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REPORT.

Friends and Benefactors, for the twenty-fifth time, we are called upon, not only to render an account of our stewardship, but again to appeal to your generosity to sustain us in our efforts to alleviate the condition of the poor and the suffering. In the past year we had to relieve a very large number of families, necessarily entailing a large expenditure. During the year 1877, the amount laid out was about \$1800; in the past year it has reached a sum approaching \$2450. The largest number of families on the books at any one time was 164, representing some eight hundred individuals, who had to be supported at least three months of the year, while several families had to be given relief all the year round. The funds at our disposal have been applied in providing the following articles:—

Besides a number of other articles, as will be found in the statistics of the different Conferences hereto annexed.

In looking over these statistics, it will be seen, that the articles furnished, are varied, but it must be considered, that in a great many of the families relieved, sickness to a greater or less extent prevailed; hence, the articles provided, varied according to the particular circumstances, or condition of each. Although the number of families relieved is set down at 164, still this does not reach the actual figure. Many others were supplied with coal alone, in order to enable them to struggle through the winter months; and this fact will account for the very large quantity distributed in the last, over former years. In 1877, the number of bushels given out was 2,052, or 57 chaldrons, while during the year 1878, no less than 3,433 bushels, or a fraction over 95 chaldrons, were distributed. This article alone cost, including cartage, nearly \$600.

At the end of the financial year of 1877, we had grave misgivings as to our being able to meet the many claims that we felt morally certain would be made upon us; but the timely lecture of the Rev. Father Glackmeyer, which realized the handsome sum of \$406, partially provided us with means for supplying relief, up to the time of the holding of our annual meeting in February 1878. Later on in the season, the President of our Council, at the solicitation of its members, gave another lecture in aid of our funds, and the receipts from this came to us at a time when they

But notwithstanding these receipts, and the proceeds of an excursion of the Catholic Temperance Union, kindly given to us by that body, besides several bequests referred to elswhere, we were compelled to draw upon the balance of a bequest fund in bank, in order to enable us to overtake, or rather alleviate much of the misery and suffering consequent upon the depressed state of business, and the inability of large numbers to procure employment.

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It is a source of gratification to those who perform the active duties of the Conferences, to find that many who, while in life, regularly attended our annual meetings, and contributed to the funds of the Society, have also remembered us just before the close of their earthly career. We take this as the best evidence of the confidence placed in the mission and labors of the Society, and in return, the Society does not fail to remember the benefactors of the poor, either in life or in death; at every weekly meeting of the Conferences throughout the world, they receive the benefit of the prayers of the members, and by a special rule of the Society a solemn Requiem Mass is offered up annually, for the repose of the souls of deceased benefactors. The bequests made to the Society, during the past year were five, and of an amount aggregating \$800. The late Messrs. James McDonnell, Michael Scallon, James Cullen, and John Kearney left us \$100 each, and the late Mr. Michael J. Cochran bequeathed to us \$400. The amount left by Mr. Kearney has not yet been received; that of Mr. Cochran's was paid over shortly after the winding up of the financial year, and it has greatly assisted us in carrying on the work of charity during the time intervening between the closing of the annual accounts, and the time of our present meeting.

The objects and aims of the Society, having been so fully made known in our more early reports, and the working of the Conferences being so familiar to almost every one amongst us, we deem it unnecessary to lengthen this report by repeating them here. The condition and circumstances of the poor are always the same. We can, however, assure our friends and benefactors, that the best efforts of the active members are made to find out those who are, and those who are not, deserving. In order to guard against imposition the member who reports the case of a family, is never selected to relieve it, but it is passed over to new visitors, in order to more fully ascertain if the condition and character of the family are such as they were at first represented to be; and the further precaution is taken by the members, not to visit the families at stated periods, so that their circumstances may be observed at different times. The number of visits made to the homes of the poor during the past year, was 3,426, and as a general rule families are visited twice a week.

Our friends and benefactors do not need to be told, that we look forward to a large amount of work to be thrown upon us during the winter; in fact, the three Conferences have already enough to do to meet the claims upon them; and the funds at our disposal are inadequate to do so. But we do not despair. We have full confidence that those who have so nobly and so generously sustained us during the twenty-five years of our existence, will not permit us to remain without the funds necessary to carry on the work in which we are engaged. 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Let the result of our efforts in the past, give you an assurance that there will be no relaxation in our zeal for the future; and while asking you to help us with even greater generosity than usual, in the present trying period of want, we feel confident that there is no necessity for a lengthened appeal to your benevolence; but would merely remind all of the words of the psalmist: "Blessed is he who understandeth concerning the needy and the poor, for the Lord will deliver him in the evil day."

ST. PATRICK'S CONFERENCE.

HALIFAX, December 1st, 1878.

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To the President of St. Patrick's Conference.

SIR,—In accordance with custom I present to you and the Society of St. Vincent of Paul, the Annual Return of our Conference for the year ending November 30th, 1878. During that period we have relieved a total of sixty-seven families, comprising two hundred and seventy-six individuals, of which twenty-one were married people with seventy-three children, and forty-six widows with one hundred and fifteen children. In relieving the same we have distributed the following articles:—

1526 bushels of Coal, 4095 loaves Bread, 1601 pounds Tea, 51 4 66 Rice. 287 66 Meal. 781 Butter, " Soap, 130 516 pts. Molasses. 356 Candles. 216 pts. Oil, 263 pecks Potatoes, 1284 Herring, 212 pounds Sugar, 131½ pts. Milk. 197 pounds Flour, 111 " Washing Soda, 105 packets Matches, 2 pounds Coffee, 243 66 Beef, 12 pts. Wine, 37 pounds Biscuits, 101 66 Codfish, 2 packets Broma, 4 pair Boots.

In despensing the above 1,735 visits were made by the members of the society; two hearses were provided for burials. We have to thank Mr. R. Ford for kindly providing three pair of boots to relieve the needy.
