

EVOLUTION OF CANADIAN COMMERCE.

Individual instance is not uncommonly the most telling method o tracing the progress of nations, cities or great departments of commercia life. Great men are the measure of history and great businesses are typical of expanding trades and industries. Much can be said in favor of illustration by concrete example of the marvelous development that came with the nineteenth centuhy, more especially in the new countries of the western hemisphere. Nothing comparable with it had ever been known in previous ages and with the increasing conquest of nature came the striking dis coveries and inventions that have revolutionized the world. Canada was slow in experiencing the full impetus of the new era, but for that there are excellent reasons. The country was immense and in great part unknown, the people, the hardy, vigorous and enterprising, were few in number and largely occupied with the struggle for independent self-government and with the problem of federation. These accomplished, the Dominion plunged into a movement of which the future alone can truly judge its effective

scope and character. That was a happy inspiration which led Mr. S. H. Howard, the manager of the city advertising office of the Robert Simpson Company, Limited, to have prepared, for free distribution at the National Exhibition, a souvenir of the completion of the firm's new building in Toronto. It takes the form of seven original drawings by Mr. C. W. mond and there traded beads and gewgaws for furs with the strange red men and women. This incident forms the subject of the first of Mr. Jeffery's designs and is presented with the effective composition and vigor of line characteristic of the whole series.

Next in order come the fortified trading posts, which remained for many years the type of the Canadian place of business. These were dotted by degrees all over the continent and on their sites now stand some of the largest and most notable cities of the North American continent. Mr. Howard notes that Fort Edmonton, situated in a bend of the great North Sasard notes that Fort Edmonton, situated in a bend of the great North Saskatchewan, still links those wild times with ours. The fortified fort, after the revolution that created the United States, began in Canada to be ousted by the store, very different indeed from the palatial structures of to-day. Number three of the drawings depicts in a very interesting way one of these log houses when free traders were creeping in from across the border. It is rude enough, but still has all the essentials of what even then was no doubt a profitable business. The scene then shifts to 1820, five years or so after the war, whose last shot and ensuing century of peace it is proposed on to commemorate. Mr. Jefferys has drawn a square timber store of the pioneer settlers and United Empire Loyalists in Upper Canada of that time—as Mr. Howard puts it, "a structure of squared timbers, oblong as a

box; strong, neat, whitewashed and businesslike. The next stage in the march of Canadian progress brings us to the clap-board store made possible by the advent of the circular saw-mill—the old familiar country "store at the corners" just before Confederation. It strikes a more familiar note and many yet survive to whom Mr. Jefferys' very realistic drawing must be fraught with early and picturesque mem-The "Store at the Corners," as Mr. Howard says, still stands in a hundred surviving instances with its wealth of human interest. Number H six of the drawings is of particular interest, for it shows the Red Brick Store of the founder of the Robert Simpson firm at the corner of Yonge and Queen-streets in 1882. The contrast between this store, extensive as it then was, and the north facade of the stately steel structure that has now replaced it and forms the subject of the last drawing, speaks as nothing else could do to the extraordinary progress of Toronto during the last quarter of a century. The Simpson store, as it stands to-day, is the largest steel range for games on opponents grounds building for commercial purposes in the British Empire. "Its seven floors for Sept. 4 and 18, and also for Labor Day, contain over eleven acres. Its roof shelters a trade of dollars counting in millions. Its stock includes practically all the personal and domestic needs and luxuries of civilized humanity." It is a monument of sound, sagacious business enterprise and a graphic witness to an advance unprecedented in history. To add that the souvenir is worthy of the importance of its occasion is to give the highest possible tribute, and the company, the artist and the author can be deservedly congratulated on an admirable memento of a wonderful evolution.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.-The Post's Lon on cable says: Altho Harriman's illness and Harriman' sterview on stock market affairs are fully recognized here as having had ar effect in Wall-street, our people prefe to take a broader view of this week's

to take a broader view of this week's collapse in prices, and consider the fall as simply due to recognition that even greatly improved prosperity had been heavily over-discounted on the stock exchange. Moreover, we believe that the attitude of some of your leading banks has been largely responsible for the much-needed reaction. The best quarters nere, in fact, believe your financial institutions have applied the lessons learned by all of them from 1907, and have been acting unit-edity to keep the situation in hand thru curbing speculation. That they and the interests offliated with them would co-operate similarly to give support in any really serious break, is assumed as probable.

From all sides comes recognition of Harriman's great organizing power; but I must repeat that the stock speculations by him and by other eminent capitalists in your market not only modify the tribute, but prevent foreign observers even from giving to your real commercial development and prosperity the weight in judging financial values which would otherwise be accorded to them.

The story that Harriman came home to defeat a plot against his interests by other powerful financiers is altogether disregarded. New York can have no idea how utterly London distrusts all rumors concerning the actions and purposes of American personalities. I can illustrate this attitude best by saying that many people here believe that Harriman is not seriously sick at all.

As regards the feeling towards your market since the break, Berlin is still bullish on Americans, but Paris and London are holding quite aloof. We are, however, not at all alarmed over your position, and shall not be so unless prices begin skyrocketing again.

Inquiries come as to the status of the Paris syndicate in Steel common since the turn in the market. My information is that the project was never properly materialized, that the group was informal, and that it has taken its profits.

The continuance of the rise in your merchandise import trade attracts much attention because of its bearing on your European credit balances. It is nevertheless believed that the adverse position on international exchange will be adjusted by temporary borrowings in Europe, and that ultimately your exports will expand very greatly.
