Final Resting Places of Empire's Soldiers Who Fell in France and Belgium.

Ottawa, Jan. 17.— (By Canadian Press).—Twelve hundred cemeteries scattered across France and Belgium will be constructed by the imperial war graves commission as final resting places for the thousands of soldiers of the British empire who fell during the war. Some of these cem-eteries have been completed under the direction of distinguished architects, but by far the greater number is yet to be constructed. In many of these cemeteries Canadian soldiers are, or will be buried, and some of them will be composed largely, If not entirely of Canadian graves. As the record of each cemetery is completed by the inilitary authorities it is handed over to the imperial war graves commission for marking, beautification and




