HIRE NO MORE TEACHERS OVER 30 YEARS OF AGE

Trustee Hiltz Objects to Indiscriminate Superannuation Aliowances.

Systematic superannuation of teachrs came up for discussion at the management committee of the board of education yesterday. A report of the chief inspector recommended that two resignations, those of Mr. Henry Gray and Miss Carrie J. Watson, be accepted, and that the former be granted \$200 a year superannuation allowance and the latter \$250. Immediately these were read Trustee Hiltz rose to object, not to the allowance, but to the principle, which he thought was unsystematic and more on the lines sympathy than business. thought that teachers should not be taken on over the age of thirty, and he brought forward this objection again when the list of recommended teachers came up. There are many elderly people on

teaching staffs," he said, "who should be retired with superannuation and younger people put in their places. The young teachers would only draw half the salary, and would be more energetic and better trained. So it would be a saving of money and a gain in the teaching staff in a great many cases."

When he saw about half a dozen names of married and single women over thirty, on the recommendation list, he made a motion that they be struck off. Inspector Hughes rose to explain, however, that these had all come in from outside, leaving their positions. It had also been explained in letters to them that they would be alright if under thirty-four years. When this explanation was of-fered, Trustee Hiltz withdraw the moion, but declared that he would move at the next meeting that the age limit be reduced to thirty. A committee, composed of Trustees


Jeneva, Showing Corner of King and Simece Streets,









At the present time he is shipping interior fittings to the three provinces of the Great West, besides doing a large business in Ontario.

Oshawa has been called the Manchester of Canada and it has to-day greater prospects than any other town in the Dominion. Four railways will soon be running either through or near the town, the C. P. R. G. T. R., C. N. R., and Toronto Eastern Electric Railway. The C. P. R. expect to have their new line started this summer. The Toronto Eastern Electric Railway will be running through the town and expect to have their line completed by January next. 

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A Ni person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending romesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$8.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of nomestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and outivate afty acres extra.


