

Anyone of thesa gentlemen has had more legal experience than Mr. Robin-son, and they were certainly derelict in their duty if they believed the province had a lien and refused to enforce it. Mr. Robinson and the Telegraph are floundering in very deep water in having raised the question of the Albert Southern at such a late date. If there was a lien it should have been acted on years ago.
