MENTAL DEFICIENCY BILL IN THE BRITISH COMMONS

(Correspondence of the Montreal "Witness.")

London, March 31—On Tuesday, March 25, the Mental Deficiency Bill was reintroduced in the House of Commons by the home secretary, Mr. McKenna. It had already been under discussion in the house last session, but the government were compelled to drop it, owing to the loss of time occasioned by the tories' snap division on home rule. It is to be hoped that during this session it will successfully become law. Such a measure has been long expected and long desired. So long ago as 1908 the royal commission on the feeble minded, in its report, recommended the establishment of a central authority dealing with all classes of mental defects, including lunatics, idiots, impecciles, feeble-minded and the morally defective.

what is a Defective

These provisions meet with general approval, but Mr. McKenna has encountered a good deal of opposition in his definition of mental defectives, who are to come under the operation of the act. There they are described as "those who are incapable of competing on equal terms with their normal fellows, of managing themselves and their affairs with ordinary prudence . . and persons who, through mental infirmity arising from age or the decay of their faculties are incapable of managing themselves and their affairs." This is a very wide definition. True, such persons must be subject to certain other conditions before they come under the act. They must be found wandering, neglected, cruelly treated, or charged with the commission of offences, or be habitual inebriates, or be a danger to the community in some form or another. These stipulations are very vague; and it has been observed with truth that, with these definitions, the act might be made to include a man simply because he had no settled abode and had always been at the bottom of his class in school." It is to be hoped—indeed, it seems most likely—that the bill will be amended in this respect. It will be sufficient for its purpose if it segregates those who are defective criminals and drunkards; in the interests of the community it is right that they should be deprived of the opportunities of parenthood. But to segregate those who are likely to be merely undesirable parents is a eugenic measure for which the time is not ripe. Mr. McKenna will be well advised if he drops his present definition of persons coming under the act, and adopts instead such a one a is proposed by a private member's bill "Feeble-minded persons such as are source of injury and mischief to them selves and others."







The St. John Street Railway Company is to be notified that, unless the work on the street railway extension to Kane's Corner is started within thirty days and work done that will indicate that the line will be completed immediately, the order of the common council of February 13, 1913, granting the company the right to build a single line road to Kane's Corner will be cancelled. This action was decided upon at the meeting of the city commissioners yesterday afternoon.

In introducing the resolution, Commissioner Agar said: "It is now two years since the right to build the line was given the railway company. It was thought then that the work would be done in a few months, but the matter has been hanging off and nothing done. When corporations ask for these privileges it is hardly to be expected that that approval is to extend over a century. On February 18, this year, I received a letter from the St. Railway Company, which said, that on account of the conditions imposed by the council it had been decided not to double track the line but a single track would be put down." On February 21, Mr. Agar sent a letter to the company in regard to the matter and said that the road engineer would be ready at any time to give the proper street lines. Since that time nothing had been heard from the railway company.


