

WALKERTON,

From the Year 1851 to 1877.

Little over a quarter of a century has passed away since the first echo of civilization was heard on that part of this terrestrial globe on which the thriving town of Walkerton is now built. Wild beasts had their lairs where now are the pleasant homes of our citizens. The forests then covered what in so few years has been changed into beautiful gardens. The howl of the wolf has given place to the din of the workshop, the merry tingle of the bricklayer's trowel or the strongly resounding blows of the carpenter's hammer. In that short space of time was the forest cleared away and a town built to which its citizens may well point with pride as an evidence of not only their enterprise but their prosperity.

It was in 1851 that the late Joseph Walker, from whom, being the first settler, the town received its name, settled on the Saugeen River, within the limits of what is now the town of Walkerton. It seems Mr. Walker and several others, started on an prospecting tour from Durham to Owen Sound, thence to Southampton and Kincardine. From there they turned eastward and one of them decided on Riversdale as the spot for his future home. The rest continued their journey until they came to the Saugeen where Mr. Walker determined to pitch his tent and at once located his claim. He came here in the Summer of 1851. He at once set about building a mill. He dug his mill race the same year he came here, but did not construct his dam until the next year. He also built his sawmill in that year. In the Fall of the year in which Mr. Walker settled here, our worthy post-master Mr. Malcolm McLean came in and erected the building which is still used as a post-office, and opened

a store in it. This was the first store in the place. Mr. Walker kept a hotel on the present site of Chamber's Hotel. In 1852 the post-office was opened as Brant post-office. Mr. John Shannon was appointed first postmaster. Mr. Shannon also kept a small store. In 1853 he turned the post-office over to Mr. McLean, who then became postmaster. It is hardly necessary to say that the honor of being postmaster, gave its possessor at that time more work and trouble than dimes. The village, Rogue's Hollow, or Sucker Town, as it was then called, however received fresh accessions each year. In 1854, Mr. John Bruce, one of our most respected and enterprising citizens came here. In January of that year he let the contract for a small frame building, which was erected and ready for occupation, within six weeks from the time the contract was let. Mr. Bruce at once commenced business, and became a prosperous merchant. He retired in 1875, after having replaced his frame store by a brick, which he repeatedly enlarged, until it became the finest and largest brick structure in the town. He built the first brick building in town in 1858. It formed part of his brick block lately swept away by the fire. In 1855 Mr. Louis Wisser and Mr. Wm. Richardson our worthy townsmen, bought lots and settled at the intersection of Jackson and Durham streets. Mr. Flett had a short time previously settled on the lot on which he is still living.

The village grew but slowly, until it was chosen as the county seat about 1865, but even then its increase was by no means rapid. The completion of the Railway in 1872 however gave it an impetus forward, and ever since it has rapidly increased both in size and population, as also in importance as a commercial centre. In the year 1871 the place was incorporated as a town by a special act of Parliament. It then had a population of about 800. Mr. Joseph Walker was chosen the first Mayor. This was fitting tribute to the first settler of the place. Mr. McVicar was the first Reeve of the town.

In 1866 the Jail and Court House were built at a cost of \$44,000. Mr. John Elliot of Brantford, was the contractor. In 1876 the County Council filled a long felt need, by erecting the commodious and substantial Council Chamber on Colborne street. It cost \$6,000 and contains besides the Council Chamber, offices for the County Officials and the Master in Chancery.

In 1863 the first printing office was established in the town by Mr. Brown, who removed the plant of the Herald office to this place from

Paisley. The Herald is still published by Mr. Brown. In 1869 the TELESCOPE was established by D. W. Ross, now of Paisley. After carrying on the TELESCOPE for several years, Mr. Ross sold out to Mr. Joseph Craig, who in turn in 1876, sold out to the present proprietors.

In 1869, Mr. John Klein started the GLOCKE, a German paper, and continued to publish it until the end of 1875, when it passed into the hands of the present proprietors. The TELESCOPE was started in the interest of the Reform party, and has always consistently supported liberal views of politics. The GLOCKE is now also liberal in politics.

In the way of Church architecture, Walkerton can, without blushing point to St. Paul's Church, and to Free St. John's, both Presbyterian Churches, and to the Roman Catholic Church on Victoria Street. The Anglicans and the Methodists have also large and commodious Church edifices, though neither can be recommended for its architectural beauty.

On May 28. last, Walkerton was visited, by what at that time threatened to be a serious calamity, but what by the energy of its inhabitants has been turned into, we might say, almost a blessing, when we look on the noble buildings, that have now taken the place of the wooden structures destroyed by the fire of that date. At one o'clock on that day, a destructive fire broke out in the stable of the Central Hotel, and in the course of a few hours, swept away over thirty business places and residences, and destroyed nearly \$90,000 worth of property, thus giving a severe blow to individuals, but proving a boon to the town. Phoenix like, the town is rising out of its ashes. No less than 23 shops and stores were built during the last year. Most of them of such architectural beauty, as to be an ornament to the town, and would be no disgrace to many a city.

* In 1876 over \$100,000 were expended in the erection of new buildings, among which there were no less than 10 fine brick stores. The building operations of the town during the past year amount to at least \$150,000.

While the town has in a few years become an important commercial centre, her manufacturing interests have been rather neglected, but even in that line it can make a fair show. The grist and saw mills of Mr. David Moore compare favourably with those of many a larger place. Messrs. Kennedy & Bunston's woolen factory, the foundry of Messrs. Fischer & Pulford, Mr. Nichol's cabinet factory, the fanning mill works

of Mr. R. H. McKay, Mr. Richardson's shingle mills, the planeing mills of Messrs Teasdale & McDougall and of Mr. Hargreaves are industries that give employment to many hands and are daily growing in importance, both in regard to the amount of their manufactures and quality of the work they turn out.

At the beginning of the past year a move was made, to fill a long felt want, in the way of getting a Central Exhibition for this northwestern part of the great Ontario peninsula. A few energetic gentlemen took the matter in hand, a stock book, to raise funds for the erection of suitable buildings, was opened, and the necessary amount of capital obtained. The town on its part bought a suitable piece of ground, and undertook the levelling and fencing of it. It is needless to say that a great deal of canvassing and talking was required before the undertaking took the desirable form, but it finally succeeded. The buildings were erected at a cost of about \$4,500. The town prepared the grounds as it agreed to do, and the Exhibition was held on October 9, 10, 11, and 12, under the auspices of the united South and North Bruce, Brant and Saugeen Township Agricultural Societies, and the Walkerton Horticultural Society. Prizes to the amount of \$5,000 were offered, to which the county council liberally granted \$1,000.

At the election of 1872 Mr. Paul Ross, the present Mayor was elected to the Mayor's chair, and Mr. Robert Sutherland as Reeve. Mr. Ross was succeeded in 1873-4 by Mr. J. G. Cooper, while Mr. C. W. Stovel represented the town as Reeve from 1873 to the end of 1876. Mr. A. Shaw filled the Mayor's chair in 1875, and Mr. A. Sproat in 1876. At the last election, Mr. Sproat contested the Reeveship with Mr. Stovel, while Mr. Ross ran for the Mayorality. Both were elected, and worthily represented the town during the past year.

One of the most beneficial and important improvements of the town was undertaken in 1875, when the present School House was erected at a cost of about \$10,000. Mr. David Seibert was the contractor.

The School has about 400 pupils with a staff of six teachers and is now a County Model School. The Walkerton High School which also occupies rooms in the Central School House, was organized in 1872 with Mr. A. Miller as teacher. Under his management it rapidly grew in importance and has now about 70 pupils under two teachers.
