FIFTY YEARS IN

The celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the origin of the International Sunday School Lessons will be a feature of the Sixteenth International Sunday School Convention at Kansas City, Mo., June 21-27, 1922.

For fifty-one years the Sunday School world has been familiar with the International Uniform Lesson a plan of study in which all classes from Beginners to the Adult Bible Class use exactly the same brief Scripture lesson for a given Sunday—the title of the lesson and the golden text being identical for every class. To some extent the "helps" are graded and adapted to the different age interests and capacities.

The boy or girl who could recite from memory the greatest number of verses Sunday after Sunday was considered the best pupil in the school. 



CHARGES AGAINS

Alleged Conspiracy to Assist Former Evangelist to Escape from the Los Angeles

Los Angeles, May 25-Charges of con spiracy to assist Herbert W. Wilson. former evangelist of London, Ont., and alleged mail robber and murderer, to escape from jail, resting against his brother, Frank Wilson, and his reputed brother, Frank Wilson, and his reputed sweetheart, Helen Gillespie, were dismissed in the U. S. district court here yesterday. Frank Wilson had been unable to obtain a bond of \$25,000 and had been in the county jail since early in April. Miss Gillespie had been free under hond of \$5,000.

Their arrest followed an alleged attempt by Herbert Wilson, his alleged accomplice, Herbert Cox and Eddie O'Brien, another alleged mail robber to cseape from the Los Angeles county jail. Cox was killed when sheriff's deputies frustrated the escape. In his last words he accused Wilson.







ASKS MORE SEA MAIL PAY. Otherwise Oceanic Steamship Line May Have to Quit.

Washington, May 23. — Because the Ocean Steamship Company's mail contract expires June 80 and no provision has been made for renewal, this company, which is the only American passenger line in the Pacific running below the equator, may have to go out of business, according to Frederick S. Samuels, assistant to the president of the company, who is in Washington.

Efforts are being made by the shipping board, the postmaster-general and the secretary of the navy to have the line maintained.

The shipping board will take up the matter Monday. Vice-President Love of the Emergency Fleet Corporation thinks it would be a "crime" to permit the Oceanic company to go out of business. Secretary Denby is anxious to have the service maintained. because it provides the only American line to Samoa.

It is not believed that the shipping board can take up the run because it might lose by the venture more than the mail compensation sought by the Oceanic Company. The cost of operating ships has doubled since the rate of compensation was fixed by the post office department. Trade conditions are not too promising because of the preferential tariff in Australia for goods carried in British bottoms. tariff in Australia for goods carried in







"UBER ALLES" CAUSES A BIG ROW ON SHIP

The Refusal of Passengers to Stand when "Deutschland" is Sung Angers German-Dashes His Glass to Floor.

The failure of some of those gathered in the smoking room of the North German Lloyd liner Seydlitz to stand up when "Deutschland uber Alles" was sung led to one young German breaking his wine glass on the floor as a sign of his disapproval, caused a flurry of excitement on board, and furnished cabin passengers a subject for conversation during the voyage from Bremen which ended at New York on Saturday. The excitable young man who dashed his wine glass to the floor—one version was that he threw it at the offenders—was Captain Fritz von Falkenhayn, formerly an aide to General Tomsen, commanding the German air force.

There was a convivial gathering in the smoking room on Tuesday night. Many were Germans, but there was a sprinkling of Americans. Several women also were present. Someone started singing German songs and soon nearly everyone present was contributing to the chorus. When "Deutschland uber Alles" was started most of those present got to their feet. Some did not. One such group remained seated near Captain Faikenhayn. He stopped singing for a few seconds and glared at the offenders. It had no effect. One version of what happened then was that the captain asked why they did not stand up. The reply came promptly that they preferred not to do so, and whether courtesy demanded that all should stand was a matter of

opinion.

Those in the room sensed that something was wrong, and there was a buzz of excitement as most of those present moved toward the captain and the seated group, which included several women. After a second of silence the captain dashed his glass to the floor at the feet of those who had refused to get out of their chairs. Then he strode indignantly out of the room. HOSPITALS ON STANDARD LIST FIND BENEFIT

Dr. M. T. MacEachern, Addressing Conference of Surgeons, Gives an Interesting Address on Standardization.

(Halifax Chronicle.)
On Friday, at the School for the Blind, a Hospital Coneference was held, Dr. H. K. Macdonald presiding. Among the addresses delivered was one of special interest to Canadians on "Hospital Standardization in Canada." This address was given by Dr. M. T. MacEachern, superintendent of the Vancouver General Hospital and director-general of the Victorian Order of Nurses. Discussing his subject, Dr. MacEachern said in part:—

"Hospital standardization has been carried on simultaneously in Canada and the United States for the past five years. This year our visitors or surveyors are reaching every hospital of fifty beds and over. This means that at least 134 hospitals in Canada will be examined and rated. Last year hospitals of 100 beds and over were considered and all such institutions in Nova Scotia were in our standard list.

"I find that all the hospitals are receiving the programme with very great enthusiasm, and I believe that a great showing will be made this year. Hospitals are seeing such practical results that each year as the work goes on greater interest is created.
"This programme is presented by the

"This programme is presented by the visitor, and, as you were told, asks that there be such a service established within the hospital that the patient may get in the hospital that the patient may get the best chance possible for the best result that medical science can give—and this means that the hospital must have an ethical and organized staff of the medical men attending who shall meet at regular intervals—not less frequent than once a month—and who shall review the work of the hospital for the previous period with the idea of finding out the quality of same for that period with particular investigation of unimproved, complications, infections following operation or maternity, and deaths. AN ENGINEERING MYSTERY

It seems impossible that an iron bar with a hole through the centre should be stronger than a solid bar of the same diameter, but this has actually been proved to be the case. A British firm has developed a very ingenious process of making what it cally a hollow cored bar with this increase of strength. The hollow core is really a small hole which extends from end to end of the bar. Obviously it would be a very costly business to bore a hole through the bar, and in consequence this firm has developed a clever way of making the bar hollow without drilling. The mass of metal from which the bar is drawn is drilled in the first case, and the hole is packed tight with a special composition. packed tight with a special composition.

This represented a spread of 59 cents per \$100 between what the government received and what the investors paid. The fourth loan was the \$100,000,000 issue, also floated by the present government and which was sold in New York at 97½ and subsequently issued to investors at these states.

The Loan Policy.



Duties on Cigars.

"It is also proposed to readjust the duties on cigars which will have the effect of reducing the duties on the low priced cigars, allowing medium priced ones at thep resent rates and increase the more expensive cigars. The proposed method is by decreasing the customs and excise duties and putting on a graduated rate according to value under the special war revenue act. It is estimated that the change will make a very slight increase in the revenue. crease in the revenue.
"The Canadian cigar manufacturer will

enjoy practically the same advantage over imported cigars as he enjoys at present. It is also proposed to abolish the duty on Canadian raw leaf tobacco when it is taken into a licensed tobacco no doubt increase the consumption of the lower priced tobacco and cigars and the lower priced tobacco and cigars and therefore will increase the demand for Canadian raw leaf tobacco without much loss of revenue, if any. Apparently a large quantity of Canadian raw leaf tobacco is now consumed on which the government only receives a duty of five cents a pound. It is expected that a much larger quantity of this tobacco will be taken into licensed tobacco and cigar. be taken into licensed tobacco and cigar manufactories on which a duty of twenty cents a pound will be collected. Chronicle, Halifax:—"It is a downward revision of the tariff, following the lines of the Liberal policy laid down in the resolution moved by Mr. Fielding and seconded by Mr. Mackenzie King at the last session of parliament, the aim of which was the encouragement of the industries based on the natural resources of the country, of which agriculture is the chief. To that end reductions are generally made in the duties on implements and tools of industry and labor, as well as on many necessaries of daily consumption by all classes.

"The reductions made are generally under the British preference. The unsettled tariff position of the United States made that inevitable. Canada would welcome better trade relations with her neighbor. She has indicated that she is ready to open negotiations for reciprocal trade, but, as Mr. Fielding pointed out, until there is a fair understanding of what the Americans intend to do, Canada must hold her hand. On a number of articles chiefly imported from the United States reductions have been made for the benefit of farmers, fishermen and others. Not the least important of the changes made is the wiping out of customs provisions in the last tariff which were both undesirable and unworkable and found to be a serious handicap to business and an added burden for the people.

"On the whole, we believe the tariff

The Tariff Changes, on Automobiles

Ottawa, May 24—Automobiles valued at not more than \$1,200 are to pay an excise tax of five per cent. Automobiles valued at more than \$1,200 are to pay an excise tax of ten per cent. The text of the resolution regarding collection of this excise tax reads: "Where the goods are imported such excise tax shall be paid by the importer and where the goods are manufactured and sold in Canada such excise tax shall be paid by the manufacturers. Provided that if an automobile is on the 24th day of May, 1922, in the hands of a dealer and not sold to a bona fide user, the tax shall be paid by such dealer when such automobile is sold. In the general tariff schedules under title of "settlers' effects" motor cars up to the value of \$1,000 are admitted free.
