FASHODA DISPUTE HAS BEEN SETTLED

That is the Important Announcement by Cable This Morning.

YET WAR PREPARATIONS ARE CONTINUED

British Warships at Hong Kong Coaling Up to Full Capacity—Pennsylvania Coal Bought for West India Stations—Mr. Goschen Could Not Leave the Admiralty to Go to the Cutlers' Banquet at Sheffield—Cable News.

The Fashoda dispute has been settled. That is an announcement from London which all lovers of peace will welcome. No details are given, but it must be assumed that France has given way, as the report says that a general and satisfactory arrangement has been reached. Despatches regarding the far East are meagre, but it is announced that British warships at Hong Kong are coaling as rapidly as possible, and the vessels of the Pacific squadron have been ordered to rendezvous at that port. Major Marchand has arrived at Cairo, but beyond that fact there is nothing given out. The assembly of the different sections of the British navy, in both the Pacific and Atlantic, may be merely a "bluff," but at all events it shows that Britain has reached the limit of concession and is ready to fight France or Russia, or both, should necessity call for such measures. The coal merchants of the United States will benefit by the war scare. A Philadelphia despatch tells of large orders for dusky diamonds for immediate delivery at British West India naval stations. Another report is that British warships have been ordered to Philadelphia for repairs. This is extraordinary, as in the usual course the vessels would have been fixed up at Halifax or Bermuda. Looking over the situation generally, it must be conceded that Great Britain is still on top, if the telegraphic news of this morning may be relied on.

MR. GOSCHEN COULDN'T GO.

Sheffield Cutlers Expected Him, But Business at the Admiralty Was Too Pressing.

Sheffield, England, Nov. 3.—At the annual feast of the Master Cutlers here this evening, it was expected that the Right Hon. George J. Goschen, First Lord of the Admiralty, would be present as the principal guest. Mr. Goschen, however, was unable to attend the banquet, and the chairman read the following letter of apology from him: "It is absolutely impossible for me to leave the Admiralty. My continuous presence there is essential. Sheffield will appreciate this in the present state of affairs. I am truly disappointed, but duty comes before pleasure."

FASHODA QUESTION SETTLED.

That is a Report at New York and Confirmed by a Despatch From London.

New York, Nov. 3.—A cable to The Evening Post from London follows: London, Nov. 3.—Lamont on the high est authority that the Fashoda question has been settled, and that a general and satisfactory arrangement has been reached with France. Consols are rising steadily. This confirms it.

AN OFFICIAL NOTE.

London, Nov. 3.—An official note issued this evening says: "There is now good reason to hope that the political situation is ameliorating. It can be confidently stated that when the cause of the irritation which unfortunately recently existed in France and Great Britain and on the Upper Nile is removed, which is expected soon to be the case, the door will again be open for a resumption of those friendly negotiations which happily characterize the normal state of the relations between the two countries."

IT IS CONFIRMED.

Premier Dupuy Will Recall Marchand and Baron Corcelle Will Tell Salisbury.

London, Nov. 4.—The most reliable information from Paris confirms the earlier reports that M. Dupuy, the Premier, has decided to wash his hands of Fashoda, and to recall Major Marchand, for whose mission he is not responsible.

BRITAIN ORDERS U. S. SPIRITS.

The Stuff to Be Delivered at Montreal for Use in Powder-Making.

Chicago, Nov. 3.—The British Government has closed a contract here for the immediate delivery of 125,000 gallons of distilled spirits at Montreal. An intimation was also given that about 450,000 more gallons would in all likelihood be ordered within about 10 days. This order if 125,000 gallons amounts to nearly 3000 barrels and will require over sixty cars for its transportation into Canada. The use of the distilled spirits thus ordered will be in the manufacture of smokeless powder, of which distilled spirits is one of the ingredients.

AN AIR OF MYSTERY.

Surrounds the Movements of Her Majesty's Ship Cordella.

Halifax, Nov. 3.—A special from Sydney says: "From the most authoritative information respecting the movements of H.M.S. Cordella, she is under sealed orders in direct connection with the strained relations between England and France and Russia. Her destination is probably a Newfoundland port near St. Pierre. BUYING AMERICAN COAL.

British Government Wants a Large Amount Delivered at West India Naval Stations.

Philadelphia, Nov. 3.—A morning paper publishes the following: "The probability of war between England and France received fresh impetus yesterday by the action of England, who purchased a large amount of American coal for immediate delivery at her West India naval stations. In response to hurried telegrams from London, ship brokers engaged in the West India trade sent the greater part of yesterday searching for tonnage suitable to transport the coal from Philadelphia and Newport News to points where it will be most convenient for English war craft to all their bunkers. Selling vessels from 1000 to 2000 tons carrying capacity, are particularly in demand."

THE PANAMA IS SAFE.

And the Big Scare About Her Was All Premature.

Havana, Nov. 3.—The transport Panama from Santiago, fears for whose safety had been entertained, arrived here this morning. The Panama reached this port at 10 a. m., and landed seven American passengers, including some military officers. She left Havana at about 10 a. m., her destination apparently being New York. It is reported the Panama has about 400 sick men on board.

READY, AYE, READY!

Britain's Naval Activity May Be Only a Demonstration, But It Shows What Can Be Done.

Kingston, Jamaica, Nov. 3.—The British naval authorities at Port Royal, the naval headquarters here, express the opinion that the order for the mobilization of the British North American and West India squadrons forms part of a grand, comprehensive scheme for a naval demonstration on the Pacific and Atlantic, intended to indicate Great Britain's preparedness to face any and all possible hostile developments.

TURKS OUT OF CRETE.

Foreign Admirals Will Take Possession of the Island To-Day.

Canoa, Nov. 3.—The foreign admirals have informed the Turkish Governor of Crete that they will proceed with the military occupation of the various administrative officers of the island on Nov. 4, and the Turkish officials will not thereafter be permitted to re-enter them. The Turkish troops then in the island will cease to be regarded as garrisoning Crete, and the Turkish military posts and military services will be abolished.

MR. DOUGLAS GOES OUT

His Counsel Threw Up the Sponge at Colborne Yesterday—He Said He Didn't Set 'em Up for the Boys, as Alleged by Mr. Cochrane, But Some of the Wicked Agents Did Things Contrary to Law, and He Loses His Seat.

Colborne, Nov. 3.—The East Northumberland election trial was brought to an abrupt conclusion this afternoon, and the election was voided by consent.

When the court resumed, Mr. Douglas, the respondent, was put in the witness box and made a general denial of the charges that he had treated in hotels after the issue of the election writ. He had a memorandum of the meetings which he had held during the campaign, by which he showed that the evidence given by Mr. Cochrane, the member for the constituency in the Dominion House, was incorrect.

Mr. Cochrane swore that he had met Mr. Douglas in a hotel in Campford some time in February, after the issue of the writ, and that Mr. Douglas had treated those in the bar room. On that occasion Mr. Cochrane, according to his testimony, had advised Mr. Douglas not to treat, because he would be acting illegally if he did so.

Mr. Douglas, however, had considered himself perfectly safe and had set up the drinks. According to Mr. Douglas' evidence today this was contradicted. He had never met Mr. Cochrane under such circumstances except once, and that was at Castleton on Dec. 31. Mr. Cochrane at that occasion had given him the advice he had testified to. He accounted for every evening during the campaign, in which he had been accused of breaking the law, and showed that accusations of having done so after the issue of the writ were entirely wrong.

At this point Mr. Britton stated to the bench that as a few of the charges of bribery by agents had been proved, and as it was possible some others might be proved, he would consent, if the personal charges were withdrawn, that the election should be voided.

Mr. Nesbitt agreed not to press the personal charges, and their lordships, after considering the matter, agreed to this termination of the trial.

REFORM OF THE SENATE

That, or Its Abolition, Will Constitute One of the Planks of the Liberal Platform at Coming Elections—Mr. Tarte Says It is the Subservient "Thing" of Toryism—Montreal News.

Montreal, Nov. 3.—(Special.)—It is evident that the abolition or reform of the Senate will be one of the planks in the Liberal platform at the coming election. Today Hon. Mr. Tarte devoted almost two columns to Mr. W. F. Maclean, M.P., and the Senate, declaring that the member for East York has repeated for the 30th time that the Senate is the rampart and safe-guard of the rights of the Canadian people. In the spirit of the British North American Act, Mr. Tarte says the Senate is sure to be independent, devoted to the public interest and above partisan feeling. Toryism, he adds, has changed all that, and for 20 years the Senate has been the subservient thing of the Tory party. The Minister of Public Works evidently forgot what the day when he was hark up Vice-President Shaughnessy advanced him \$3000 when he wrote the following: "The Senate accepted in advance, with closed eyes, the scandalous bill, which gave millions of dollars and millions of acres to the C.P.R.; yet since the Liberals are in power it has condemned the extension of the I.C.R., even before the bill came before the House."

Where, he asks, "can Mr. Maclean find every constitutional theory and all the teachings of British precedence. We are taught that political liberty means the acquired and legal right of the nation to control its Government. Our Upper House has no mandate from the people, and does not represent the people. It is the irresponsible organ of a powerless minority and a handful of fanatics, and these are the people who wish to control the Government of Canada. It is, indeed, the most important for Mr. Maclean to claim that our Upper House is the safeguard of the rights of the people?"

THE SPANIARDS WITHDRAW.

Cannot Subscribe to the Conditions Imposed by the United States Commissioners at Paris.

London, Nov. 4.—The Paris correspondent of The Times says: "I understand that at today's (Friday) sitting of the Peace Commission, the Spanish commissioners will reply textually as follows: "It is impossible for us either to accept or refuse the conditions the United States impose. We do not desire to declare a formal rupture, because it would oblige Europe to run the risk of beholding the humiliating spectacle of an American fleet bombarding European shores."

FOUND DEAD ON THE TRACK.

Unknown Man Had Evidently Been Struck by a G. T. R. Train.

Newbury, Ont., Nov. 3.—The sectionmen on the G.T.R. who were going over the line, two and a half miles west of Newbury today, found the body of an unknown man, who had evidently been walking on the track during the night and was struck by a train. His body was terribly mangled. He was of medium height, dark complexion, mustache and aged about 35. From papers found on the body he is evidently Albert McKenzie of Rock Hill, N.Y.

WHEAT MARKETS ARE EASIER

Not Enough War Scare to Put Up Prices.

Liverpool Opened Heavy and Closed Fractionally Lower Than Yesterday - Chicago Followed Suit - Paris Indifferent and Antwerp a Bit Higher - Local Grain, Produce and Live Stock Markets - Notes and Gossip.

Thursday Evening, Nov. 3. The foreign outlook being less ominous the leading wheat markets ruled easier today. Spot wheat was dull in Liverpool, and futures closed 1/4 to 1/2 cent lower than yesterday's final figures.

The less angry outlook abroad, together with continued receipts and better reports of Russian crop, depressed Chicago to-day, all futures closing 1/2 to 1/4 cent lower than yesterday's final figures.

Liverpool maize to-day eased off 1/4 cent for all deliveries. Chicago corn, however, held strong on reports of damage from recent wet weather.

Local advanced 3/4 at Liverpool. December wheat puts at Chicago, 63 1/2; calls, 67c. May corn puts, 34c; calls, 34 1/2c. Wheat and flour to-day were 50,000 bushels, and of corn 300,000 bushels.

Primary wheat receipts to-day, 1,039,000 bushels, against 1,423,000 bushels the same day a year ago. 273,500 bushels, against 450,000 bushels.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 220,000 cars, against 1,037 cars the same day a year ago.

The arrivals of wheat in England have been smaller during past few days than the quantity calculated as due to arrive in that time.

The Northwestern Miller reports an active demand for cash wheat for milling, with small stocks in public warehouses.

Millers and country elevator men have been busy to cover four sales for future delivery, the latter to cover sales of wheat made from farmers' deliveries, which have not been settled for.

The week's packing of Western hogs was 465,000, against 385,000 last year.

BRITAIN'S BIG CROP.

The London Times, in its final estimate of the grain crops of the United Kingdom, puts the wheat average at 2,156,479 acres, with an average yield of 30 bushels per acre, yielding a crop of 64,698,000 bushels.

More About Russia's Crop. Broomfield cables that the Russian tax department estimates the grain crop of the city governments of Russia proper, 1,854,000 bushels last year. Total stocks grain at present are estimated at 2,800,000 bushels, as compared with 3,000,000 bushels last year.

As a part of comparison to this statement the Central Statistical Committee's official figures of seventy-one districts, of all Russia's total crops, were 1,784,000,000 bushels in 1898, compared with 2,058,000,000 bushels in 1897.
