while top growth is smaller than usual at this date, it is vigorous and promising, being practically perfect December 1. In addition a good many farmers seeded wheat when it become sparent that prices would rule higher, and the conducton of this extra seeding is relative. relatively less favorable, due chiefly to United States. THE U. S. BANKING LAW.

The Chicago national bank failure and the circumstances attending it furnish good ground for the inquiry, whether banking is any better carried on under Federal law and supervised by Federal officers than it is when it is governed by State law and supervised by State officers. The examinations of the National Bank of Illineis, made by directors of the United States Comptroller of the Currency, led to no steps for the benefit of depositors, and when the institution was finally discovered to be insolvent its doors were closed, not by orders from Washington, but by a resolution of the Chicago Clearing House. The purpose of subjecting banks to both periodical and special examinations is, it is true, not so much to remedy mischief after it is done as to prevent it by making certain the exposure of its authors. If the conduct of dishonest or incompetent bank officers was never scrutinized they would be much more reckless than they are. Even with the possibility of discovery that now threatens them they frequently violate the laws made to restrain them, and resort to fraud to conceal their wrong doing. fect as the service is which official bank examiners render the public, it is immensely better than none at all. The point is whether, to render it efficacious, they must be made under Federal law, or whether they cannot as well, if not better, be made under those of individual States.

The chief purpose of the National Bank act of the United States was to provide the nation with a unform and well secured bank currency. It is sometimes said that it was intended to secure a market for Government bonds, but the assertion is not supported by facts. Mr. Chase, to whom the country is indebted for the passage of the act, looked upon the Government legal tender notes as only a temporary expedient, and expected them to be retired and cancelled as soon as the war was ended. Rather than have their places supplied by the notes of many thousands of State banks, of more or less doubtful, solvency and bewildering in their variety, he wisely chose to create a bank currency that should be secured by the credit of the entire nation, and which should have undoubted and unquestioned credit throughout the length and breadth of the land. To this extent he succeeded perfectly. The United States never had so satisfactory a form of bank circulation as that of the national banks as now secured, and any attempt to substitute for it one wholly or partially secured by bank assets alone will be resisted by an overwhelming majority of the people.

On the other hand, Mr. Chase was wrong in supposing that the Government notes would be retired as soon as the war was ended. Pursuant to his advice, and in accordance with If the that of other eminent financiers, an

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extent of only \$44,000,000, the effect of it was so disastrous that the act was repealed without opposition from any quarter. Again, in 1875, the reduction of the amount of the notes to \$330,000,000 was directed by the Re sumption act of that year, and, like the former reduction, this, too, in 1868, was stopped by the unanimous vote of Congress after it had reached the amount of only a few million dollars. Again, in 1881, a withdrawal of \$17,000,000 of the notes brought about by the passage of the Carlisle Funding bill produced an alarm amounting almost to a panic, which was allayed only by a Presidential veto of the bill and its immediate abandonment. Three times, therefore, has the proposal to retire the Government currency been submitted to the people through their representatives in Congress, and three times have they by an overwhelming majority rejected 1t.

THE QUESTION OF COMPEN-SATION.

REDUCING PRICES.

The Carnegie Company has cut the price of steel rails from \$28 to \$25 a ton, according to Pittsburg dispatches. and the railmakers hope that the lower figures will prove much more attractive to railroad companies than the high figures did. The price was held at \$28 a ton in spite of the fall in pig iron, and the willingness of railmakers to sell rails for export in competition with English and German makers. The price was plainly unreasonable and the companies bought sparingly of rails, the consumption of which this year is said to be about 800,000 tons. Maintaining the price at a point out of all proportion to the cost of pig iron has kept the rolling mills idle a good portion of the time that they probably might have loon kept employed. The price was \$20 when the present pool undertook to put the figures up, and they were raised to \$23 under the influence of the extraordinary boom in iron in 1895. But when pig iron came down rails did not, and in spite of the dulk ness of the year now closing the price of \$28 was tenaciously insisted on.





THE SUGAR INDUSTRY.

The appointment of a Royal Commission to report on the West India sugar industry indicates the gravity of the commercial crisis that is upon the West Indian colonies. The beet sugar which comes from the continent of Europe has driven out the cane-sugar from the British market. the grocers and refiners to make a profit and undersell the British grown planters by granting them a bounty equivalent to that paid by other Governments on beet sugar, or by imposing a tariff on beet-sugar entering the United Kingdom, or by inducing the other Powers to abandon the bounty system. Since there is little prospect of stopping the bounty system, the Commission will have to recommend a British bounty or tariff. Both of these resources will be directly in the teeth of the Cobdenite doctrine of free trade. The special interest of the United States in this matter is that there is a widespread sentiment among the West Indian planters, in case the British Government should not give them relief, in favor of seek ing admission to the American Union.

THURSDAY, Dec. 31, 1896. The absence of snow and good sleigh roads is a serious drawback to trade in all branches. In city business circles the usual listless holiday feeling is prevalent. Fresh orders are few and far between and the staffs in many warehouses are seizing the opportunity to take stock and close up their books for the year. Collections are light but are expected to be moderately good in January as considerable cash has been taken in by the retail stores during the holidays.

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
