

New York, June 5—The Aquitania, the new kiner of the Cunard Company, and the largest ship afloat under the British flag, arrived at quarantine early today on her maiden voyage to this port. For twenty-four hours up to noon yesterday she covered 602 nautical miles. The Aquitania docked without mishap. She made the passage in five days, seventeen hours and forty-three minutes, over a course of 3,181 miles.
