Sydney, Australia, Nov. 20—The Japanese antarctic expedition aboard the Kainan Maru, which was forced to return here last spring, has started on its second attempt to reach the South Pole. Plans for the organization of a juvenile court and for the inauguration of a detention home for children in connection with this work are outlined in a letter received this morning by Mayor Frink from Commissioner Rees of the Salvation Army.

The best methods of dealing with delinquent boys and girls were discussed at a conference held by officers of the Salvation Army, members of the common council and the county secretary on the occasion of the commissioner's recent visit to the city and at that time it was agreed that the latter should submit a proposition in writing and that it would then be taken up by the council. The Salvation Army effered to undertake the operation of the home if the necessary expenses were guaranteed and it was suggested that the court for dealing with juveniles charged with minor offences should be conducted in connection with the home.
