Mr. St. Laurent, by leave of the House, introduced a Bill, No. 1, An Act respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office, which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, That when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, and to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy which is as follows:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

The first concern of Government in world affairs is to ensure peace and security. To this end, Canada continues to support the principles of the United Nations Charter. Our foreign policy is based on the realities and dangers of the existing situation. One of these is the Communist menace. Until the United Nations are able to provide an adequate guarantee of peace and security, peace-loving nations will also be obliged to seek security by combining their strength. The North Atlantic nations, including Canada, are negotiating a Security Pact. The Treaty when concluded will be laid before you for approval. The North Atlantic Treaty will supplement the Treaty of Mutual Guarantee signed by the Western European nations at Brussels last year. Such regional arrangements are provided for in the United Nations Charter.

Despite unsettled conditions and the disruptive activities of international Communism, the nations of Western Europe are making progress toward recovery. Aid from North America is contributing substantially to the restoration of economic activity, thereby increasing their ability to resist internal and external aggression.

At home we have been blessed with good crops. Industrial expansion is taking place at an unprecedented rate. There have been few differences between employers and employees leading to stoppages in work. Inflationary pressures are less pronounced. Employment is at higher levels than ever before. In striking contrast with Communist countries, the free economy of our country is demonstrating its ability to provide for all a high standard of living, social justice and individual freedom. It is the view of my Ministers that a steady advance toward the goal of social justice for all is an effective safeguard against the influence of subversive doctrines.

The people of Newfoundland, by a majority vote in a referendum, expressed their desire to enter Confederation. The precise terms of Union were subsequently negotiated with an authorized delegation from Newfoundland. You will be asked without delay to approve the agreement, signed on December 11, and to make provision for the entry of Newfoundland as a province of Canada on March 31. I am confident the Union will be of mutual advantage to Newfoundland and Canada.

Amendments to the Supreme Court Act to make the Supreme Court of Canada the court of last resort for Canada will be submitted for your consideration.

You will be asked to approve, subject to the approval of the United States authorities, the agreement concluded in 1941 for the Development of Navigation and Power in the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Basin.

You will be asked to make the further legislative provision necessary to implement the agreements for the sale of agricultural products to the United Kingdom.

With a view to assisting in the restoration of world trade, so vital to general security and our own prosperity, Canada participated in formulating the Charter for the International Trade Organization and the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, which will be submitted for your approval. Within the next few months Canada will engage in further negotiations with thirteen other countries to broaden the scope of the tariff concessions which we obtained at Geneva in 1947. The Government will continue to press vigorously for the lowering of tariff and other barriers and, as quickly as possible, the expansion of trade on a multilateral basis.

Meanwhile the Government is seeking to remove specific obstacles to the continued sales of Canadian products in our traditional export markets, and to that end is co-operating closely with the nations concerned in the implementation of the European Recovery Programme.

The Continuing Committee established by the Governments of Canada and the United Kingdom to review the progress of trade between the two countries is presently meeting in London.

In the interests of both domestic and foreign trade, legislation will be introduced with the object of promoting extensive and adequately safeguarded use of the national trade mark "Canada Standard" associated with goods which conform to prescribed standards, and of requiring proper labelling of goods to

prevent deception of the public.

Improvement in our United States dollar position has resulted in the removal of certain restrictions imposed in November, 1947. Further restrictions will be removed as the position improves. So long as trading and financial conditions remain unstable, a degree of control over foreign exchange will be required. You will, accordingly, be asked to extend the Foreign Exchange Control Act for a further period.

The Report of the Royal Commission on Prices will be laid before you as

soon as it has been submitted to the Government.

Your approval will also be sought for legislation to continue in force steel control and a limited number of price controls, including control over the rental of housing accommodation.

You will be asked to make legislative provision for governmental assistance by loan to the producers of basic steel for the purpose of increasing production.

The Governments of the provinces have been advised that the Federal Government is prepared to discontinue rent control in any province in which the Government expresses the desire to assume the jurisdiction.

The provision of housing has received and continues to receive close attention. More new housing units were provided during the last calendar year than ever before.

Your approval will be sought for the establishment of a Department of Reconstruction and Development to continue the functions now vested in the Department of Reconstruction and Supply, including the ministerial responsibility for the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

A measure for assistance in the provision of a transcontinental highway will

also be laid before you.

A Royal Commission has been appointed to enquire into and report upon all questions of economic policy within the jurisdiction of Parliament arising out of the operation and maintenance of national transportation. Together with the findings of the investigation by the Board of Transport Commissioners, the Report of the Royal Commission should furnish Parliament and the Government with the basis for a sound transportation policy.

The National Health Programme, inaugurated by the Government last year, is receiving co-operation from all the provinces. In supplementing provincial health measures, the programme has already made a contribution to the health facilities of Canada and will thereby bring increasing benefit to our people.

A Bill will be introduced to broaden the scope of the Family Allowances Act, as a further instalment of the policy of the Government to provide a national standard of social security and human welfare designed to assure the greatest possible measure of social justice for all Canadians.

The organization of the armed forces to provide for unification and co-ordination has been pressed forward. Steady progress has been made in the recruitment and training of officers and men of the active and reserve forces, so that the Navy, Army and Air Force may be in a position to meet the defence needs of Canada as these may change from time to time.

Conditions of service in the armed forces are being further improved, and as rapidly as the results of research can be adequately tested, additional equipment is being made available. Amendments to existing legislation with respect to the armed forces will be recommended for your consideration.

Other measures to which your attention will be directed include Bills respecting Forest Conservation, Overseas Telecommunications, the Control and Regulation of Interprovincial and International Pipe Lines, and assistance for the Canadian Shipbuilding Industry. Your approval will be sought for measures to amend the Industrial Development Bank Act, the Emergency Gold Mining Assistance Act, and the Prairie Farm Assistance Act.

It is the view of my Ministers that there should be an examination of the activities of agencies of the Federal Government relating to radio, films, television, the encouragement of arts and sciences, research, the preservation of our national records, a national library, museums, exhibitions, relations in these fields with international organizations, and activities generally which are designed to enrich our national life, and to increase our own consciousness of our national heritage and knowledge of Canada abroad. For this purpose the Government intends at an early date to establish a Royal Commission.

Members of the House of Commons:

You will be asked to make the customary provision for essential services.

Prosperous conditions now prevailing are being reflected in the buoyant level of national revenues; a condition to which due consideration is being given by my Ministers in the preparation of forthcoming budgetary proposals.

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

The birth of a son to Their Royal Highnesses Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh has been the occasion of widespread rejoicing. Happiness over the birth of the Royal Prince has been tempered by regret over the indisposition of His Majesty the King. The people of Canada hope and pray for the complete recovery of the King's health.

Since the close of your last session, Mr. Mackenzie King has retired as Prime Minister. I feel it is the hope of all Canadians that Mr. King will be spared over a long period and with less exacting responsibilities, to continue his distinguished and devoted service to Canada and the free world.

May Divine Providence bless your deliberations.

Mr. Speaker presented the Report of the Librarians of Parliament, which is as follows:—

To the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons:

The Joint Librarians of Parliament have the honour to submit their Report

for the year 1948.

The Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library of Parliament met on June 9, 1948, and made a number of recommendations in a report which was Tabled in both Houses and was adopted by the Senate on June 15, 1948, and by the House of Commons on June 23, 1948. These recommendations have been carried out, as follows:—

(1) Members of both the permanent and the temporary staff have received

increases in salary, effective from October 1, 1947.

(2) In order to expedite the work of recataloguing the library, another cataloguer and two more assistant-cataloguers have been added to the temporary staff.

(3) Certain duplicate material, and surplus to the needs of the Library of Parliament, has been donated to the Canadian Council for Reconstruction

through UNESCO.

The redecoration of the interior of the library was finished last Spring; and the installation of a new heating and ventilating plant, as well as a new fire-extinguishing system, have since been completed.

A vacancy on the permanent staff created by the resignation of Mr. Réal Gravel, Clerk Grade 3, has been filled by the Civil Service Commission with

the appointment of Mr. Bertrand Poulin.

The Supplementary Catalogue of books donated, purchased, deposited under the Copyright Act, and obtained through inter-governmental exchange of documents during 1948, is in course of printing and will be distributed as soon as complete.

It may be of interest to know that during the course of the year 863 works

(two copies of each) were received under the terms of the Copyright Act.

The General Librarian, as a delegate of Canada, attended the Third Session of the General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, in Beirut, from November 17 to December 11, 1948.

Mr. Drew, from his place in the House, asked leave, under Standing Order 31, to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, and stated the subject to be:—

"'War with Russia may be an outcome of the signing of the North

"Mr. Harris, Parliamentary Assistant to Prime Minister St. Laurent, foresaw the possibility of war when the pact is signed in about three month's time. 'If the Russians feel they must make war, it will come at that time,' he said;"

and the duty of the Government to place before this House immediately all the facts and circumstances upon which this statement was based."

Mr. Speaker decided that there was no urgency for the discussion, as the matter referred to by the Leader of the Opposition was mentioned in the Speech from the Throne, now under consideration by the House.

From this decision Mr. Drew appealed to the House.

And the question being put by Mr. Speaker: Shall the ruling of the Chair be sustained?—it was decided in the affirmative, on the following division:

The House then resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. St. Laurent,—That, whereas by a Memorandum of Agreement entered into on the eleventh day of December, 1948, between Canada and Newfoundland, the Terms of Union of Newfoundland with Canada were agreed to, subject to approval by the Parliament of Canada and the Government of Newfoundland;

And whereas the Terms of Union provide that they shall come into force immediately before the expiration of the thirty-first day of March, 1949, if His Majesty has thertofore given His Assent to an Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland confirming the same;

And whereas the Terms of Union have been approved by the Parliament of Canada:

A humble Address be presented to His Majesty the King in the following words:-

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty:

Most Gracious Sovereign:

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Senate and House of Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, humbly approach Your Majesty. praying that You may graciously be pleased to cause to be laid before the Parliament of the United Kingdom a measure containing the recitals and clauses hereinafter set forth to confirm and give effect to the Terms of Union agreed between Canada and Newfoundland:

An Act to confirm and give effect to the Terms of Union agreed Liveen Canada and Newfoundland.

Whereas by means of a referendum the people of Newfoundland have by a majority signified their wish to enter into Confederation with Canada;

And whereas the Agreement containing Terms of Union between Canada and Newfoundland set out in the Schedule to this Act has been duly approved by the Parliament of Canada and by the Government of Newfoundland;

And whereas Canada has requested and consented to the enactment of an Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom to confirm and give effect to the said Agreement and the Senate and the House of Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled have submitted an address to His Majesty praying that His Majesty may graciously be pleased to cause a Bill to be laid before the Parliament of the United Kingdom for that purpose;

Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows; 1. The Agreement containing Terms of Union between Canada and Newfoundland set out in the Schedule to this Act is hereby confirmed and shall have the force of law notwithstanding anything in the British North America Acts, 1867 to 1946.

2. This Act may be cited as the British North America Act, 1949, and the British North America Acts, 1867 to 1946, and this Act may be cited together as the British North America Acts, 1867 to 1949.

Mr. St. Laurent moved,-That, from and after completion of the debate on the Address in reply to the speech of His Excellency at the opening of the Session, government notices of motions and government orders shall have precedence over all other business except routine proceedings, introduction of bills, questions and notices of motions for the production of papers until the following resolutions and the legislation based thereon shall have been disposed of by this House, viz, (a) the resolution for a measure to provide for the continuation of certain orders and regulations of the Governor in Council for a limited period during the National Emergency arising out of the war; (b) the resolution for a measure to amend The Agricultural Products Act to extend the operation of the Act for a period of one year; (c) the resolution to amend The Canadian Commercial Corporation Act to provide authority for advances to the Corporation by way of loan out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund and to extend the time of operation of the Act; (d) the resolution for a measure to provide for the continuance in force of The Foreign Exchange Control Act until sixty days after the commencement of the first session of Parliament commencing in the year 1951.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Gardiner moved in amendment thereto: That there be added to the

motion the following words:-

"Provided that, notwithstanding the order of the House of the 21st February last, if the debate on the said Address is not completed at or before the end of this day's sitting, the order of business set out in this motion shall be followed on and after the 14th of March instant until the above-mentioned resolutions and the legislation based thereon shall have been disposed of by the House, and thereafter the said order of the 21st of February last shall continue to operate according to its terms".

We, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to offer our humble thanks to Your Excellency for the gracious Speech which Your Excellency has addressed to both Houses of Parliament.

And on the proposed motion of Mr. Drew in amendment thereto: That the following words be added to the said Address: "We respectfully submit to Your Excellency that Your Excellency's advisers do not possess the confidence of this House."

And on the proposed motion of Mr. Low in amendment to the said proposed amendment:—That the amendment be amended by inserting between the word

"Address" and the word "We", the following:

"We regret that Your Excellency's advisers have shown such studied indifference to the Social Credit financial proposals put before this House from time to time for bringing social security and freedom to every Canadian, and economic stability and prosperity to the country as a whole;

"We also regret that Your Excellency's advisers have demonstrated such timorous diffidence in their failure to take up Social Crediters' oft-repeated challenge to debate in this House and show honest cause why the Social Credit proposals would not bring widespread security, happiness and contentment to the

Canadian people;

"We regret, further that Your Excellency's advisers have failed to bring forward legislative and administrative provision for maintaining purchasing power at a level which would make possible the equitable distribution of our total production and thus cushion the Canadian economy against the onset of depression, therefore."

And the Debate still continuing; the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Graydon, adjourned.

RULING OF MR. SPEAKER

Mr. Speaker:—There can be no question that, on the second reading of a Bill, an amendment may be made to the end that the second reading do not take place but that the subject-matter thereof be referred to one of the Standing Committees which may be given certain instructions. But the House cannot, under the guise of referring the subject-matter, refer also certain provisions of the Bill itself. This amendment contains these words:

"That they (the Committee) recommend other specific measures relating respectively to other matters provided for in the said Bill".

This, it seems to me, is going beyond a reference of the subject-matter. It is an instruction to consider certain provisions of the Bill, which can be done more easily if the Bill were simply read a second time and referred to a Committee in due course. The House cannot both refuse to give the second reading and refer some provisions of the Bill to a Committee. It shall have to make its choice. The amendment is therefore out of order.

I may add that the adoption of the amendment would cause the Bill to disappear from the Order Paper. It would be killed without any hope of revival during the present session.

From this decision, Mr. Drew appealed to the House.

And the question being put by Mr. Speaker:—Shall the ruling of the Chair be sustained?—it was decided in the affirmative, on the following division:—

completed and are now occupied; (p) what is the total amount of the loans authorized under Part III; (q) how many contracts have been entered into with manufacturers of plumbing and heating equipment or other component parts of houses, pursuant to section 15; (r) how many payments have been made under Part IV, and what is the total thereof; (s) what studies and investigations, planning and research have been carried on under Part V; (t) what expenditures have been made pursuant to Part V, out of the \$5,000,000 authorized by parliament in 1945, under section 27A?

- 15. Was the price per housing unit increased above the figure quoted to the purchasers? If so, by how much?
- 16. Is the director aware of the condition of these houses both inside and out? If so, what conditions did he find?

17. Were the septic tanks left far out of the ground, and in some cases built in front of basement windows?

18. Does this conform with the specifications supplied the contractor by the

director?

19. If not, was the contractor allowed to continue to install equipment in this manner?

20. Will all drainage systems be properly installed so as to give trouble-free service for the usual time considered fair for proper installation?

Whereas it is proposed that a conference be held early in April in Washington for the purpose of completing such a treaty among the following states of the North Atlantic area—Belgium, Canada, France, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, the United Kingdom and the United States and such other states as might by agreement become parties,

Therefore be it resolved—

1. That this House declares anew its support of the United Nations as the world organization established to maintain international peace and security and

to promote the economic and social advancement of all peoples, and reaffirms its faith in the Principles and Purposes of the Charter of the United Nations:

- 2. That this House recognizes that the conclusion, among states of the North Atlantic area, of a treaty within the meaning of Article 51 of the Charter is, in present circumstances, of vital importance for the protection of Canada, the preservation of peace, and the development of political, social and economic co-operation among North Atlantic democracies:
- 3. That this House agrees that Canada should be represented at this conference, and that the representatives of Canada at the conference should use their best endeavour to assist in the completion of an acceptable treaty based on the proposed text as tabled on March 18:
- 4. That any such treaty should, before ratification, be submitted to the Houses of Parliament for approval.

And a Debate arising thereon and continuing;

On motion of Mr. St. Laurent it was resolved,—That notwithstanding the order in effect as to the hour of adjournment this House do sit this day beyond the hour of 10.30 p.m.

"regrets (a) the failure of the government to remove the sales tax; (b) the action of the government in removing the subsidy on flour milled for domestic purposes, thus adding to the cost of living, and (c) the failure of the government, despite rising national income, to make any provision to improve the living standards of the millions of Canadian people compelled to live on income below the income tax exemption levels, and therefore"

And the Debate still continuing, the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Coyle, adjourned.

By leave of the House, Mr. Bertrand (Prescott), from the Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has examined the following petitions:

1. Of Robert Burdette Burgess, and others, of Toronto, Ont., praying for an Act to incorporate "Interprovincial Pipe Line Company".

2. Of Ralph Osborne Campney, of Vancouver, B.C., and others, praying

for an Act to incorporate "Alberta Natural Gas Company".

3. Of Thomas Chandler Twyman, of Montreal, Que., and others, for an Act to incorporate "Queont Pipe Line Company", or in the alternative, "Trans-Northern Pipe Line Company".

4. Of Frank Murray McMahon, of Calgary, Alta., and others, for an Act to

incorporate "Westcoast Transmission Company Limited".

Your Committee has also considered the Eighteenth Report of the Examiner of Petitions, presented on April 26, informing the House that, while the requirements of Standing Order 95 are in process of being met in relation to these petitions, they have not been fully complied with.

In respect of (1) "Interprovincial Pipe Line Company" and (2) "Alberta Natural Gas Company" your Committee finds that while notice has been published for the required period of time in *The Canada Gazette* and in newspapers in nine of the provinces, publication of such notice has not been completed in the province of Newfoundland. However, evidence by statutory declaration has been filed that arrangements have been made for publication of notice for the required period of time in the *Daily News* published in St. John's, Newfoundland.

In respect of (3) "Queont Pipe Line Company" or, in the alternative, "Trans-Northern Pipe Line Company", evidence by statutory declaration has been filed showing that the notice of intention to apply to Parliament is now in process of publication in *The Canada Gazette* and newspapers as required by Standing Order 95. Your Committee finds that, although the said notice has not appeared for the required period of four weeks, arrangements have been made for complete publication.

With respect to (4) "Westcoast Transmission Company", evidence by statutory declaration has been filed showing that while notice of intention to apply to Parliament has been completed in *The Canada Gazette* and in thirty-four newspapers, proof of publication in six other newspapers has not yet been received. A copy of the said notice has been mailed by registered post to the Clerks of the various counties and municipalities which may be affected by the

construction and operation of the proposed works, and also to the Secretaries of the Provinces of Alberta and British Columbia, as required by Standing Order 95(1).

Your Committee finds, however, that the period of two weeks after receipt of the notice by the Secretaries of the provinces concerned and the Clerks of the counties and municipalities has not yet expired.

Your Committee recommends that the advertising done in relation to these four applications be deemed and taken as compliance with the requirements of Standing Order 95.

Mr. Bertrand (Prescott), from the Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Pursuant to an Order of the House of April 26, your Committee has considered the petition of Raymond Lees Hughes, and others, praying for an Act to incorporate "The British American Pipe Line Company", which was presented after the stipulated time for such presentation, and finds:

- 1. That the application is being made under the provisions of Bill No. 190, An Act respecting Oil or Gas Pipe Lines;
- 2. That Bill No. 190 was not presented in the House of Commons until April 8, 1949, and
- 3. That it was impossible for the applicants to prepare and present their petition until the contents of the said Bill were known.

Your Committee recommends that Standing Order 92 be suspended and that the petition be received.

The House accordingly resolved itself again into Committee of Supply and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to sit again later this day.

The Bill No. 190 (Letter Z-3 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act respecting Oil or Gas Pipe Lines," was read the third time and passed.

Mr. Mutch, for Mr. Clark, from the Sessional Committee on Railways and Shipping owned, operated and controlled by the Government, presented the Third Report of the said Committee which is as follows:—

Pursuant to the Order of Reference of the House of 22nd March, 1949, your Committee had before it for consideration the following:—

- 1. The Annual Reports for 1948 of the Canadian National Railways System, the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships Limited, and the Auditors' Report to Parliament in respect of the Canadian National Railways System and the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships Limited.
- 2. The Annual Report of the Trans-Canada Air Lines for the year ended December 31, 1948, and the Auditor's Report to Parliament for the year ended December 31, 1948, in respect of Trans-Canada Air Lines.
- The Annual Report of the Canadian National Railways Securities Trust for 1948.

4. The Budget of the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, for the calendar year 1949.

Your Committee held thirteen meetings, during eleven of which the above named matters were considered and evidence adduced thereon.

The Annual Report of the Canadian National Railways for 1948, discloses an operating income of \$11,297,109.39. However, interest on the Funded Debt, due the public, amounted to \$23,202,817.69 and interest on Government Loans, \$21,627,032.82, bringing about a deficit of \$33,532,741.12. The Annual Report was unanimously adopted.

The Annual Report of The Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, for the calendar year 1948, shows an operating profit of \$644,105.53, to which is added from the Vessel Replacement Fund Earnings the sum of \$85,733.06. Deducting therefrom interest on bonds held by public (\$470,000.00) and interest on Government Advances (\$93,794.16) there remains a surplus of \$166,044.43. The said Annual Report was unanimously adopted.

The Annual Report of Trans-Canada Air Lines for 1948, shows a net deficit of \$1,183,022.00 for the North American Services, and a deficit of \$1,750,218.00 for Trans-Canada Air Lines (Atlantic) Limited. The Report was unanimously adopted.

The Auditor's Reports to Parliament with respect to The Canadian National Railways System, The Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships Limited, and Trans-Canada Air Lines, also the Annual Report of the Canadian National Railways Securities Trust for the calendar year 1948, were severally examined and unanimously adopted.

The Financial Budgets of the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, for the calendar year 1949, after careful examination, were unanimously adopted.

Your Committee notes that the Operating Budget of Canadian National Railways for 1949 shows estimated gross system operating revenues of \$520,-900,000 a substantial increase over the actual revenues for 1948 and more than twice the amount of what was considered normal revenues of the railway prior to the war. It is pointed out, however, that no provision is made in the estimated budget for 1949 for additional revenue which may result from the hearings now going on before the Board of Transport Commissioners with respect to increased freight rates. Operating expenses are estimated at \$494,300,000 which leaves a net operating revenue of \$26,600,000. The net income charges, excluding interest, are estimated at \$18,290,000; interest on Funded Debt due the Public, \$22,833,000 and interest on Government Loans, \$23,277,000 leaving an estimated net deficit of \$37,800.00.

The Capital Budget of the Railway System for 1949 includes the following: Additions and Betterments, \$24,500,000; New Equipment, \$8,700,000; Barraute Branch Line, \$612,890; Acquisition of Securities and Retirement of Capital

Obligations, \$1,692,000; a total of \$35,504,890. Against the latter amount there is available from Reserves for Depreciation and Debt Discount Amortization, a sum of \$15,738,000 leaving the estimated net Capital Requirements at \$19,766,890.

The Net Operating Deficit of Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships

for the calendar year 1949, is estimated at \$360,000.

Your Committee has also examined the Consolidated Income Account of

Hudson Bay Railway for the Fiscal Years 1948-49 and 1947-48.

The task of your Committee was greatly facilitated by the valuable assistance of Mr. R. C. Vaughan, C.M.G., Chairman of the Board of Directors and President of The Canadian National Railways; Mr. N. W. Walton, C.B.E., and Mr. T. H. Cooper, Vice Presidents; also Mr. G. R. McGregor, President of Trans-Canada Air Lines.

To this Bill the Clerk of the Senate, by command of the Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General, did thereupon say:—

"In His Majesty's name, the Right Honourable the Deputy Governor General thanks his loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which the Right Honourable the Deputy Governor General was pleased to close the Fifth Session of the Twentieth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, with the following Speech:—

Honourable Members of the Senate, Members of the House of Commons:

In opening the present session, I stated that the first concern of government in world affairs is to ensure peace and security. To this end, the North Atlantic Treaty was signed at Washington on April 4, after its principles had been overwhelmingly approved by both Houses. I am gratified that you have given unanimous approval to the treaty which it is the intention to ratify at an early date.

There has been deep satisfaction throughout the country at the completion of the original plan of Confederation by the admission of Newfoundland as the tenth province on March 31.

Provision was made for the continuance of certain transitional measures, of the Agricultural Products Act and of the Foreign Exchange Control Act. My government has welcomed your approval of the international wheat agreement which it is hoped will be approved by a sufficient number of signatories to bring it into force on July 1, 1949.

As further instalments in the government's policy to provide a national standard of social security, you have passed measures designed to broaden the

scope of the Family Allowances Act and to increase the amount of pension paid by the Federal Government under the Old Age Pensions Act.

Other measures enacted during this Session include bills respecting the Control and Regulation of Interprovincial and International Pipe Lines, the Judges' Act, the National Parks Act, Mail Contracts and the Canadian Commercial Corporation.
