

BYNG TO MARK ANNIVERSARY OF VIMY BATTLE

Dinner at Government House To Canadian Officers

LAST OF ITS KIND

Practice Will End With Completion of Governor's Term of Office

Canadian Press. OTTAWA, Ont., April 9.—Many of the officers of the Canadian Corps from all parts of Canada who took part in the battle of Vimy Ridge, nine years ago today, will be the guests tonight at the anniversary dinner given by General Lord Byng of Vimy, who was the Canadian Corps Commander at the battle.

Since Lord Byng came to Canada as governor-general in 1921, the Vimy Ridge anniversary dinner has been an annual event. In view of the fact that his term as governor-general of Canada will be completed next summer, the dinner tonight will be the last of its kind at Government House and consequently it is to be marked by some memorable features.

IMPORTANT VICTORY

The capture of Vimy Ridge was one of the outstanding triumphs scored by the Canadian Corps and the supporting units of the C. E. F. during the war. Vimy Ridge was the most dominant position held by the Germans on the western front, and was so strongly fortified that the German High Command regarded it as being practically impregnable. From the practical days of the war in 1914 it had been the scene of bitter fighting. Attempts by the French army in 1915 and 1916 to capture the ridge from the Germans had failed, at a cost of one hundred thousand casualties.

ALL OBJECTIVES TAKEN

The attack began at 5:30 in the morning of April 9, on a 12-mile front. At 1:28 in the afternoon of the same day, the Canadian troops were at the final objective, the whole of Vimy

THREE KILLED, 40 ARE INJURED, NEAR DECLAIR

Cause of Express Run-Off Remains a Mystery

FOUR CARS CRASH

Engineer, Fireman and One Passenger Are Victims of Accident

Canadian Press. NEW YORK, April 9.—The Herald-Tribune this morning states that four Canadians were among the two score injured when the Atlantic City express, which left here yesterday for Delair, N. J., with the loss of three lives.

The Canadians injured were: Mrs. E. K. Rose and her daughters, Beatrice and Martha, of Hamilton, Ont.; Percival Stevenson, Ottawa, Ont. A preliminary investigation by Pennsylvania railroad officials failed to reveal the cause of the derailment. Eleven of the injured passengers were still in hospitals today.

FOUR CARS DERAILED

It was while rounding a curve near Delair that the engine and four cars left the rails. The train, known as the "Little Blue," consisted of eight parlor cars and a club car. The engineer, John O'Connor, and the fireman, Anthony Franklin, both of Jersey City, were so badly scalded that they died soon after. The third man killed was William Mintz, of New York, a passenger, who was riding in the first car. He was crushed to death when the car was telescoped.

ITALIAN REPRISALS

Homes of Anti-Fascists in Milan Burned; Three Killed in Clash

LONDON, April 9.—A dispatch from Chasso, Italy, to the Daily Herald, today reports three persons killed and many wounded in Marcella, Calabria, during a clash between Fascist police and the population. Twenty homes of anti-Fascists in Milan have been wrecked and burned and their occupants beaten, the dispatch says in reprisals for Wednesday's attempt of a demented British woman to assassinate the Premier.

CURBING SPEEDERS

Greek Police Have Effective Way of Dealing With Recalcitrant Drivers

ATHENS, April 9.—Poles five feet long and studded with large nails are to be supplied to the Athenian police as a means of curbing recalcitrant chauffeurs who insist on driving their motor-cars at excessive speed. Any chauffeur who disobeys a police signal to slow down will henceforth expose his tires to the assaults of these formidable weapons, in the use of which the police are instructed to exercise the utmost freedom.

WHO'S WHO IN THE DAYS NEWS

ROBERTO FARINACCI.

THE man whom it is said Benito Mussolini most fears, Roberto Farinacci, secretary general of the Fascist party, has announced his intention of resigning from that office.

Although only 33, undoubted, he has been the right hand man of Mussolini and has been called the "Tyrant of Cremona" and the "Right Fist of the Fascist Party."

His chief has had to keep a strict watch over his aide since Farinacci once had designs on the dictatorship.

He became a member of the Black Shirts forces at their inception. From the obscurity of a railroad employe before the war he rose to political prominence following the march on Rome in October, 1922.

Of all the Fascists he was perhaps the most radical. Being opposed to constitutional government, Farinacci wanted to resort to the most extreme measures to establish Fascist rule.

He was the leader of the extremists of the party, the Selvaggi.

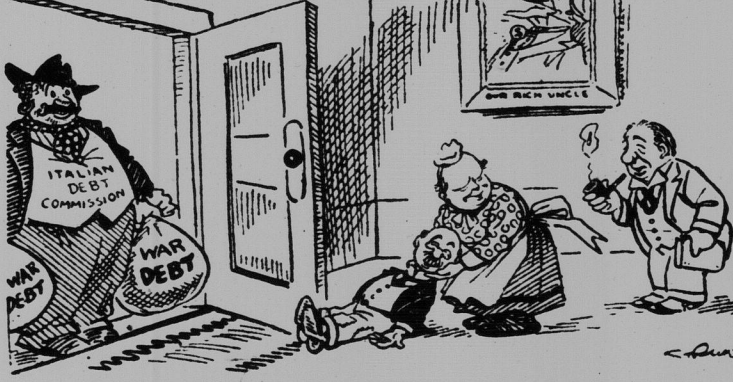
He evidently has powers of persuasion, for in 1924 with little education and inability to speak Italian correctly, he got Mussolini to make him a lawyer.

The next year he was made secretary-general of the party.

He has been in the limelight recently in connection with the Matteotti murder trial at Ghetti. As chief counsel for the defense he secured the acquittal of two men and light sentences for the other three who were implicated in the murder of the Socialist deputy.

Thereby succeeding in shedding a certain glamour over the deed.

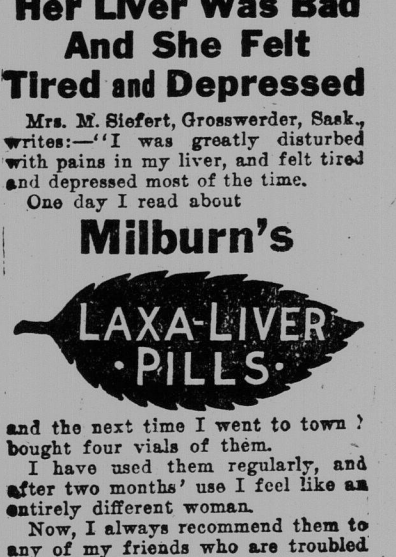
LEVY UNCHANGED ON 25-CENT ADMISSION Higher Entrance Charges to Carry With Them Higher Imposts

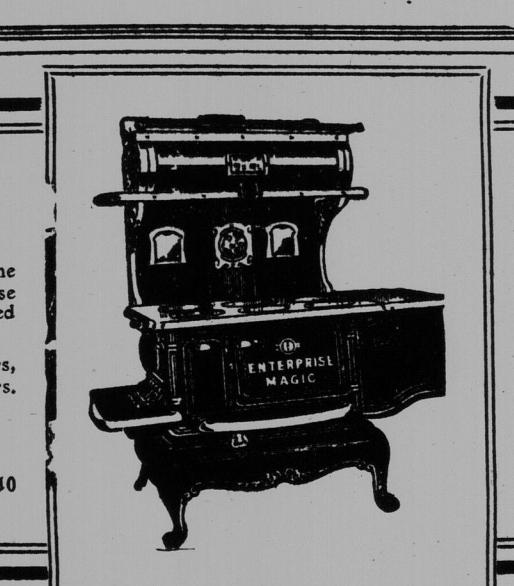

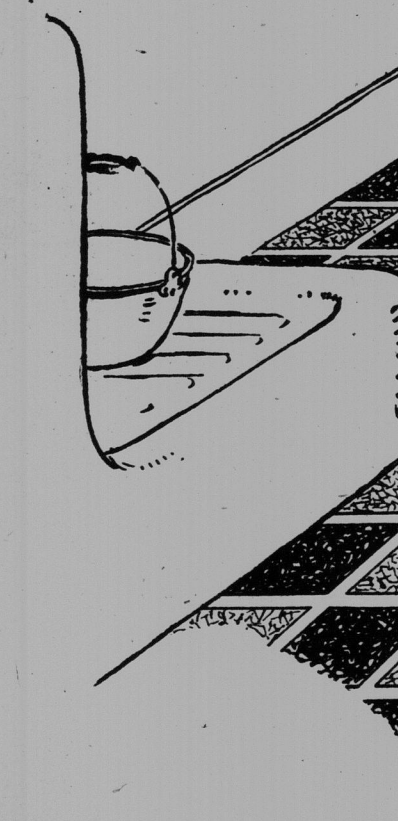

Ex-Premier Veniot Advocates Imposts On Energy Developed In and Exported From N. B.

Terms Direct Taxation Remedy More Fatal in Far Reaching Results Than Malady It is Intended to Cure

\$100,000 CUT IN BRIDGE COSTS ASKED

Co-operation With Lumbermen to Increase Stumpage Rates and Levies on Street Railways, Telephone, Telegraph, Trust Companies Urged in Speech to Legislature

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 8.—Direct taxation in New Brunswick is a remedy more far reaching in what he termed its "fatal" results than the malady it is intended to cure, Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, leader of the opposition, declared in his speech on the budget today and he proceeded to suggest several avenues the Government could follow to balance the budget without resorting to a direct impost, probably the most interesting being a suggestion to place a levy of \$2 or \$3 on each horse power developed at Grand Falls as well as energy in other parts of the province. He further advocated a tax on electrical energy exported from the province and expressed the opinion that from this source alone it would be possible to raise about \$100,000 annually.

He pleaded with the government to stay its hand in placing a law on the statute books that would permit the government to levy on the municipalities to balance the budget. He insisted he was prepared to go the limit with the government in obtaining new revenue in order to avert direct taxation. The government, he charged, was violating its pledge to the people by introducing this tax.

WANTS INFORMATION. Hon. Dr. Veniot said he had no quarrel with the taxes on banks, insurance companies, and increases in the amusement tax, but what influence had been brought to bear on the government not to tax trust companies, telephone companies, and telegraph companies? He asked the provincial secretary-treasurer to provide him with that information before the House proceeded.

Briefly summarized, Hon. Mr. Veniot advocated the following policies to avoid direct taxation: Taxes on street railways, telephone companies, trust companies and telegraph companies.

WOULD CUT BRIDGE OUTLAY. Reduction in the expenditure on ordinary bridges from \$200,000, as named in the estimates, to \$100,000, and reduction of expenditure against capital account for main and secondary trunk roads.

Secure the co-operation of the lumbermen in an endeavor to raise stumpage rates for this year. Tax on electrical energy developed in province and tax on energy exported from province.

Taxes on inter-provincial companies. Increases in succession duties. Hon. Dr. Veniot went into the most exhaustive financial statement that the House has listened to this year, and he reached the conclusion that while the government has increased the debt, it had also provided a sufficient sinking fund to meet all bonded debts contracted since 1908, when it matured. New Brunswick, he declared, was the only province that had a sufficient sinking fund to meet its debt in this regard when due and its bonds commanded the highest price in the money markets of the world. This statement aroused much applause from the opposition members.

STUMPAGE RATES. Hon. Dr. Veniot devoted much time to the stumpage rates and charged that the present government had violated the statute in regard to the fixation of this rate when they reduced it from \$3 to \$2.50, soon after assuming power.

In conclusion he referred at length to the Musquash development, charging that it was a self-sustaining proposition. Referring to the remarks of James L. Lord, Government member for Charlotte, Hon. Mr. Veniot asked Mr. Lord to formulate a public accounts committee for investigation.

STEWART ADJOURNS DEBATE. Hon. Dr. Veniot commenced his address in the afternoon and did not finish until late in the evening. He was preceded by E. W. Melville, Government member for Charlottetown, in the gallery to hear the former premier, Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, adjourned the debate and he will be followed tomorrow by A. A. Dysart, former Speaker of the House.

MELVILLE'S SPEECH. Mr. Melville devoted much of his speech to agriculture, claiming that the benefits received were not, in his opinion, proportionate to the expenditure in the Department of Agriculture. Turning to the budget, he declared there was too much overhead in the government administration and that there were too many officials and too many public buildings. There were too many members in the Legislature, he said, and the country could get along very well with the reduction of from 25 to 50 per cent.

VENIOT'S SPEECH. Beginning his speech, Mr. Veniot said: "During the debate on the address the Premier took occasion to refer to the relation of the Maritime Provinces and he contended that while the dream of Confederation, as far as the Maritimes are concerned, had not been fully realized, it was in large part due to the failure of other parts of the Dominion to recognize fairness of our demands for fuller recognition by the central government. I concur in part with what he said, but at the same time I wish to point out that the lack of recognition of our situation is also due in part to our own lack of initiative in impressing upon other sections of Canada our grievances."

PLEASED TO SEE CHANGE. "I am pleased to see that this lack of initiative is fast disappearing and

doubt. It was during the former regime of my friends opposite, between 1908 and 1917, that the increase of the debt brought the heaviest burdens upon the province, because they continued to increase it without making any adequate provision for its redemption.

"In the matter of the Valley Railway which they burdened the province with a debt, not only without making provision for redemption, but without providing for the payment of interest on the sum borrowed, which amounted to nearly \$8,000,000, and which interest charges leave a deficit of a yearly average of \$200,000. The contract they made with the Conservative government in 1913 for the operation of this railway was the most unbusinesslike ever heard of in the history of our province."

MOVIE AND GAS TAXES. "While no details are given by which one can form a definite idea of how the extra tax on amusements will be levied, I wish to express the hope that the Government will see its way clear not to increase the rate on the tickets up to and including 25 cents. This is, so to speak, the poor man's ticket."

"In the matter of the extra taxation in connection with the automobiles, I feel that the Government should have laid all the details before the House when introducing the budget. I note the estimated increase in revenue is \$800,000 for the year. It is impossible to obtain that increase by the imposition of a gasoline tax of three cents a gallon, unless the intention is to tax all gasoline sold in the province and allow no rebate to those who use gasoline for other than automobiles. I hope such is not the intention of the Government."

"I would like to know if it is the intention of the Government to earmark all revenue from automobiles so that it will be used exclusively for road purposes by the funding of the same. If such is the case then there is no need of the tax being so high."

MUSQUASH DEVELOPMENT. "A great deal has been heard about the failure of Musquash from a financial standpoint. I desire to point out that I consider a serious discrepancy in the report of the special audit, made last fall before the close of the fiscal year. "In this special audit we find the following: 'The total investment in Musquash is \$4,337,463. The Commission would require to earn 12 per cent on \$3,500,000 or \$420,000 annually to meet all charges.' "Further on in the report a table is given which shows that 117 per cent is sufficient. Why, then, charge 12 per cent when less is sufficient, and why make the charge on more than the total investment. Under their own figures the total revenue required to meet all charges would be \$390,488 and not \$420,000."

SPECIAL AUDITORS. "I have given to the House what these special auditors said it would be necessary to attribute its need for existence to the excessive increase of the public debt under the Foster-Veniot regime between the years 1917 and 1925, is but a flimsy excuse for a government which apparently does not possess sufficient business acumen to meet the conditions necessitated by a decrease in revenue due to large part of their own misdoings when in office between 1908 and 1917, and still further added to by the fact since they have assumed office last fall. The close examination of the public debt, which I consider a serious discrepancy in the report of the special audit, clearly shows the utter fallacy of such a contention."

DEBT INCREASE. "It is true that when in office we did increase the public debt, but we did not increase it out of proportion to the need that we left off, and that instead of creating the office of industrial agent that he push with vigor the scheme of repatriation, but I hesitate to do so, especially now that the government has seen fit to resort to the policy of direct taxation as defined in the speech of the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer. What encouragement can our people have to return to their native land faced with such a drastic measure of taxation? It would now be only a waste of money to make the attempt. Our people will never return with the spectre of direct taxation staring them in the face."

EFFECT ON INVESTMENTS. "What incentive is there for investment of outside capital to stimulate our industrial life when it becomes known that the government has introduced a direct taxation policy which will effect real and personal estate and income. Everyone knows how industry tries to avoid taxation and what demands are made on municipalities for exemptions or a fixed rate of taxation. I fear, Mr. Speaker, that all the good intentions of the government with regard to repatriation and encouragement of industry have been knocked on the head by the counter movement of direct taxation."

"I also note that the Premier in his speech manifested a very deep interest for the agricultural industry, the most important of our province. We must do all we can for agriculture, but here again we must have federal aid to help in the development of outside markets for our farm products, and we must encourage our farmers to provide material for outside markets."

AGRICULTURE. "When I heard the Premier say that everything possible must be done for agriculture, I expected, when the budget was presented, to see something of a very tangible nature in the way of helping the industry, but when I made a study of the budget and it was revealed that the small sum of \$2,000 only

On the other hand, if this charge for replacements were not made, but carried over for a period of years, as is the case in all utilities which carry a sinking fund, the cash surplus would have been \$2,887 on volume of business which at the present time utilized a little more than half of the installed capacity of the plant."

CLAIMS SURPLUS. "The result in the Musquash case in plain words is that the undertaking has paid its way and has a cash surplus of \$2,887, clear of the charge for future replacements."

"The act provides that any surplus left after paying maintenance, operation, administration, interest and sinking fund, may be placed to the credit of replacement and renewal account. It is not necessary, at least during the first period of five years, to do this. There is not one cent deficit in sinking fund. I notice that the new auditors have made this charge a 'book deficit' and rightly so."

"The question may be asked: 'Will this book deficit ever disappear?' It will disappear as the volume of business increases and gradually reaches the maximum development at Musquash plant. Let me point out how this can be accomplished."

CASE OF MONCTON. "Take the case of Moncton. This city has contracted for a minimum of 5,000,000 k.w.h. and I think its maximum is 7,500,000. Moncton has reached its minimum and from now on the revenue from that source will increase gradually without there being any increase in the charges for operation, or overhead. When Moncton reaches its maximum it will be contributing more revenue at its present rate than will be necessary to meet all charges of whatsoever nature. The volume of business will rapidly cause the deficit on future renewals to disappear and the extra earnings from increased volume of business will be sufficient to make up its share of deficits in years when 12 years, and at the same time pay from that period onward a renewal account sufficient to meet all ordinary necessary renewals during the period in which such renewals may be necessary, say in 15 or 20 years."

CASE OF SAINT JOHN. "The very same principle applies in the case of Saint John, especially when it reaches beyond the maximum period of rise. Even if Saint John does not reach its maximum contracted for, but say reaches only 2,000,000 k.w.h. above its minimum, it would be contributing some \$24,000 a year more than it does now without there being any further overhead charges against the commission. If it reaches its maximum it will be paying around \$60,000 more annually than it now pays. "With Moncton paying in an additional \$45,000 and Saint John another addition of \$24,000 (or \$60,000 when it

reaches its full maximum) it will readily be seen how rapidly any deficits on renewal account, accumulated during the first five years, would disappear, when the increase over the present year's income would be at the rate of \$90,000 or more. Inside of 15 years all deficits would have disappeared and you would have a full renewal reserve intact. This is the reason why all transactions of this kind are recognized as a book deficit in the first years of operation of a utility of this kind. "With further reference to this special audit, let me point out that the auditors have gone out of their way to deal with the capacity of Musquash and to make comparisons or draw conclusions which are not founded on fact."

Among other things the report says: 'While there is 11,000 installed horsepower, the peak of the present output does not exceed 6,000 horsepower and they are obliged to go to the Power Company.' "The latter part of that statement is very misleading. The agreement referred to made between the commission and the Power Company was made by the former commission and ratified, I believe, by the present commission. The reason for such an agreement was to secure additional power to enable the commission to extend the use of energy to certain sections of the province which could not be supplied from Musquash at the time, owing to the
