While Hungry Austria Clamors For Peace

Will Russia or Austria be the first to collapse under the hammering of the enemy legions without and the discord of quarreling forces within? Some editors even think the reply to this question will decide the war. While Russia staggers under the loss of Riga, the demoralization of her armies, and the desperate confusion of her internal affairs, Austria recoils before Italy's inexorable offensive and her hungry people clamor for an early peace.

If Germany can force Russia into a separate peace, she opens for herself a vast reservoir of desperately needed supplies, doubles the number of men available for her Western battle-lines, and increases tremendously the difficulty of the task to which America is pledged. On the other hand, if Italy brings Austria to her knees, Germany is cut off from Turkey and Bulgaria, her Pan-Germanic ream is shattered and peace with victory is brought immeasurably nearer for the Un her Allies.







Next, the Imperial Oil Company is building a plant on Halifax Harbor that will cost nearly \$3,000,000. Similar plants are being built at Montreal, Winnipeg and Vancouver, each at what this giant company thinks is the strategic point of the Maritime Provinces, of Upper Canada, of the Middle West, and of the Pacific Coast, respectively. The choosing of Halifax as a location is very, very significant.

Representatives of four or five of the largest shipbuilding companies in the world have been carefully going over the ground at Halifax and it is practically certain that one of them will erect a huge plant there. Canadian and British Markets Likely Seriously Affected,

But Today's Unsettled Conditions Prevent Operators Expressing Definite Opin-

The capture of Rigs by the Ger-mans may have a farreaching effect on the lumber markets of the world. The Russian city was the largest timber supplying depot for the mark-timber supplying depot for the market to be of Burope, large quantities being shipped prior to the war to the Brit-isk market. Since the commence-ment of hostilities the shipments from Righ have been very light. In fact with the exception of the first year the port has been practically closed for export business.
