McFarlane's Father, in Court, Says Son is Not Guilty One

REMAINED FOR PRESENT

Three Cases of Fire Setting in City in Daylight Followed by Arrest in North End on Suspicion—The Court Proceedings

The large number of incendiary fires that have been reported in the last few weeks, and the fact that a man had been arrested yesterday afternoon on suspicion of setting fires in the office of the St. John Sign Co. in Union street, the Market building and the court house around here, has attracted the attention of the police and the public.

The space outside the rail was packed to the doors by men who were anxious to hear proceedings in the case against William P. McFarlane, who was arrested in Main street about 5.30 yesterday afternoon by Chief Clark on suspicion of having set fire to the buildings mentioned. McFarlane appeared rather pale when he was brought upstairs from his cell. When the charge was read out to him he was told by Magistrate Ritchie that he was not required to plead, but he repeated several times, "Not guilty."

The death of Miss Ellen Bullock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Bullock, of Rock street, occurred this morning in the General Public Hospital after an illness of seven weeks. Her death was due to typhoid fever. The young lady, who was nineteen years of age, was a member of the Brussels street Baptist church, and also of the Thorne Lodge, I. O. G. T. She had many friends who will sympathize with her family in their bereavement. Her funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from her father's residence, 23 Rock street.

BLOCKED IN ICE

Serious Loss in Rolling Stock and Freight and in Damage to Roadbed—Cars Left Middle of the Train

HORSE AND WAGON INTO THE WATER; OWNER GOES ALSO

Considerable excitement was caused about noon today in Indiantown when H. D. Ferris, grocer, of Adelaide street, was suddenly toppled from a small boat into the waters of the harbor while endeavoring to get up his wagon from the river bottom, after it had been hoisted by Mr. Ferris. The wagon was stuck on the rocks of the harbor and the boat was loaded with a load of lumber. Mr. Ferris, with some friends, got down in a small boat to grapple for the wagon and bring it to the surface and it was while thus engaged that the little craft suddenly and he was thrown into the water. He was rescued without difficulty, however, and continued the work of trying to get up the wagon. He lost part of his freight overhead as well.

METHODIST MINISTERS PLAN FOR MOUNT ALLISON

HIS DOCTORS HOPEFUL

Recovery Rests With Pontiff's Carrying Out of Their Instructions—Illness is Following its Normal Course

RECOVERY RESTS WITH PONTIFF'S CARRYING OUT OF THEIR INSTRUCTIONS—ILLNESS IS FOLLOWING ITS NORMAL COURSE

Rome, April 15—The Pope's condition is unchanged. After leaving the bedside Professor Marchisava said: "I now really trust that the Pope's illness will have a favorable solution if it is possible to induce the patient to take proper care of himself."

The morning bulletin issued by the papal physicians, Professor Marchisava and Dr. Amici was as follows: "The Holy Father was again without fever this morning. His temperature is 97. The cough has diminished and expectoration has become easier and copious. The Pontiff's general condition has always been satisfactory.

The superstitious seem to think they find corroboration in the fact that the tombstone of Pius Sylvester II, in the Basilica of St. John of Lateran, is still dry. The marble slab on the tomb, which bears his epitaph is reputed to be always bedewed when a Pope is dying. It is declared that this has never failed for ten centuries to give a premonition of the death of the pontiff, who has passed away in this period. The phenomenon occurred, as usual on the day that Pope Leo XIII. died. From that day to this it has been dry.

Scepticism in regard to the official statement is not following. The Pope's illness is now favorable to him. The patient suffers from suffocating paroxysms of what are called bronchial asthma, to which certain anesthetic inhalations are frequently used.

The Pope's weakness continues and remains a serious matter. Stimulants and tonics have failed to contract his debility. This causes pitiable depression and an unobtainable fit of weeping.

Professor Marchisava said: "The illness of the Pope is now taking its normal course. The patient will have better when the hours of the forenoon after his night's rest. He had a slight setback late yesterday afternoon when his temperature rose slightly.

"If it is possible to induce Pope Pius to follow the orders of his medical advisers, the amelioration of his condition will bring with it a revival of strength. In other words, the recovery of the Pope is chiefly in his own hands."

"The Pope is a most difficult patient to deal with. While apparently giving in to the recommendations of his physicians, the moment he feels slightly better, he insists on having his own way, saying, 'I am a priest and I will do as I please.'"

The clearing up of the weather today, which was bright and sunny, although cold, is taken here as a hopeful augury for the recovery of the Pope, who himself became cheerful when his attendant deer blinds this morning, and let the sun shine stream into the room.

Father Parolin, the Pope's nephew, came into the bed chamber immediately afterward and helped him unclog his ears and milk being greatly appreciated by the Pope who repeated several times, "This reminds me of old times."

Father Parolin then left his uncle with Mr. Bressan, his private secretary and went to the telephone to give his parents, the Pope's sisters, the satisfactory morning report.

In the meantime Dr. Amici notified Prof. Marchisava of the Pontiff's condition.

Father Parolin, who has installed himself in a small room in the Vatican adjoining the Pope's apartments did not even attend during the night, in order that he should be able to watch the patient closely. He declared this morning that the Pope had suffered from only three coughing spells from midnight till morning and that the cough was much looser and caused much less discomfort. He said, he said, was stronger and his respiration more regular.

When Professor Marchisava appeared the Pope was so cheerful that he yielded to the physician in the way he was accustomed to do before his relapse. He congratulated the professor on the realization of his prediction in regard to his amelioration whereupon Professor Marchisava answered: "I will make another prediction—you will have a further relapse if you behave imprudently and if you do not patiently fulfill the doctor's commands."

Set Up a Little While

At the request of the Pope, who had said frequently that he could not stand remaining in bed, which renders him nervous, agitated and weak, Professor Marchisava authorized the pontiff to get up while his bed was being made, but would not allow him to walk.

At 11 o'clock the Pope was assisted from his bed and removed to an arm chair close by. He had been there only a few minutes when he showed signs of dissatisfaction and began sighing. He finally said: "That tyrant Marchisava forbids me to walk. At least carry me to the window so that I may enjoy the sun."

This was done immediately to the great delight of the Pope.

At noon the pontiff took some chicken jelly, which seemed to refresh him greatly. After his afternoon sleep, it was observed that the pontiff looked very bright and happy. Although he was advised not to talk he insisted on explaining how he had just awakened from a most wonderful

At the last add the fragrant oils, then beat cream until it firms.

MONTREAL SISTERS TO FOLLOW EXAMPLE OF FATHER DAMIEN All Volunteer and Four Are Chosen For Work Among The Lepers. Montreal, April 15.—Four Catholic sisters will leave Outremont at an early date to give the remainder of their lives to service in the leper settlement on Skecklung Island, close to Canton, China. Here there are 1,200 lepers, men, women and children, some as young as ten years. Many of the sufferers are in an unsightly condition through the ravages of the awful disease.

SERVANT GIRL MATTER IS DISCUSSED AT MEETING HERE

Thomas Howell, commissioner of emigration and colonization for the Canadian Northern Railway, and Mrs. Burlington-Ham, ship's matron on the Royal George, addressed a meeting in the King's Daughters' Guild yesterday afternoon, dealing with some of the problems of girls who emigrate to enter domestic service. Mr. Howell recommended the establishment of a residential club for such girls and told of the efforts his company made to look after the girls while they were in their care, the appointment of ship's matrons for the purpose being an illustration.

After investigations and members of a "slumming" party said they had heard an improper song in a place on 21st street the commission voted to recommend to Mayor Harrison that the cafe's license be revoked and would call the attention of the state's attorney to the testimony of the manager, who said nothing indecent went on. Senator Beall said he saw girls not more than fifteen or sixteen years, using mixed drinks in the cafe and some of them were more or less intoxicated. Mrs. Maude Joseph described the singing and dancing at a downtown restaurant. She said one dance the performer "might just as well have been without clothes." Another dancer wore pink tights and a skirt of black chiffon. She thought the dance was suggestive, judging from the remarks of male diners. She said two people did a fancy dance, a combination between the "fanny" and the "apache."

"Was it art or suggestion?" asked the lieutenant-governor. "There was no art in it." Mrs. Joseph said such a dance might not have any effect upon young women, but she would not want to risk it. The performers then led a free-for-all dance. "There was one girl about fifteen, who danced a peculiar kind of dance for public exhibition," she said. "Her partner held her at arm's length and at intervals would suddenly embrace her. No there was not any art in it." The professionals who led this free for all dance said they had tried to eliminate anything which might appear sensual in their act, but admitted they might not have been entirely successful. "Don't you think that where you see art others might see vice?" asked Mr. O'Hara. "If I guess it appeals differently, but I don't see anything obscene about it." A. B. Stinson, manager of another downtown restaurant, asserted the business had drifted into a show, but he was compelled to put up a first-class cabaret to get the trade. He was of the opinion that some popular songs had gone too far and said he did not allow "In My Haven" to be sung in his restaurant. He said guests did the "bear" dance in the aisles between tables, but they never got on "raw."

THE SPRING SEASON

The balmy air of yesterday brought the first real assurance of spring, for though the ground has been bare for a considerable time the atmosphere continued cold and somewhat disagreeable. Now, however, we may look forward to more pleasing conditions. The grass will soon be springing green in the squares and vacant spaces, and in Rockwood Park the odor of budding trees will scent the air. The time has arrived for the annual spring cleaning of the streets and backyards, and this should not be delayed. It may be hoped that the city council will be able within the next year or so to devise some better means of getting rid of garbage and the refuse of winter than now prevails. In many cases the accumulations of the winter are left lying about in the backyards until the weather is warm enough to make them very obnoxious, and even unhealthy, and breeding places for flies. Sometimes a tenant finds a neighbor's garbage heap under his window. A modern system of removing waste material promptly and thoroughly should be adopted before the city is much older. It is one of the reforms which are greatly needed. There is another which is suggested by the approach of the warmer season. The board of health should insist upon careful protection and the covering of meats, fruits and other articles of food such as are too often displayed without regard to cleanliness and health. The pleasant spring weather ought to bring with it not merely the desire for enjoyment, but a desire for a general cleaning up of the city.
Since the above paragraph was written it is learned that Mayor Fink yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the city council referred to the necessity of building an incinerator and establishing a system to collect garbage. The mayor's hope that the council would take the matter up at once, and that something would be done this year, will be echoed by every citizen who desires St. John to be a cleaner and healthier city.

MORE BERTHS NEEDED

No doubt some of his friends who have the interests of the city of St. John at heart will send to Hon. Mr. Hazen a marked copy of today's Standard, in which there is an article which contains the following paragraph—
"The urgent need of better accommodation for the winter port traffic was clearly shown yesterday at Sand Point, when with all the berths filled two steamers were compelled to wait outside the island until dock room could be provided, by two of the steamers putting to sea. On account of the congestion at Sand Point a wireless message was sent to the C. P. R. steamer Mount Temple, which at present is about half way across, to finish the run at slow speed, as it would be impossible to give a berth should she arrive on schedule time."
On reading this article from his own personal organ, Mr. Hazen will recognize the importance of more vigorous action to prevent a worse state of congestion at Sand Point next year.

SETS GOOD EXAMPLE

An exchange tells of an interesting experiment that is to be tried by a Minneapolis multi-millionaire who was born on a farm, and after having amassed a great fortune proposes to demonstrate what can be done when scientific methods are applied on a large scale in agriculture. We quote:
"He promises to devote an area of 125 square miles of farm land to a series of farms, 1,000 in number, which is intended shall be operated on most modern methods. In connection therewith will be an agricultural college and demonstration farm and the success of the plan will not be hampered by lack of funds or opportunity, right at home, to apply the most up-to-date methods."
It goes without saying that an enterprise of this kind set down in a farming state will have a great influence upon agricultural methods throughout the whole state. The manner in which this man purposes to use a part of his great fortune is one that might well be adopted by other millionaires. The greatest need of the time in all countries is cheaper and larger agricultural production and better methods of bringing the producer and the consumer together. We are told that in this Minnesota experiment co-operation and organization both in raising and harvesting the crops will be adopted, and the like will no doubt be true with regard to marketing. Under proper management great success ought to be achieved.

THE BELGIAN STRIKE

Liège, Belgium, April 15—The number of men who stopped work in the mines and factories in the vicinity was greater today than yesterday.
Antwerp, Belgium, April 15—Work was more general in the northern sections of the seaport today. In the other parts of the city, the situation was unchanged, the strike generally being only partial.
Brussels, April 15—The suspension of work in the manufacturing suburbs of the Belgian capital was today on about the same scale as yesterday. The usually crowded workmen's trains in the early morning ran half empty today.
Charleroi, April 15—The strike greatly extended here today. Not a miner is working and nearly all the metal workers have laid down their tools.

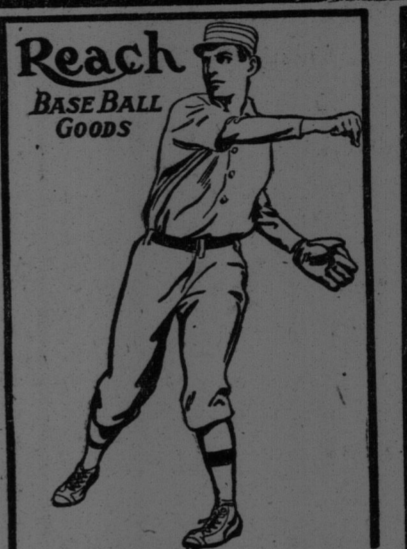

School Matter in Spain

Madrid, April 15—The movement of revolt against the government's proposal to change the education law, by suppressing compulsory religious teaching in the elementary schools is spreading throughout the country, and is being supported by the bishops. The government attributes the movement to political animosity on the part of the right against the left, but it is, as a matter of fact, largely sincere and spontaneous, being due to the fear that the new scheme may only be the first step in a campaign against the church similar to that recently conducted in France. It is urged that the children of non-Catholic Spaniards and foreigners can attend the elementary schools, because to receive instruction in a religion is not the same thing as to profess it, and that children can attend private schools, where religious instruction is not given, so that the object of the scheme can only be to offend the religious feeling of the country in order to satisfy the demands of an insignificant minority. A great meeting of protest had been organized to be held in Madrid, and a large number of ladies prominent in society had promised to attend. About the Bishop of Madrid, after receiving the premier in his palace, postponed the meeting—it is understood in accordance with instructions received from Rome. It is said that the premier gave an undertaking that the Pope said the Spanish Bishops would be consulted before the change was carried into effect.

THIRTY DAYS TO BEGIN WORK ON THE EXTENSION

Council Takes Stand on Kane's Corner Street Railway Matter - Other Business

The St. John Street Railway Company is to be notified, unless the work on the street railway extension to Kane's Corner is started within thirty days and work done that will indicate that the line will be completed immediately, by the order of the common council of February 13, 1913, granting the company the right to build a single line road to Kane's Corner will be cancelled. This action was decided upon at the meeting of the city commissioners yesterday afternoon.

In introducing the resolution, Commissioner Agar said: "It is now two years since the right to build the line was given the railway company. It was thought then that the work would be done in a few months, but the matter has been hanging off and nothing done. When corporations ask for these privileges it is hardly to be expected that they will be put down. On February 21, Mr. Agar sent a letter to the company in regard to the matter and said that the road engineers would be ready at any time to give the proper street lines. Since that time nothing had been heard from the railway company."

The council decided to grant the petition of property owners in Union street, between Charlotte and Waterloo, and lay a permanent pavement in that block.

Mayor Frink drew attention to the need of an incinerator. Legislation authorizing its construction at a cost of about \$50,000 had been secured years ago, and he hoped some action would be taken this year.

The amendments to the traffic by-law, embodying some suggestions made by the automobile association, the street railway company, teamsters and others, was adopted.

The action of the commissioner of public works in engaging A. F. Belding, Driscoll and Robert G. Tupper, W. G. Goodwin and three laborers to carry out the survey of the city streets in the North End, was approved.

The regulations for the town planning commission, which have been prepared by W. F. Burditt, were submitted and will be forwarded to the provincial government for approval.

The purchase of a boiler, by wheel and belt from Johns Cowan for \$300, for use in the public works department, was authorized.

A previous resolution regarding the encroachment of the I. C. R. on Lombard street was rescinded and the arrangement recently made with the department was approved.

The purchase of smoke consumers for the ferries was deferred.

Instructions were given for the sale of two city lots in Brooks ward and the sales of Lancaster property which took place on Saturday were confirmed.

The award of contracts for supplies for the water and sewerage department, as already announced, was confirmed.

The request of the Carpenters' Union that a fair wage provision should be inserted in all city contracts and that the city should pay carpenters \$3 a day, was left to a committee.

The council approved of the movement for the construction of a national highway from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

SOUTH SHORE SERVICE

Local merchants who are interested in the South Shore trade yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms to discuss securing a renewal of the steamship service. They decided to send a telegram to Ottawa to inquire whether anything is being done to make the subsidies more attractive. If not, the merchants may proceed to secure signatures to a petition on behalf of those affected by the lack of communication.

A YEAR AGO TODAY THE TITANIC SANK

The Titanic, the biggest ship in the world, sailed from Southampton, England, on April 10, 1912, on her maiden trip to the United States, in command of Capt. E. J. Smith, with a crew of 800 men and 1,232 passengers. She had been hailed as "the unsinkable ship," with watertight compartments which would stand her in good stead in any emergency.

On the night of Sunday, April 14, in latitude 41°36 north and longitude 50°14 west the great liner, steaming along under a star-dusted sky, struck the submerged spur of an iceberg, which ripped a seam in her side below the water line. There were no fears among the passengers at first that the Titanic would not survive her injuries, but as the water

Ottawa, April 14.—The matter of the government proposal for closure, and the result to Sir Wilfrid Laurier were the topics of discussion in the house today. Hon. Frank Oliver made a stirring speech in resuming the debate.

"Parliament is the clearing house for the thoughts of the people of Canada," he declared. "The government would make it a place where the will of the government is to be registered with no regard to discussion, as it suits the head of that government."

"Surely," said Sir Wilfrid, "the honorable gentleman did not seek protection from the outside when they are fifty stronger than we are."

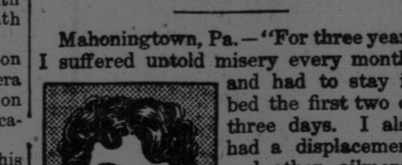

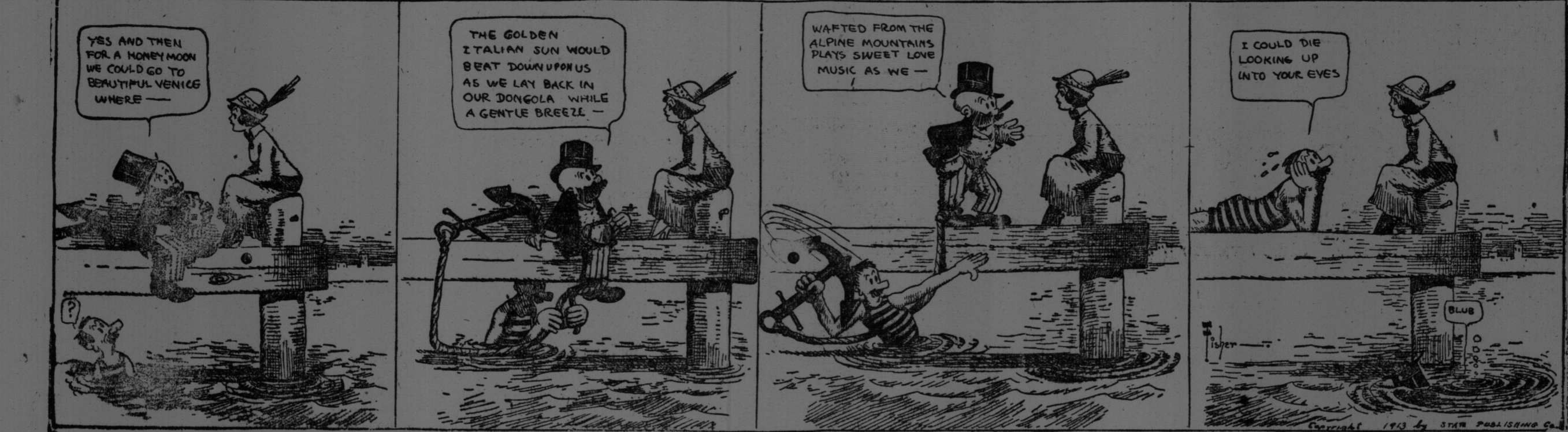

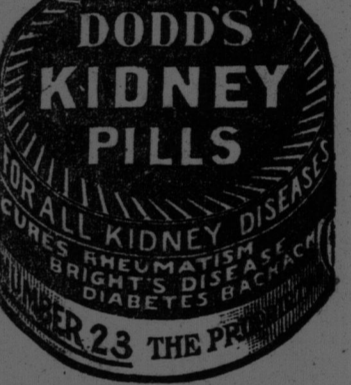
