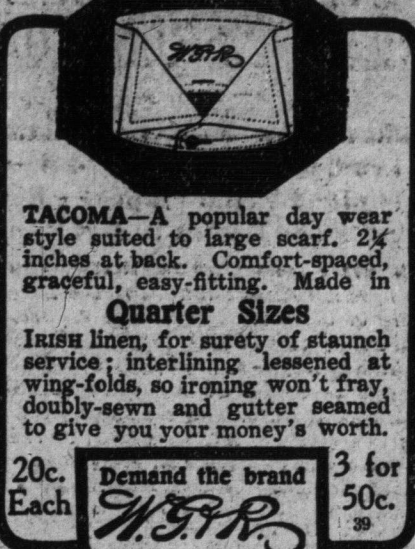

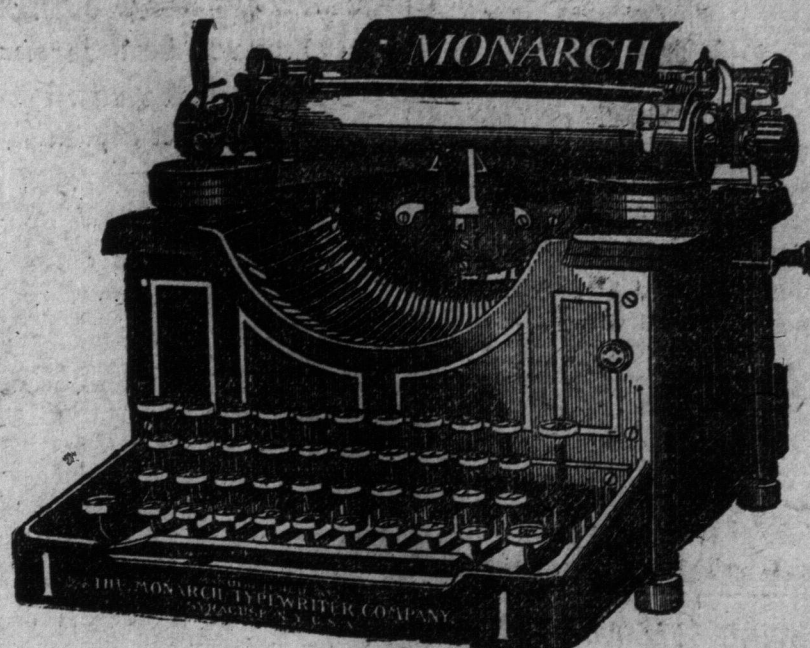

Discussing the general question, Mr. Barker says that: "Not only are our railways often wastefully built, wholly upon the proceeds of the sale of bonds at figures far below par, but the promoters frequently add to the burden of the earnings of their enterprises by issuing as a bonus (to go with the bonds or appropriated by them) an amount of stock representing a speculative profit in the future."

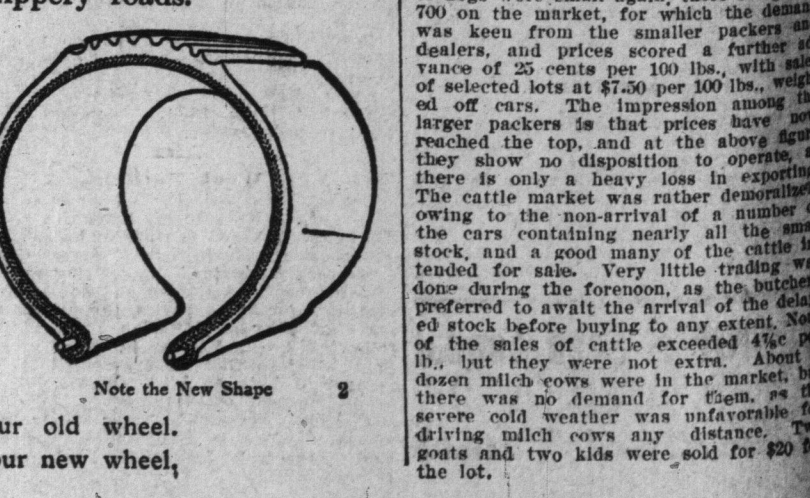
