But the United States and France are both foreign countries. In tariff dealings with one or both we have but to consider our own advantage. If we choose to endanger a trade of a hundred millions with another, we have a right to do it, so far as any outside authority goos. There is no question of dignity involved that we can see. It is purely a question of business. So far our Government has not made a great record for itself in dealing with France. France has not thought it improper to hold up the treaty with Canada and to cause it to be changed, when business reasons were pre-


