BYE-LAWS, A The sittings of the County Council of the Municipality of Northumberland, held at the Council Chamber, Newsatle, on Tuesday, the 21st day of January, A. D. 1879:—
Resolved: That the following Bye-Law be made and established for the government of the said Municipality.

A Bye-Law Relating to Booms and Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland:—
1. That the Boom Master in charge of the Bornaby River Boom be entitled to receive fifteen cents on each thousand S. feet of Logs, and three cents on each thou of Timber securely boomed. 2. That Section 1 of "A Bye-Law relating booms and Boomage" passed by the County Couril at April sittings be repealed.

A Bye-Law Relating to Dogs. A Bye-Law Relating to Dogs.

Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland:—
