War in the East. The Eastern Question, that fruitful breeder of discord, again occupying the attention of European statesmen.

The countries between which war has been declared are not so important that their strife will cause any serious inconvenience to the commerce of any country, but, as Austria, Germany, Russia, England and France exercise an informal protectorate over both, and Russia and Austria are known to have designs on their territory, any disturbance of this kind arouses suspicions and hopes that threaten the peace of Europe.

The Turks have twice invaded the country in 1853, when they retired after gaining a few trifling successes in the field, and in 1862, when they defeated the Montenegrins in several engagements and concluded a treaty which affirmed the sovereignty of the Sultan.

\$1,000 DAMAGES AWARDED IN A BREACH OF PROMISE SUIT.

DORCHESTER, Jan. 20. The cause of Mary E. Palmer vs Samuel Dinmore, which has occupied the attention of the Court since Thursday last, was finished this evening (Wednesday). It is an action for breach of promise of marriage.

The plaintiff, who is now twenty-eight years of age and a resident of Dorchester, alleges that in the spring of 1863 she became acquainted with the defendant, who boarded at her father's house, that he held her attention during the whole of that year, and in July, 1864, he became engaged, and in the following December, under color of contemplated marriage, he seduced her.

LONDON, Jan. 20.  
The British steamer *Becca*, Captain Sunham, from Ouessant for Cardiff, is supposed to have foundered with all on board, twenty in number.  
The *Comte de Paris* says the Carlist Committee of London has gone to Spain to inform Don Carlos that the English banks with whom Carlist loans were lodged have refused to make further advances. It is understood that Spain will pay Germany an indemnity equal to the value of the *Gustav* and cargo, in addition to a fine, even if this is unsuccessful in effecting the same from the Carlists.  
The Municipal Council of Marseilles has been suspended from the exercise of its functions.

The Commutation of Lepine's Sentence—The Ministerial Order—The Governor General's Responsibility.

OTTAWA, Jan. 21st.  
An extra of the *Canada Gazette*, issued yesterday, contains the following letter from the Governor General's Secretary: "I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor General to inform you that His Excellency has had under his full and anxious consideration the evidence and other documents connected with the trial of Ambrose Lepine, who has been capitally convicted, before a Court Assize held at Winnipeg, of the murder of Thomas Scott on the 4th day of March, 1870, at Fort Garry. Although His Excellency entirely agrees with the finding of the jury, and considers that the crime of which the prisoner, Lepine, has been convicted was nothing less than a cruel and unjustified murder, he is of the opinion that the subsequent circumstances, and, notably, the relations into which the provincial authority of Manitoba entered with the prisoner and his associates, are such as, in a great degree, to fetter the hands of justice. It further appears to His Excellency that the case has passed beyond the Province of Departmental administration, and that it will be best dealt with under the Royal instructions which authorize the Governor General in certain capital cases to dispense with the advice of his Ministers, and to exercise the prerogative of the Crown according to his independent judgment and on his own personal responsibility. I have, therefore, in command to inform you that it is His Excellency's pleasure that the capital sentence passed upon the prisoner, Lepine, be commuted to two years' imprisonment in gaol, from the date of the original sentence, and permanent forfeiture of his political rights. His Excellency desires that the necessary instrument for giving effect to this commutation be forthwith prepared."

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.  
The Dominion Board of Trade met again this morning, and proceeded to discuss the report of the Committee on the draft of the Reciprocity Treaty, which was taken up clause by clause. The amendments recommended by the Committee before the Treaty should be passed by Canadian Parliament, were adopted on a vote of 41 to 4.  
Resolutions were adopted recommending that the law for the inspection of Fire and Life Companies doing business in Canada be more rigidly enforced; that there be an act for the more thorough inspection of fish.  
Parsons, President of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to cause enquiry into all serious accidents to vessels and steamers on inland waters was also adopted, and one recommending Government to establish fog whistles on various dangerous points and headlands in Canadian waters.  
Parsons, President of the Detroit Board of Trade, and member of the National Board of the United States, attended this afternoon session.  
President Howland stated on high authority that a Committee of the United States Senate appointed to consider the proposed draft on reciprocity had reported in disapproval of the Treaty's completion.

Benefit of Miss Ebbel and Mr. Warner.  
The entertainment in the Academy of Music this evening promises to be a very pleasing affair. Miss Ebbel and Mr. Warner have been giving entertainments together for some time and have been very successful. A wrong impression has gone abroad to the effect that the entertainments merely consisted of platform readings—dry and tedious. Such is not the case, as the program consists of pleasant little acts, interspersed with songs from Miss Ebbel.

The direct examination of Miss Ladds was concluded shortly after seven yesterday afternoon. Then Mr. Duff commenced his cross-examination. It was one of the most pleasing episodes of the trial, and the jury seemed very much interested. Mr. Duff's position, and his intelligent, seductive manner of cross-examination, in which he has no rival at the bar, was met by Miss Ladds in an open and frank manner. She apparently answered every question to the best of her ability. There was a quiet smile playing round the corners of her mouth that showed how perfectly she understood the point of each question, though clothed in simple language as it was. He justified Miss Ladds in having possession of the book, as the Bank Directors had given her access to all the books.

Mr. Kerr then wished to call a student of his—Mr. Williston—to prove that the testimony of Simpson in reference to the occurrence in his office was wrong. This he wished to do not to influence the case, but to set himself right before the court. His honor considered such testimony as having no bearing on the case, and excluded it. Mr. Kerr persisted, and the Judge characterized it as one of the greatest burlesques on justice he had ever heard.
