

PROVINCIAL POLITICS

There is not an intelligent citizen of New Brunswick who does not realize, and all but the grafters will admit, that a political house-cleaning is imperatively needed. There has arisen, however, a feeling of skepticism, and it is nourished by the party in power. The effort is made to persuade the people that to make a change would merely be to go from bad to worse. Nothing could be more unfortunate than that such a feeling should prevail. The revision of the voters' lists is a very important matter. The names of large numbers of young men should be added. 



Paris, July 31.—Col. Spencer Cosby, United States military attache at Paris, has been speaking in a hoarse whisper of late. But they are equally of the belief that the lesser forms of gas—which do not kill, but merely interrupt the forward progress of an attack—are a permanent element of defensive military strategy which must be taken into consideration in future warfare.
