Parish Notes.

There will be no issue of the Magazine during the next two months.

The Chancel Guild begs to thank Miss Keating and Miss Wyatt for gifts of flowers for the Altar.

Special preachers during the month of June have been the Rev. H. H. Bedford Jones, the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College, the Rev. J. C. Davidson.

During July the Parish will be in the charge of the Rev. J. F. Rounthwaite and of the Rev. G. F. Davidson. In August, Mr. Rounthwaite takes a holiday which he will spend near Boston, and the Rev. E. C. Cayley will assist the Rector in the Parish.

On Friday, 16th June, the Sunday School picnic was held at Long Branch. The day was fine and cool, and about two hundred scholars and their friends availed themselves of the treat. All the children started by special car at 10.30 in the morning, and a lunch was given them in the pavilion on the grounds; tea was provided at 5.30, and by 3.30 most of the children were on their way home. The expenses of the picnic were \$46.75; towards which \$38 have been contributed.

The Synod of the Diocese met in Toronto on June 20th, and continued to sit for nearly a week. On each day lunch was provided for all the delegates, each Church having its special day and table. Wednesday was St. George's day, and the table was decked with roses brought by Miss Hagarty, who, with Miss Street and Miss Harman, waited on the Clergy. Among those at St. George's table were the Rector, Mr. Rounthwaite, and three former Curates of St. George's, now Rectors themselves.

R. I. P.

On Friday afternoon, June 9th, Mr. Lowe was laid to rest. Long before the service began people had gathered in the Church to look for the last time on his face, and by three o'clock the Church was nearly full. "His coffin was borne by eight priests, who had known and loved him, up the aisle of St. George's Church, into the Chancel, where he had ministered so faithfully for three years. The service was conducted by the Clergy of St. George's, and many

other priests came to show their respect for their brother who had gone. It was touching to see so many of the older Clergy present at the burial of a young priest. His body rests in St. James' Cemetery, beside the grave which contains the bodies of his father and mother, who have themselves been so recently called away."

Some beautiful wreaths and crosses were sent by members of his own Church in Calgary, and from friends here and from the ladies of his old Bible Class.
